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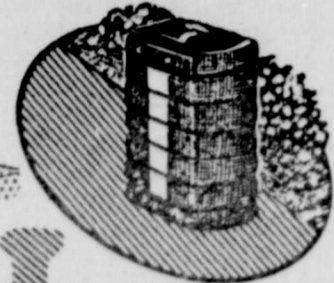

### Scott Smithee Appointed to FHA County Committee

Scott Smithee, Route 1, Silvertown, was appointed to the Farmers Home Administration committee for Briscoe County last week, Ralph E. Griffiths, local supervisor for the agency, announced today. The appointment was made by Walter T. McKay, State Director at Dallas.

The new committeeman operates an irrigated farm southwest of Silvertown. Mr. Smithee succeeds M. George Martin of Silvertown, whose term expired this year.

The other two members are William E. Helms of Quitaque, and Clifford O. Allard, Silvertown.

The committee determines the eligibility of local farmers who apply for Farmers Home Administration loans. They also certify as to the value of farms being purchased or improved through Farmers Home Administration loans, and make recommendations on loan approvals and loan servicing actions. Advice of the committeemen is sought on good farm management and on the refinancing of Farmers Home Administration loans when borrowers build up enough equity in their property to get credit from local banks or other lenders.

The county supervisor relies upon the advice of the committee in connection with all types of loans. These include farm operating loans, loans to buy, improve, or enlarge efficient family-type farms in this area, and loans to establish and carry on approved soil and water conservation practices, including improving permanent pastures, terracing, soil erosion measurements, farmstead water systems, irrigation, drainage, and many other conservation practices.

Austin, Texas, August 26—The license of one doctor was revoked today and another doctor suspended for 90 days by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners.

Dr. John Franklin Furby, Silvertown, Texas, osteopath, had his license taken away permanently after the examiners heard testimony that he was a narcotics addict.

The examiners were told by Joseph A. Gabrys, investigator for the Federal Bureau of Narcotics in Fort Worth, that Furby had converted to his use a "fantastic" amount of drugs during the past three years.

Evidence was presented by Gabrys that Furby's license to practice medicine in Oklahoma was revoked in 1951. Furby was not present and was not represented by counsel.

## Ghana Was Named For Ancient African Empire

WASHINGTON—Ghana, the world's newest nation, takes its name from a mighty African empire that flourished for some 800 years before Europeans came to the Dark Continent.

Although the new state is not situated within the ancient borders of Ghana, the tribesmen of the former Gold Coast Colony trace their ancestry to Ghanaian refugees who were driven to the coast by 9th-century Moslem invaders.

Portuguese traders bestowed the name Gold Coast on a narrow strip of land on the underside of Africa's hump just north of the Equator. Later the name was extended to a rectangular area stretching some 330 miles along the coast and 400 miles into the interior. Thus the former colony's boundaries embrace the Gold Coast proper as well as Ashanti, British Togoland, and the Northern Territories.

Ghana, approximately twice the size of the state of Mississippi, has a population of 4,500,000; all but 7,000 are Africans. Accra, the capital, is a European-type city of 136,000 residents.

Ghana's Prime Minister, Kwame Nkrumah, who was educated in the United States and England, has worked hard to raise the living standards of his countrymen. In the past five years alone, the number of schools has tripled.

However, Ashanti and the Northern Territories, still in the grip of old tribal customs, have resisted modernization. Most of Nkrumah's political opposition is centered there. The chiefs fear that a strong central government will infringe upon their prerogatives.

## Diseases Caused Fewer Deaths in '56

NEW YORK—All-time low death rates were recorded in 1956 for tuberculosis, maternity, the childhood disease, suicide, and homicide, the statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company report on the basis of the experience among the company's industrial policyholders.

In addition, the poliomyelitis death rate among these insured dropped to half that for 1955—or to only .3 per 100,000. This reduction in mortality paralleled the drop in the number of cases of the disease reported in the general population of the United States. In 1956 there were 15,400 such cases reported in the country, a 47 per cent decrease from the 29,270 cases in 1955. The immunization program is credited for part of this decrease.

Mortality from all causes among industrial policyholders continued at the record low level of the two preceding years. The death rate for all ages combined was 6.2 per 1,000 in each of the last three years, compared with 6.5 in each of the three years 1951-53.

## Down-South Folks Partial to Catsup

CHICAGO—Southerners like catsup more than anyone. This bit of miscellany turned up in a survey on consumer reactions to new twist-off caps for glass-capped foods.

The cap-producers wanted as much information on catsup consumption habits as it could get so it had an independent marketing research service canvass families from coast to coast. One of the questions asked was, "How many bottles of catsup do you purchase every month?"

Eighty-one per cent of families in the South used at least one bottle a month. In the East, 78 per cent used at least one a month, in the central states, 75 per cent, and in the Pacific states, 68 per cent.

## Scientists Studying Psychology of Yoga

LOS ANGELES—Is there a third "state of mind"—so-called suspended animation? Can a human being actually shut off a portion of his brain, or numb normal cellular functions at will so that he feels no pain?

These are questions Dr. Marion Wenger of Los Angeles and Dr. B. K. Bagschi, brain wave expert from the University of Michigan, are seeking to answer in a six-month study of the psychology of yoga in India.

Using a 78-pcand transistor machine especially constructed for the project, Dr. Wenger and Dr. Bagschi will do research with the Indian mystery men on control of the central nervous system and involuntary responses such as heart action.

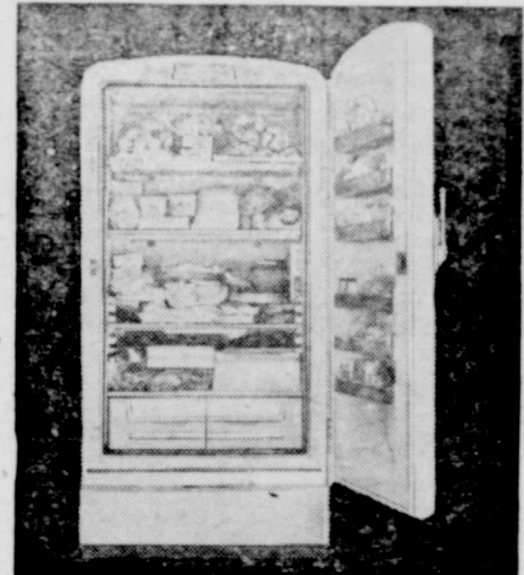

## 12 Varieties of Castor Beans Are Being Tested at Halfway

Halfway, Texas—The castor bean appears to have a place as a cash crop on the irrigation soil of the high plains. In an attempt to determine the best adapted variety and find the cash per acre value, twelve varieties of castor beans have been included in the research program of the High Plains Station at Halfway.

The Station Scientists, in cooperation with representatives of the Baker Castor Bean Corporation, are searching for not only the most productive but also the varieties that can be harvested with minimum difficulty. They want a variety of combine height that can be harvested cleanly so as to leave few or no seed to volunteer.

Recent predictions indicate a future increase in the castor bean market due to the need for castor oil in the operations of jets and rockets. There is also a potential tremendous market for use in the production of synthetic fibers.

Success in this research program will help reach the objective of the Regional Council in finding new cash crops for the high plains area.
