## FFA POULTRY TEAM

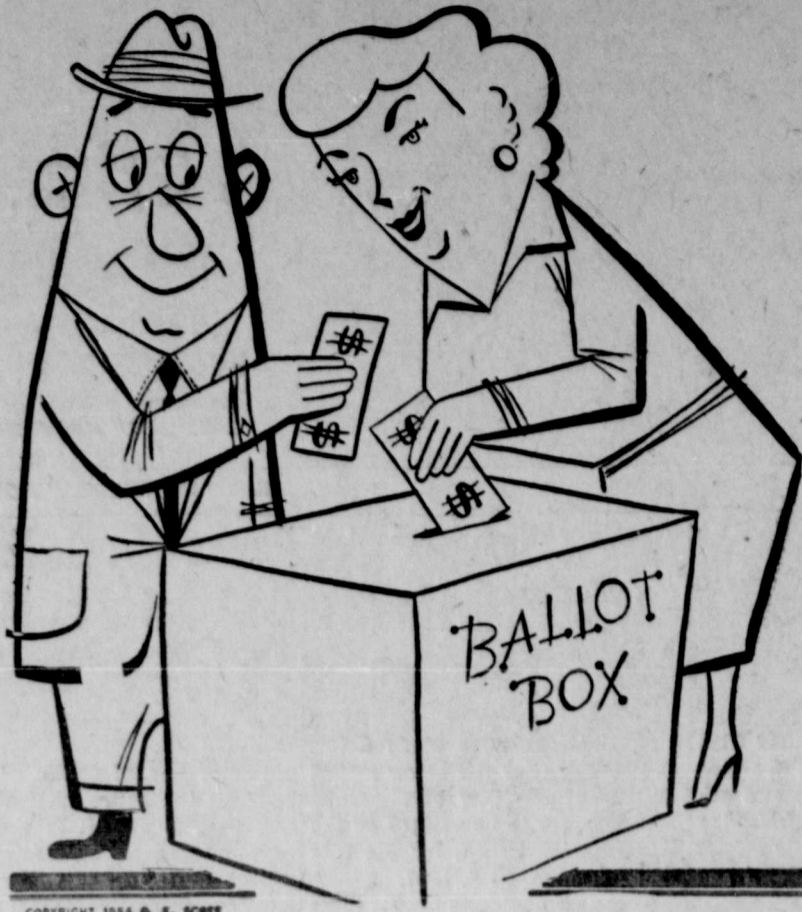

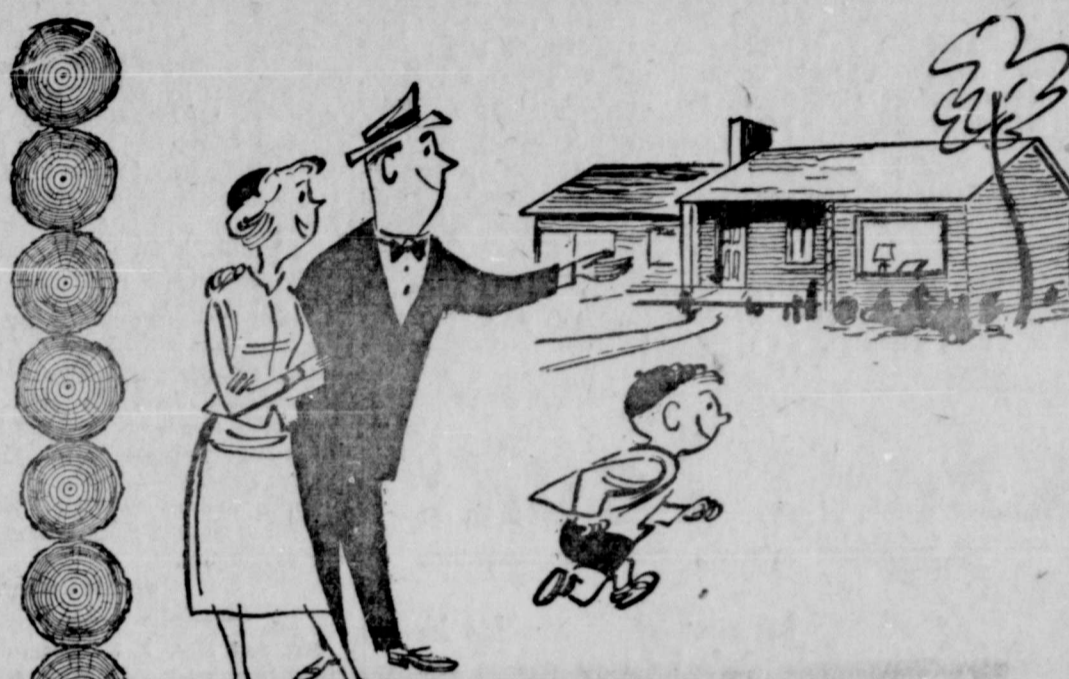
