Dewey Estes who was alternate actually was the high individual with 146, but was disqualified because of being alternate for the contest. Other team members were Bobby Saul and Johnnie Helems. The overall team placing was third in beef cattle, fourth in swine and fourth in sheep.

4-H Livestock judging puts a premium on memory and speaking. Oral reasons are given on several classes. In the beef cattle division, Estes received a 46 and Burson a 45 on their reasons. This was the best talking that a group of Briscoe County boys had ever done. Perfect oral reasons are placed at 50.

The Panhandle's oldest resident, Mrs. Eleanor Jane Vaughan, died at 10 a. m. Monday in the home of a daughter, Mrs. W. A. Stephens of Silvertown.

Mrs. Vaughan would have been 106 years old today, (Thursday.)

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday in the Silvertown Baptist Church. Rev. G. A. Elrod, baptist pastor, officiated, assisted by Rev. James T. Patterson, pastor of the Silvertown Methodist Church. Burial was in Silvertown Cemetery with services under the direction of Douglas Funeral Home.

Mrs. Vaughan was born Eleanor Jane Spencer on January 30, 1852, on a Wood County farm, and she had vivid memories of the Civil War when she and her mother and five other children were left to tend the family farm while her father joined the Texas Scouts of the Confederacy. She and her mother planted and harvested with no tools except a garden hoe.

She was married to William M. Vaughan on September 8, 1886, in Bosque County and was a mother to his seven children by a previous marriage. Four children were born to Mrs. Vaughan, and two of these—Mrs. Stephens of Silvertown and Neal Vaughan of Oak View, California, are living.

The couple moved to Briscoe County in 1915 and following Mr. Vaughan's death in 1928, Mrs. Vaughan continued to live in Silvertown. She had made her home with Mrs. Stephens for several years.

As Mrs. Vaughan grew older, she became "Grandma Vaughan" to the entire community, and her birthdays were an occasion for a community celebration.

In 1955, when she was 103, at least 300 persons dropped in to extend birthday greetings, and Grandma Vaughan also received letters of congratulation from President Eisenhower and former President Herbert Hoover.

Mrs. Vaughan dictated a reply to the President's letter, thanking him and advising him to "trust God and do good... and all will be well with you in your arduous tasks."

She concluded: "I will be praying for you."

Grandma Vaughan believed in the power of prayer, also in the efficacy of hard work as the recipe for a long life. She had been a member of the Old Faith Presbyterian Church for 88 years.

Survivors include the son and daughter; one step son, Ed Vaughan of Silvertown; one sister, Mrs. Myrtle Moffett of Mangum, Oklahoma; 49 grandchildren and numerous great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren. In 1955, she estimated the number of her descendants at 165.

## P.T.A.'s to Celebrate Founders Day 11-Million Members Mark Organization's 61st Year

On February 17 the world's largest voluntary service organization will celebrate its 61st birthday.

This is the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, whose nearly eleven million members are active today in P.T.A.'s throughout the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii. They will mark the organization's Founders Day with a variety of activities aimed at strengthening and expanding parent-teacher work in their own communities.

Mrs. Rollin Brown, of Los Angeles, president of the National Congress, points out that these 43,000 P.T.A.'s have set the pattern for parent-teacher associations in areas where U.S. armed forces have established American communities overseas. And parents of school children in other nations have sought help from the National Congress in forming similar groups to promote education in their countries.

Founders Day activities, scheduled for February 17, will honor two women whose imagination and concern for children planted the seed for this still-growing organization.

It was in 1897 that Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst conceived the idea of a National Congress of Mothers to promote the health and welfare of children by helping their parents learn more about how to fulfill a child's physical and spiritual needs.

They worked hard to interest other women in their aims and approached the date they had set for the organizing meeting with hopes of seeing a hundred or so delegates arrive at Washington's Arlington Hotel. But "if only twenty-five are there," admitted Mrs. Birney, "I shall be satisfied."

More than two thousand men and women turned out!

Their enthusiastic reception of the aims, as outlined by the Founders, and of the lectures, discussions, and conferences that made up the first meeting set the pace for a great national movement. Soon state congresses were founded, and before long the original "mothers' congress" was broadened to include the

concept of parents working with teachers.

Since that founding meeting, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers has written an impressive record of achievement. It includes these activities in behalf of children:

Donated hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships to students planning to enter the teaching profession.

Initiated a program for the periodic health appraisal of well children from birth through high school—an extension of the Summer Round-Up campaigns under which nearly three million preschool children have received physical examinations.

Promoted successfully thousands of school building projects, including preliminary surveys, educational campaigns, and school bond issues.

Alerted the public to violations of child labor statutes, stressed the need for improved juvenile detention facilities, and supported sound adoption laws.

Helped establish child-care centers for children of working mothers and worked to raise the standards of all child-care establishments.

Established and supported public kindergartens until public support could be secured.

Pioneered in establishing and maintaining thousands of hot school lunch programs long before the public in general became aware of their importance.

Helped to keep the schools open during the years of war and depression—an achievement for which it received a special citation from the National Education Association.

**LOCAL SCD SUPERVISOR RETURNS FROM CONVENTION**

Glynn Morrison, of Quitaque returned Saturday from the annual state association meeting of Soil Conservation Supervisors. Mr. Morrison reported that it was the best meeting held thus far with a record attendance of 790 people.

