Around Mules spank Perryton to win bi-district crown MHS to face Boyd-Graham winner in area playoff; date TBA

AMARILLO — Aggressive pitch, the Muleshoe Mules won the bi-district baseball title here Tuesday, beating Perryton 11-6 at the Caprock High School Field.

The Mules gathered just at the plate from the first seven official hits, but ripped the ball at the Perryton defense all day. The Rangers committed eight errors and Muleshoe made them pay. Of the Mules' seven hits, three

were for extra bases.

"We needed to stay aggressive on offense, big time," said MHS head coach Ted Leps. "At times we were a little over aggressive and went after some bad pitches.

But the kids were up there to put the ball in play and that's what you want."

The Mules aggressive play staked them to a 4-0 lead after two innings. A squeeze play in the first inning resulted in two runs. With courtesy runner Mike Woodard on third and John Embry on second, Alfredo Gonzales layed down the squeeze bunt per-

DeShazo students multiply learning into banana splits

Teachers get lots of ideas from other teachers. It's a profession of sharing what works.

For Ann Favor, third grade teacher at Mary DeShazo Elementary School, what works (to challenge students to learn multiplication facts) is banana

The banana splits began on construction paper — built from the bowls up — and materialized on Monday with 95 third and fourth grade math students eating real banana splits with one parent each.

Favor said students earned bowls, scoops of vanilla ice cream, cherries and toppings like chocolate, strawberry, crushed Oreo cookies, pecans

and whipping cream by proving in timed tests that they knew their multiplication tables.

At first there were just pictures of banana splits, but when 29 half gallons of vanilla ice cream and two boxes of bananas plus 20 were delivered to DeShazo, the banana splits became deliciously real.

Third grade homeroom teachers who participated in the challenge with Favor were Holly Henderson, Nora Burris, June Parish and Debbie Kemp.

The third-grade math classes of Beth Skipworth and Wilma Robinson also joined the sticky, gooey challenge.

MHS' Flores third, Faver fifth at 3A state track meet

AUSTIN — Muleshoe High School's contingent made their presence known at the Texas State Track and Field meet here last weekend.

Muleshoe's Jesus Flores finished third in the 3A 800 meters, while Cari Faver finished fifth in the 1600 meters and Daniel Garbarino was eighth in the 300-meter

"When it comes to compet-

ing at the state track meet in Austin, it is the ultimate for any track athlete," said MHS head boys coach Ted Johnson.

Flores, the District 2-3A ad Region 1-3A champion at 800 meters, needed to run the best race of his career in a highlytalented field. At the gun, things looked good for Flores, who had beaten the defending state champion, Joey Flores of Dimmitt, in the regional meet.

"Everyone waited on Jesus to go out and take the lead," Johnson said. "When he didn't, everyone locked into a slow

The first lap was relatively slow. The pace picked up on the second 400 meters, but not the way Flores would have

"At the 500-meter mark, Jesus needed to be in the middle of the pack," Johnson said.

"Since no one had really taken the lead, Jesus did. He probsomeone would have. It would have helped Jesus."

Flores took the lead with the other runners drafting off of him. He had to fight off the kicking runners down the stretch, managing to hold on for third and won a medal.

Flores ran a 1:59.86, while Anthony Weathered of San

Augustine got by him at the tape to win in 1:59.18. ably should have waited and Alejandro Acosta of Palacios snuck in for second in the photo finish in 1:59.57. Due to the slow first lap, the times were two seconds slower than Flores' winning time of 1:56.08 at the Region 1-3A meet.

The Jack Schuster family, of Muleshoe, will be honored on May 25 for participating in and maintaining the first GPCP contract in Texas.

The Schusters are being honored by the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservon District and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, formerly the Soil Conservation Service.

Registration for the 9:30 a.m. ceremony will begin at 9 a.m. at the Schuster home seven and a half miles south of Muleshoe on State Highway

A short tour of the farm will follow the ceremony. Refreshments also will be served.

women who have worked to conserve natural resources through six decades.

GPCP was created by Congress in 1956 to help farmers and ranchers in the Great Plains protect their light and fragile soils from erosion and to stabilize production in the drought-prone area.

The program offered both technical assistance from the SCS and cost-share funds.

"We farm sandy loam soil and had been trying to water it with row water equipment," Jack Schuster said. "We were wasting a lot of water and decided we were going to have to quit irrigating."

About that time, he said, the Great Plains porgram came along. He and his dad were able to continue what they had already started.

"GP got us into sprinkler irrigation and saved us a lot of water," Schuster said. "It changed the way we farmed."

In Texas, the Great Plains region includes 156 counties, or 93.6 million acres, in the western portion of the state. This region is well worth protecting. In Texas, it produces cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and grazing lands for cattle, sheep and goats.

