Fee Refunds Will be Made to Veterans

Austin—More than \$16,000 in fee refunds will soon be in the hands of Texas veterans, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder said Friday.

The fees were collected by the Veterans' Land Board from ex-servicemen buying land through the Veterans' Land Program. Some transactions were not completed, but until now fees could not be returned.

Commissioner Rudder recommended to the Legislature during its last session that the law be changed to authorize refund of these fees. "I want to commend the Legislature for giving the veterans the just refund of their money," the Land Commissioner remarked.

A total of \$16,271.80 will be returned to 229 veterans who have submitted fees since the Program reopened in October, 1955, but who did not complete their transactions.

This is an average of \$71.06 per veteran. The largest refund will be \$100, the amount each must pay in fees. Several will receive the full amount.

The Veterans' Land Board began mailing refunds this week. Most will be mailed within several weeks, Commissioner Rudder said.

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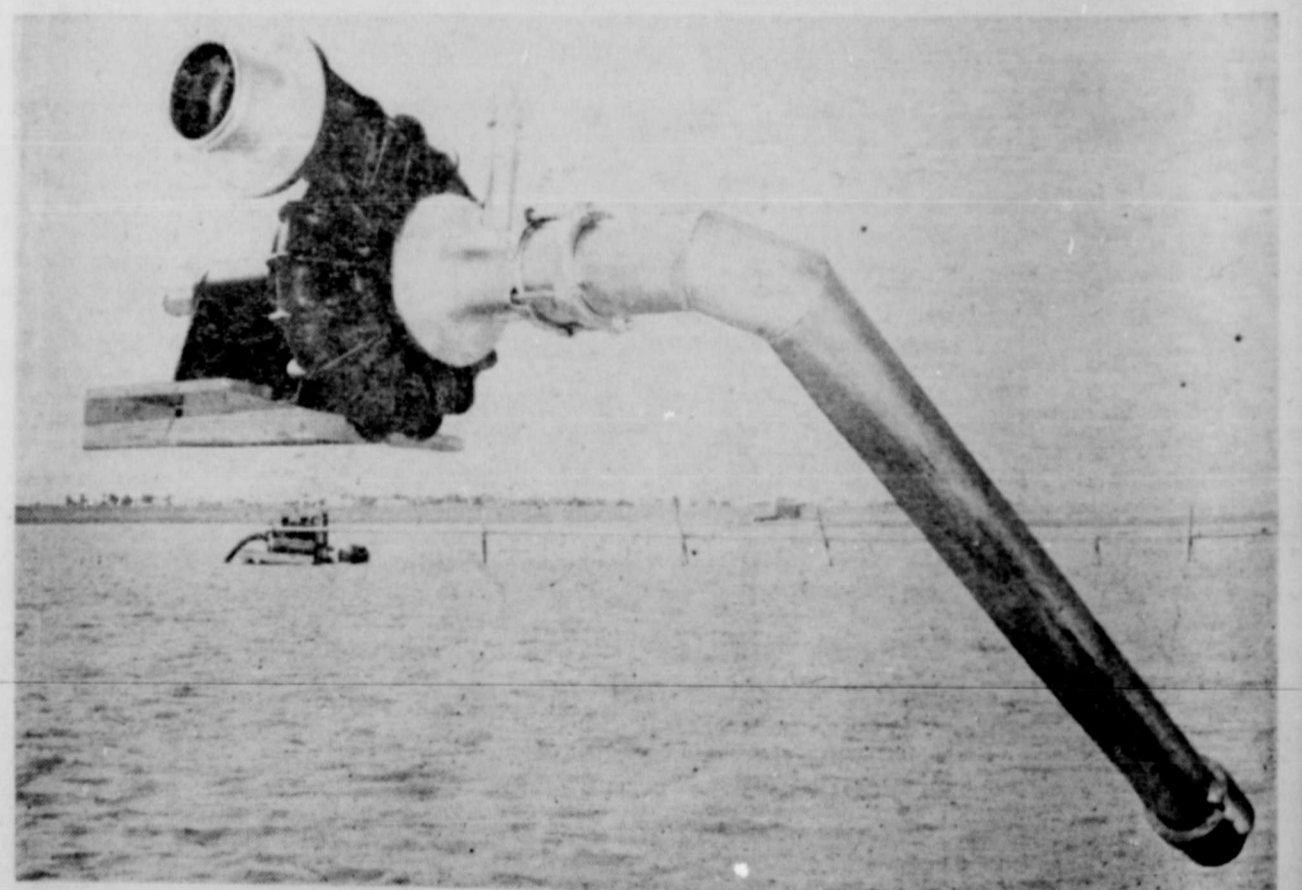