There were 286 supervisors from soil conservation districts throughout Texas. The previous record attendance was 211. Others in attendance included bankers, preachers, legislators and professional conservationist.

Some of the highlights of the convention included a non-political speech by Gov. Daniels and an address by the well known J. A. Fox, Circleville philosopher of the Soil and Water Magazine.

Mr. Fox says "I know conservation Pays—I've seen my neighbors try it."

Mr. Morrison reports that this was a working convention and relates progress in watershed work in Texas. There are 132 watersheds in the state that are tentatively approved.

17 Watersheds completed; 13 are ready to start work; 19 watersheds have not organized their water improvement and control district.

He reports that our own Kent Creek Watershed should have been number one in the 13 ready to start.

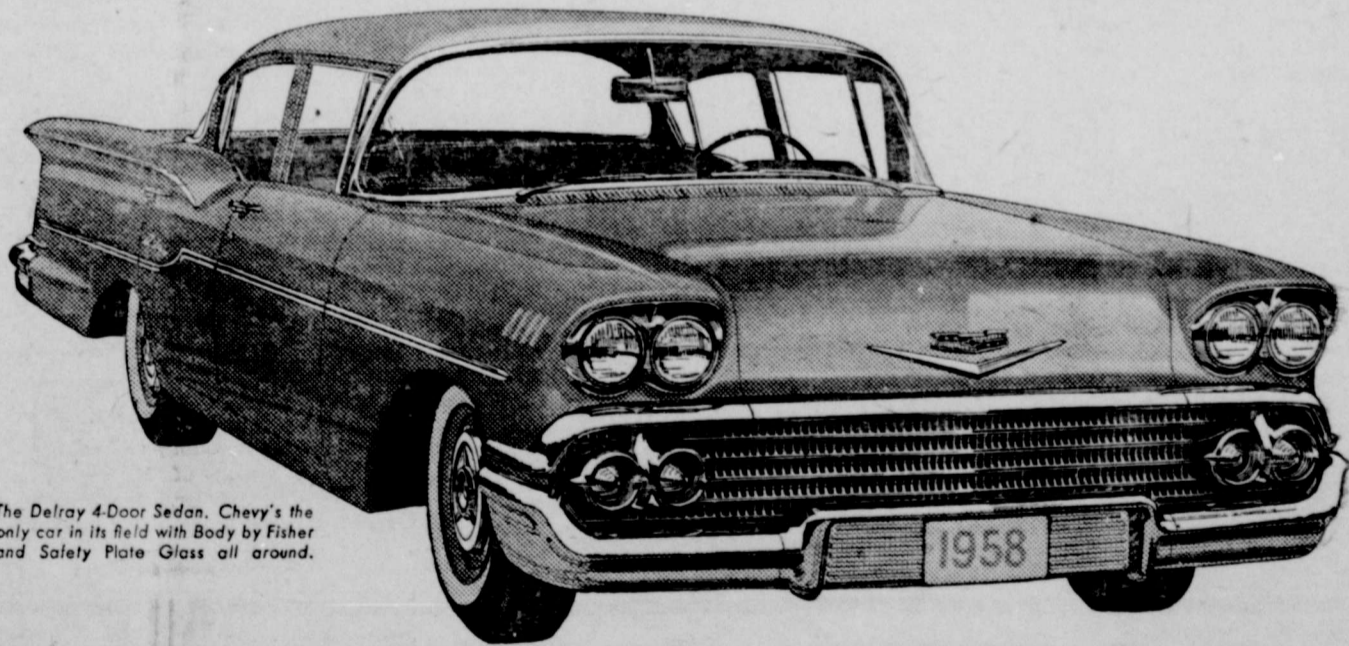

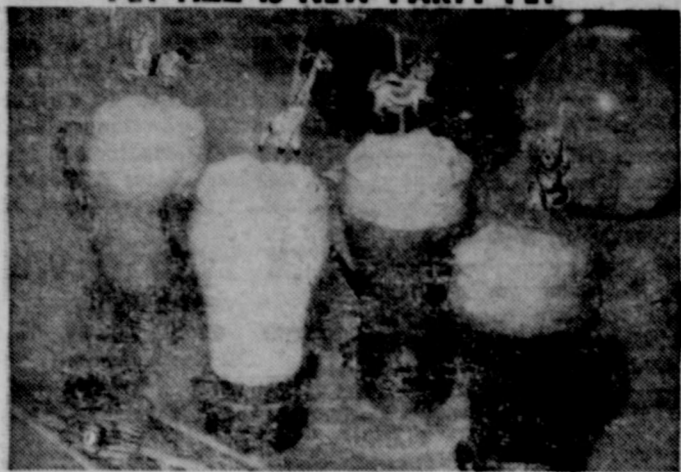

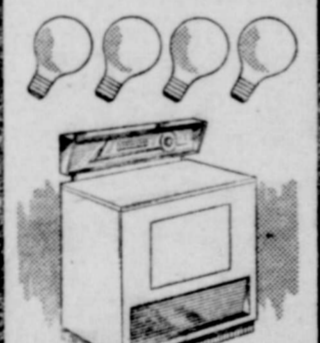