The Schusters believed their

Great Plains farm was worth the investment. Their contract totaled \$12,728.35 and included irrigation pipe, pasture planting, range seedling, terraces and diversions.

Of the original work, the irrigation pipeline, terraces and range seedling have been maintained for nearly 40 years.

"Maintaining this contract and the conservation practices in it shows a sincere dedication to the land," said James Lutz, district conservationist in Muleshoe.

"Through GP we have applied conservation to millions of acres in Texas, but the Schusters exemplify the longterm commitment necessary to protect our natural resources for all times."

Currently, Texas has 1,637 active GP contracts in Texas covering 3,591,554 acres.

"GPCP has been one of the most popular and successful programs in Texas," Lutz said, with 92 percent of all contracts going to completion.

"Not only does the program many years. save and improve soil and water resources, it also increases income tax base on completed contracts," Lutz said.

"In one to seven years, this increase pays back the amount I've ever worked," said of cost-share funds received from the government."



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Green Thumb guide studies area history

Lurine Dudley of Muleshoe has been involved in Green Thumb Inc. almost ever since she heard about it.

Green Thumb, in this case, has nothing to do with plants but something to do with growing and prospering.

It is a non-profit organization providing part-time employment for economically disadvantaged seniors age 55 and older.

Dudley's job is to give guided tours at the Muleshoe Heritage Center. She provides a touch of history with a sense of humor as she takes people through the partially furnished buildings.

The complex includes a cookhouse from the Muleshoe Ranch; the Janes Ranch House from the Janes Ranch; a "carpeted, draped, kitchened depot" (made into a reception room for weddings or anniversaries and a club house for area organizations); and an Indian-built log cabin from Oklahoma, Dudley explains.

She says local organizations have been very supportive of the heritage center, with the Student Community Action Club (SCAC) made up of juniors and seniors from Muleshoe High School donating \$1,000 and the Thrift Store providing about \$1,000 a month.

will donate authentic furnishings to the complex and that others will become interested

Dudley was involved in Green Thumb in Plainview in the Retired Senior Volunteer

Program (RSVP). She also was in RSVP and Canyon Cares when she lived in Canyon.

Dudley says she would welcome an RSVP program in Muleshoe to provide a way of organizing seniors into a work force--especially as volunteers at the complex where she works 24 hours a week giving guided

Dudley has lived in Muleshoe for about a year. She says she enjoys living in small, sparsely settled towns in Texas and New Mexico.

"I keep trying to retire," she says. "But my Social Security doesn't provide enough for me to live on (comfortably)."

Dudley says she always has preferred smart work to hard work and considers herself to be above average in ability. She enjoys studying local history between tours so that her presentation will be accurate and colorful.

According to information provided by Green Thumb Program Aide Faye Martin, who works with the Texas/New Mexico programs, "Employers find that older workers bring maturity, stability, low absenteeism and a wealth of experience to the workplace."

Green Thumb participants may be assigned to local nonprofit agencies such as senior service centers, municipalities, Dudley hopes more people libraries, schools, day care centers, environmental projects and public works.

Green Thumb Inc. operates the Senior Community Service Employment Program under a grant with the Employment and Training Administration of the United States Department of Labor with federal funds appropriated under Title V of the Older Americans Act.

The employment program

for seniors age 55 and older has been sponsored by the National Farmers Union since 1965.

It currently operates in 132 Texas counties and two counties in New Mexico, providing almost 1,000 senior trainees with the opportunity to earn wages while contributing to the growth of local areas.

Green Thumb's priority is to encourage and assist program participants in developing and obtaining outside employment.

May is Older Americans Month--an appropriate time to focus on the contribution of the senior work force to business and industry.

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

The Mules added four more in the fifth to go up 10-4. The Rangers scored one each in the fifth and sixth to cut the margin to 10-6, but Perez hung in and shut down the Rangers the rest of the

way.

Muleshoe added an insurance run in the seventh.

It was the second bi-district appearance for the Mules in the past two years. But the result was significantly different than a loss to Sanford Fritch in last year's bi-district round.

"You could tell the difference in them," said Leps. "The playoff experience helped. They did the things they needed to do to win. boy I'm proud of them."



Perryton, the District 1-3A co-champion, ended the year







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
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
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Mighty 'M' **Band holds** banquet

Each year the directors select a senior who exhibits not only exceptional musical skill, but also leadership skills, and other qualities that contribute to the overall success of the band.


Clarkson, an outstanding student and leader who plays baritone for the Mighty M band, recently earned the honor of being accepted into the United States Marine Corps band.

Terry assured the Kiwanis Club that its financial investment in the scouting program is being put to good use.




