On Friday night, September 20, the Silvertown Owls were defeated 12 to 7 by the Kress Kangaroos. The game was played at Silvertown. The first quarter started with J. E. Patton kicking off. Foster received the ball for Kress and ran it to the 18 yard line. Webb then carried the ball to the 20. On the next play Kress fumbled, and Patton recovered the ball for Silvertown. Henderson carried it to the 17 yard line. Bill Baird made a yard, then Henderson made 4 yards and West, 5. Baird made another yard, but Silvertown fumbled on the next play. Foster recovered the fumble.

Foster ran the ball up one yard. Webb made 4 yards and a pass to Webb added 6. Foster gained 2 yards; Webb failed to make a gain. Kress tried a pass to King; it was incomplete. Foster next kicked to the 23rd. After a question as to whether Kress had been offside was settled, West made a 1 yard and then a two yard gain. Ten yards were gained by Henderson, and 4 by Stephens. Henderson next ran the ball across the goal line for a touchdown and West made the extra point.

Patton kicked again, and Webb carried the ball to the 11. Rouser increased this to the 26. Webb failed to gain any, and Foster ran to the 30. Rouser faked a pass and ran, but the play was not counted because of clipping on the Kress team. Webb lost 5 yards, and Rouser kicked to the 40. Donnie Stephens ran the ball back to the 39 but lost this gain on the next play. West gained 7 yards, Henderson, none, and then 3. Kress recovered the ball on downs. Rouser made 9 yards and Webb 3 in each of two plays.

The second quarter started with Rouser losing a yard on the 40. Rouser then passed to King, who ran to the 29. Baird recovered a fumble on the 30. Henderson made 3 yards. Foster recovered a fumble on Silvertown's 34 yard line. Rouser made 9 yards. Kress received apenalty for being offside. Webb made a 3 yard gain. Foster ran to the 20. The next plays were as follows:

Webb lost 6, putting the ball on the 12 yard line.

Silvertown here recovered the ball on downs. After Silvertown gained 5 yards in 3 plays, Baird kicked to the 36. Rouser ran one yard. Foster made 2 yards to the 33. There was a question on the play. Silvertown had a 15 yard penalty against them for unnecessary roughness. Foster failed to make a gain. Webb made two yards. Rouser passed to Freeman, who ran a touchdown. The try for the extra point failed.

Thornton received the kick on the 25 and ran it back to the 32. West gained 11 yards; Bill lost 7. Stephens threw an incomplete pass to Smith. On the next play Silvertown fumbled, but recovered. 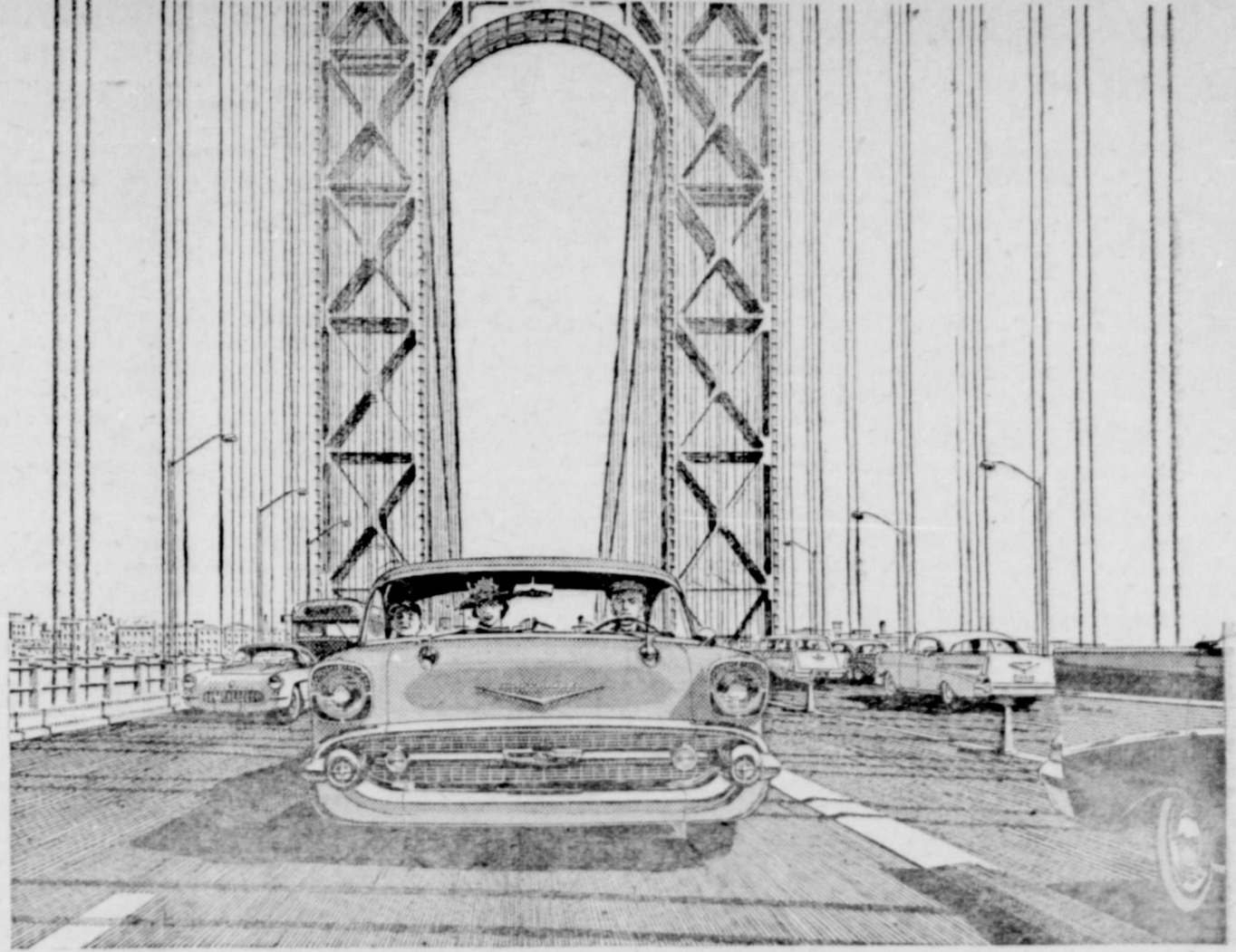
