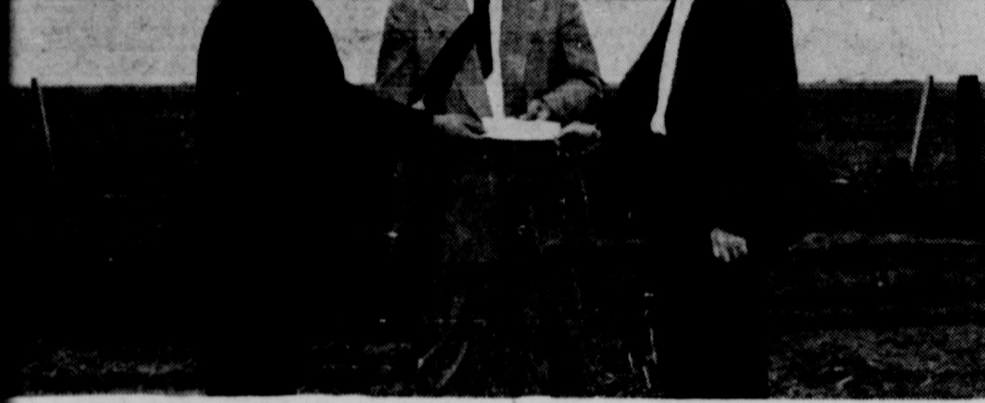

HALFWAY: Elbert Harp, Secretary-Treasurer of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association in presenting the \$3,000.00 check to the High Plains Station said "We appreciate the opportunity offered by this station to have grain sorghum studies carried on under our own soil, moisture and climatic conditions and are glad to support it with our funds. Research is one phase of the activities of the Association, Legislation and marketing which round out our program."

R. G. Peeler, Hereford, president of the association which includes Grain Sorghum Producers throughout the high plains area of Texas and New Mexico, said, "We are glad our association was among the first to urge the establishment of the High Plains Station. Research conducted here will be of benefit to all grain sorghum producing areas. We are expecting large numbers of visitors not only from the high plains area, but also from 300 to 400 miles around to come to the station to observe and study the experiments."

Grain sorghum research will include fertilizer with time, rate and method of application, and irrigation studies. The crop research will include 49 varieties in 4 row plots 100 feet long replicated four times and 101 experimental strains for observation in single row plots. In addition, the general crop will consist of larger acreages of several different varieties.

Mr. Peeler stated, "The Association hopes to be able to furnish support for additional research on problems of grain sorghum production, consumption and marketing."

Planting Sorghum Alum

We have received some inquiry concerning the number and size of planting sorghum alum. The following information has come to us from the Panhandle Seed Company of Ellington, Texas. The recommended seeding rate is one pound per acre.

The following procedure should be used to determine number of holes needed:

- 1. Put a blank plate in your planter box.
- 2. Mark the plate over the spot where the seeds drop.
- 3. Move the planter forward 18 to 24 inches and mark plate again. Repeat until the plate is back to its original starting place.
- 4. Drill 3-16 inch holes at each mark. Ream the holes to 1-4 inch on the under side. Do not counter sink holes.
- 5. Sorghum Alum may be planted to approximately same depth and covering as sudan.

Water Conservation

One of the biggest advantages of a conservation irrigation system is that it conserves water, prevents erosion, and evenly distributes irrigation as well as rain water over the field.
