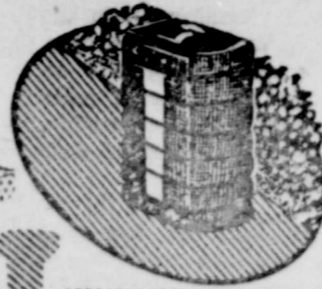

All Briscoe County 4-H Club calves at the Harvest Queen Elevator Saturday, October 5 for a practice showing, feet trimming, and grooming demonstration. There are 21 steers on feed this year. The boys will also mix their final ration for the year. The boys have mixed their own feeds this year and have used home grown feeds to the largest extent. So far the program has gone off good with little trouble.

Most of the calves are larger this year and have certainly come through the summer in good condition. Most of the boys are looking forward to better gains this winter as they increase the grain intake. Oats have been the principal summer feed. The principal feed this winter will be grain sorghum with proper supplement. All the boys are feeding aureomycin to keep down sub-clinical disease and increase daily gain.

Tomlin-Fleming Gin Has Made a labor agreement with the Tri-County Farm Labor Association, of Plainview to furnish Mexican Nationals for agricultural use during the 1957 season.

The gin has made a loan to the Association, and the money will be used to get the hands here from Mexico. The dollar a day that the farmer pays goes to repay the loan.

This is not cheap labor, but it is available, when domestic labor is unavailable.

Tomlin-Fleming have fifty hands ready at this time for those farmers that have been approved to use this type of help.

The following is the rules of the U. S. Department of Labor and the Tri-County Farm Labor Association:

COST TO FARMERS FOR HARVESTING COTTON

1. \$1.75 per hundred Wt. (Gin Weights) Plus \$1.00 per man per day under the following conditions.

Two-fifty man crews with men hauled to and from field by Association. Association to keep weights and pull trailers to gin.

2. If some farmers want smaller crews they must haul men to and from field, keep weights and pull their trailers to gin. Cost under this condition will be \$1.70 per hundred Wt. (Gin weights) and \$1.00 per man per day.

3. All farmers who use Mexican Nationals must be approved and pay membership fee of \$10.00. Membership fee is set up on Calendar year from January first through December 31. Membership fee paid now is good until December 31, 1957.

4. Farmers must furnish their own trailers. Association will do utmost to see that farmers' trailers are taken care of but will in no case assume responsibility for fire or damage in any way.

5. Prevailing wage for Braceros is now \$1.55 per hundred Wt. Should prevailing wage go up above \$1.55 then the farmers cost would be subject to change.



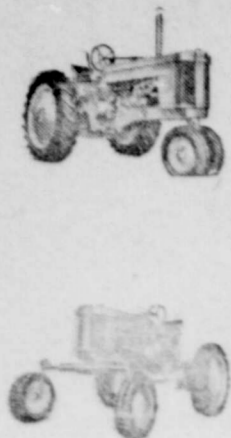

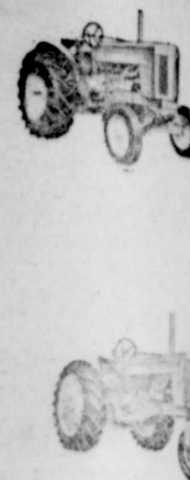