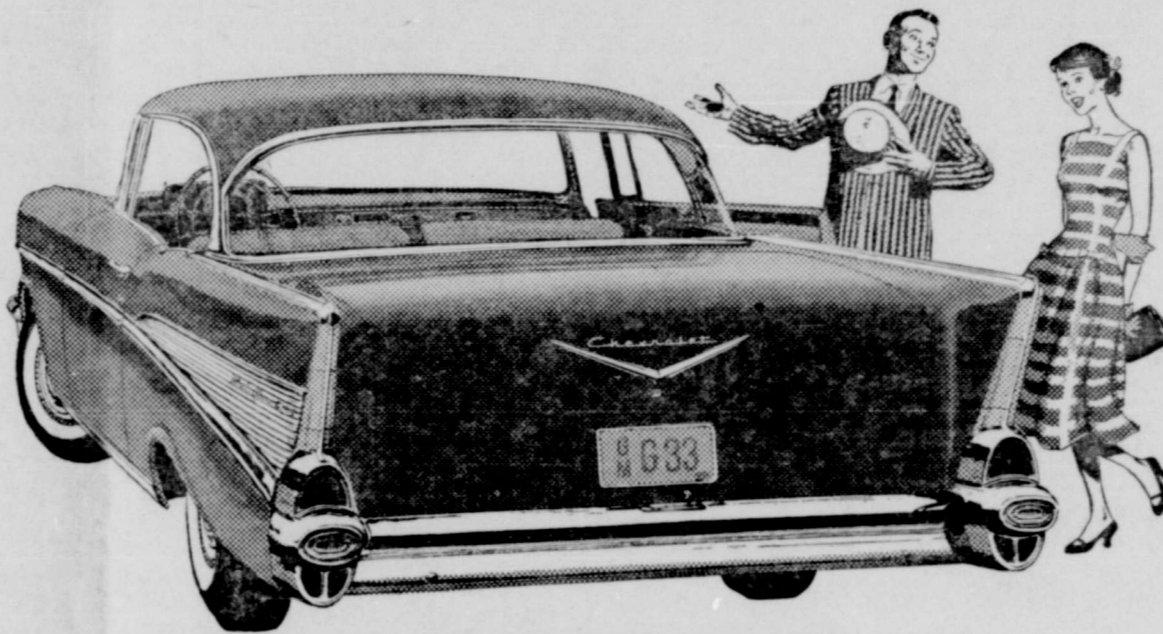

High Plains Station Makes Study of Grain Sorghum Fertilization Program

Halfway, Texas:

Grain sorghum fertilization tests are receiving a great deal of attention in the fertilizer research program at the High Plains Station and Halfway.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element that has been found to be most effective in increasing yields of grain sorghum but more information is needed to how much nitrogen is needed, when it should be applied, and whether any phosphate fertilizer is required along with the nitrogen. The grain sorghum fertilization tests are set up to find answers to these and other questions concerning grain sorghum fertilization.

In one grain sorghum test 40, 80 and 120 pounds of nitrogen and phosphate per acre are applied and the results at all rates of growth. Together of this test should help answer the question of how much nitrogen required for the greatest return to the farmer, and also if phosphate is required as well as nitrogen and if so, how much phosphate.

To answer the question as to whether nitrogen should be applied before planting or as a side-dressing an experiment is underway in which 40, 80, 120 and 160 pounds of nitrogen applied before planting is being compared with the same rates of nitrogen applied as a side-dressing. The 40, 80 and 120 pounds per acre rates were also being applied before planting and again to the same plots as a side-dressing. A total of 240 pounds of nitrogen will thus be applied in some treatments.

Planting grain sorghum in narrower rows for increased yields is receiving more attention all the time," stated Dr. Longnecker, head of the High Plains Station. "So we considered it important to conduct some tests with combination of row spacing, seeding rate and fertilizer application." In this test one and two rows per bed are being compared at 4 seeding rates, 5, 6, 7.0, 8.9 and 10.1 pounds of seed per acre. In addition no

fertilizer, 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre before planting, and 100 pounds both before and after planting are being compared at each rate of seeding and with one and two rows per 40 inch bed. "I believe that the proper use of fertilizer and irrigation water along with the new hybrid grain sorghums that we now have offers the opportunity to boost yields of grain sorghums from present yields of 3,500 pounds per acre to 7,500 pounds," concluded Dr. Longnecker.

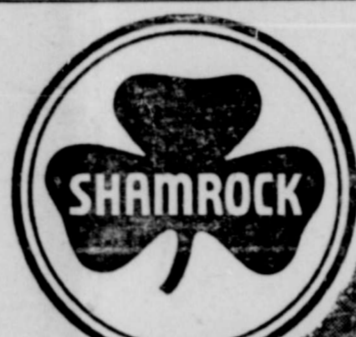

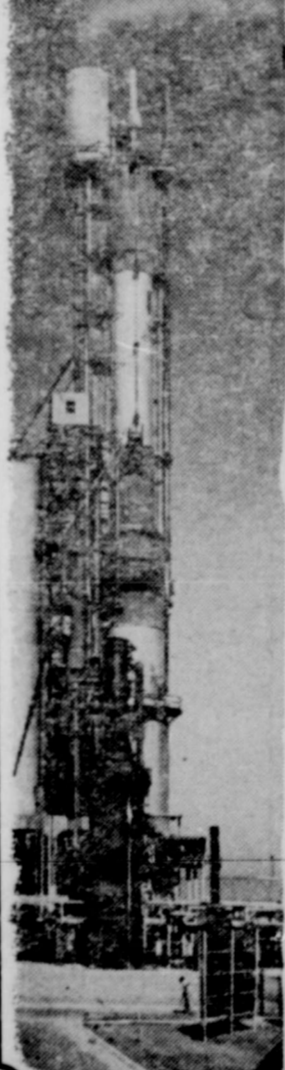
