
Sorenson's poultry raising activities have progressed from selling hatching eggs to being one of the major egg and chicken producers in the area. His thermostatically controlled incubators can hatch 9000 eggs per week, and he has space in his electric battery brooders for 15,000 chicks.

Sorenson is optimistic about the egg picture despite the current low price in eggs. He bases his favorable outlook on the reduction in the number. of chicks put down this spring.

"Seventeen percent less laying pullets are being put down in the Southwest than a year ago, Sorenson remarked, "and it indicates a high egg market next fall and winter.'

CHOIR GIRL SLAIN AT HOLY WEEK SERVICES

By Ed Martin Cove, Ark.-Moments after prety Helen Griffith left a choir and went to a pew in a church here last night, six pistol shots blasted the Holy Week service and the 20 year old girl fell fatally wounded

in the aisle. The shots were fired through a window of the Hilltop Holiness Church in this west Arkansas mountain town. Another member of the congregation, a 61 year old, man, was wounded in the left leg during the firing.

Several persons rushed to the door in time to see a man leap into a pickup truck and flee.

Little more than an hour later, officers here were notified that Haskell Sullivan, 25, a rejected suitor of the dead girl, had killed himself in front of his mother's nouse at Nano Chito, Oklahoma, 20 miles from Cove.

Sheriff's officers of McCurtain County, Okla., said Sullivan's body was found in his pickup truck outside the home of J. L. Sullivan.

He had been shot between the eyes with a .22 pistol, apparently the same weapon which killed Miss Griffith, officers reported.

Sullivan left a note, It said: "I killed Helen and I'm going

The Company traded \$3,650,000 of its common stock for a like amount of Texas Telephone and Oklahoma Telephone common stock held by General Telephone Corporation. Texas Telephone bonds totaling \$2,510,000 were exchanged for General Telephone Company of the Southwest bonds. Debentures and preferred stock of Texas Telephone and bonds of Oklahoma Telephone were called for redemption.




