J. J. Vardell became ill at 2 a. m. on Wednesday last week at Amarillo, Oklahoma. He was brought to his request to the Osteopathic Hospital in Amarillo and was still a patient there early this week.

According to relatives Mr. and Mrs. Vardell and a grandson, Ted Vardell, of Amarillo, were enroute to Clarksville, Arkansas, where they own a farm and had stopped in Amarillo for an overnight visit with her sister and family, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Walls. A doctor there advised that he be moved closer home, hence he was brought to the Amarillo hospital.

It has been determined that Mr. Vardell is suffering from a brain hemorrhage which has caused paralysis of the left side of his body. His condition has not changed appreciably since he was stricken ill.

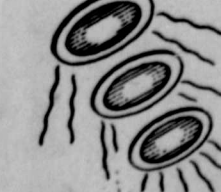
*** CEILING HEATING UNIT WITH CIRCULATING FAN**

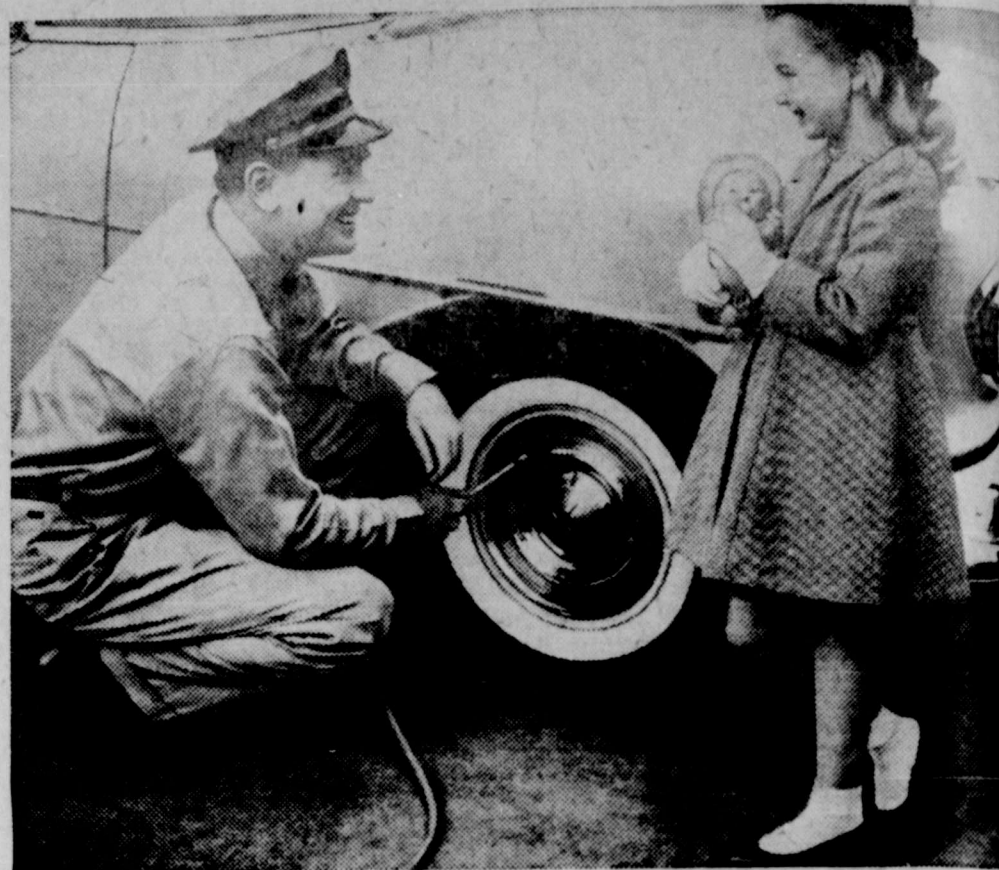

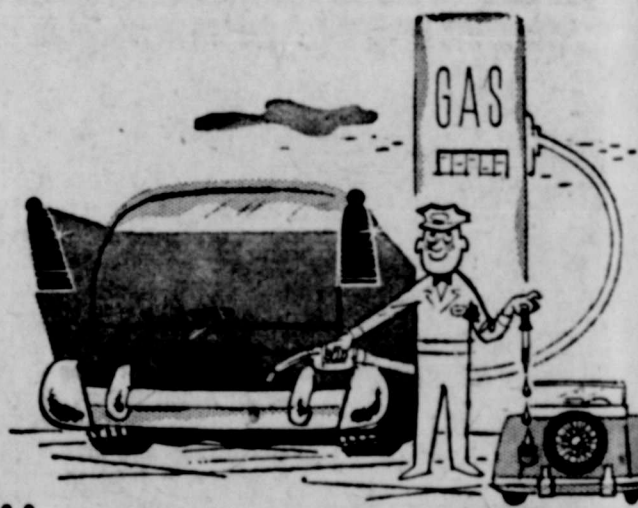
