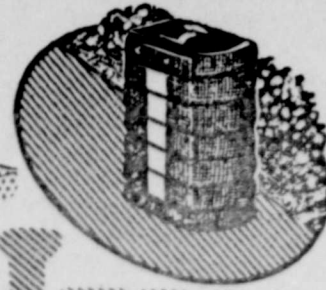




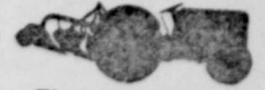

Disabled Workers Receive Checks From Social Security

More than 100 thousand disabled workers have been notified that they received their first checks during August, John R. Sanderson, manager of the Social Security office in Amarillo announced today. Most of the checks were delivered August 3, the remainder will be mailed shortly thereafter.

Social security benefit checks for any month are ordinarily delivered on the third of the following month. Because of the large number of disability application, Sanderson said, it was impossible to get out on August 3rd to all those entitled to disability benefits for the month of July.

Those disabled workers whose applications can be approved in the near future will receive their first checks in coming months.

All disabled workers eligible under the law, and whose applications are filed before the end of December, 1957, will get benefit payments for the months of July through December of this year. Claimants filing after December, 1957 will not receive benefits for any time before the month of application Sanderson added.

To qualify for disability insurance benefits a person must be between 50 and 65 years of age and have a long-lasting disability that prevents him from engaging in substantial activity. The law also provides that disabled persons of any age who meet the disability and work requirements may apply to have their social security records "frozen." When a worker's record is frozen, his own and his family's future benefit rights are protected Mr. Sanderson said.

Tomlin, Long and McWilliams Will Serve on Committee

Three Briscoe County citizens, Shelly Tomlin, Bill Long and Glenn McWilliams, will serve as a County Farm Labor Committee and met with Mr. Bill Day, manager of the Texas Employment Commission office, to review the total seasonal employment needs developed by the TEC.

The committee was presented with the figures of the TEC that Briscoe County will be short 1200 cotton pullers during the peak period of the cotton harvest.

The committee will function under Public Law 78, obtaining facts relevant to the supply of domestic farm workers existing in Briscoe County and the shortage of workers, if any, which must be met by importing Mexican Nationals to harvest the cotton crop. Under Public Law 78 the TEC must supply this information to the Secretary of Labor who must limit the number of Mexican Nationals to be used in this county by granting a "ceiling." The committee consults with the local office manager to assist him in estimating the number of workers who will be needed, based on current local conditions affecting the cotton crop.

"Ceilings" granted by the secretary of labor limiting the importation of Mexican Nationals into this area will be posted in Post Offices in Silvertown, Quitaque, in the County Agent's Office and in the County Courthouse. The TEC has estimated that 600 of the Mexican Nationals will have to be imported into this county to harvest this year's cotton crop.

A meeting was held in Silvertown Tuesday, September 10, to discuss the proposition.

The 1956 social security amendments make it easier to determine who's the employer of agricultural "crews." Starting January, 1957 farmers who hire groups can readily determine who is the employer of the group. If the farmer and the crew leader have a written agreement that the leader is an employee, then all the workers are employees of the farmer. The absence of a written agreement would mean that the leader who pays the crew is the employer.
