Former Designates March 3-7, 1958 School Week

Thirty years of outstanding progress by Future Farmers of Texas were acknowledged by Governor Price Daniel recently as he designated February 22-March 1 as official FFA Week. In presenting the proclamation to Billy Penn, State FFA President and George Hurt, State Director of Vocational Agriculture, the Governor praised the work of the Future Farmers who are studying the science of agriculture and who are striving to continually improve the agricultural economy of the State. The Texas Future Farmers have been extremely successful in developing leadership, promoting good citizenship, and inspiring patriotism among its members, the Governor said. Billy Penn, State FFA President from Lufkin, received the proclamation in behalf of the 36,000 active members in 904 FFA Chapters in the State. George Hurt pointed out that the Future Farmer organization is composed of boys who are studying vocational agriculture in the public high schools as preparation for careers in farming, ranching and related occupations. Hurt credited the teachers of vocational agriculture, the school administration, and the lay people where vocational agriculture is taught, for the success of the FFA program in the State.

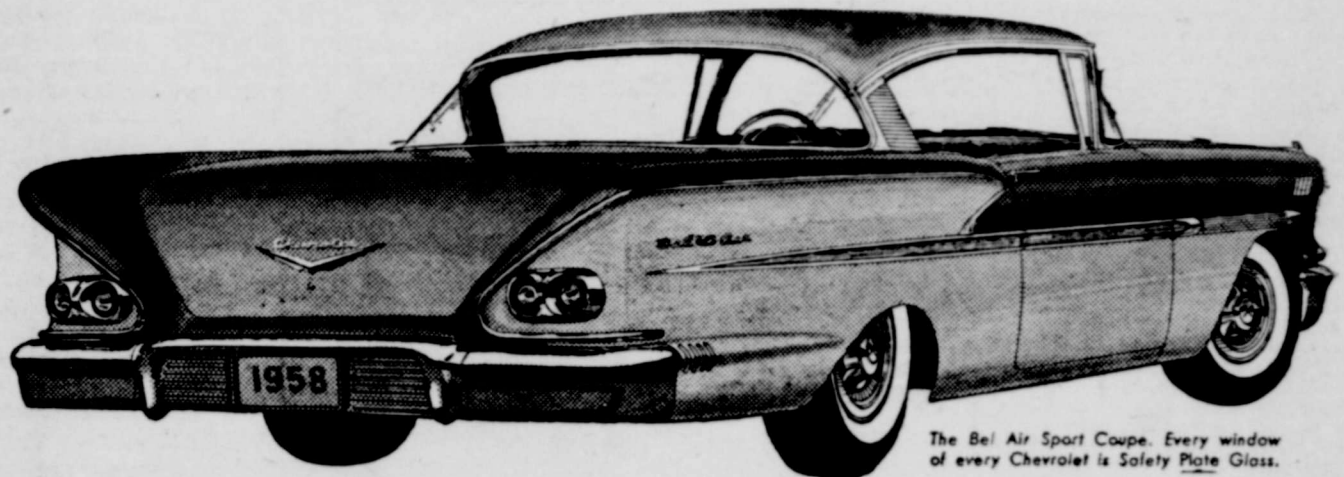

Newest 'Split' Has 2-Story Look

The luxury of space, privacy, and good looks at the lowest possible cost was the architect's goal in planning this unusual split-level house.

Its designer, Rudolph Matern, of Jamaica, N. Y., calls it a "split level in reverse." The house has a luxurious 2-story appearance from the street, yet it incorporates such split-level advantages as compact space, lower building and maintenance costs, and more convenient room arrangement.

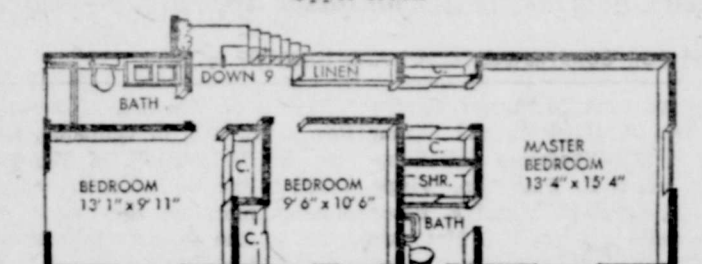
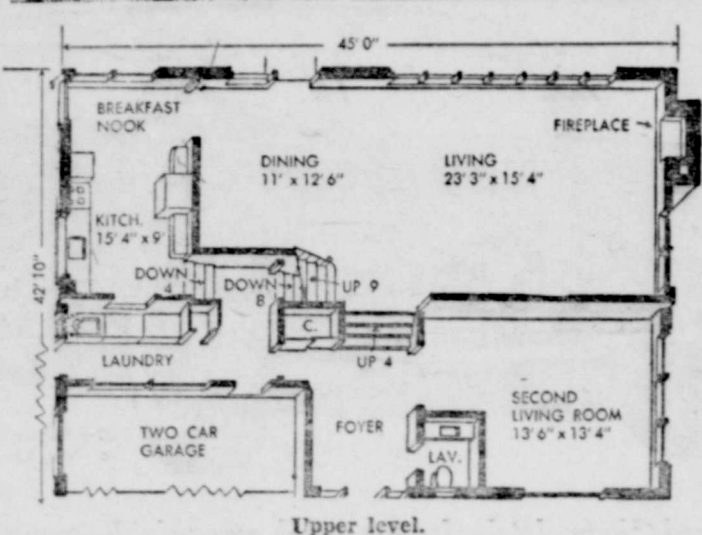
On the outside, Matern has given the house an appearance of greater length by combining a low-pitched roof with broad clapboard siding and by flanking the windows with louver shutters of ponderosa pine.

The architect specified asphalt shingles to give the home-owner economy and dependability, plus a wide choice of colors. In addition, the asphalt shingles can be applied safely on the low pitch of both the "hockey stick" roof over the main house and the hip-style roof on the combination garage-entryway.

Inside, the house is full of surprises. It has a big living room with exposed-beam ceiling, a fireplace hollowed out of a wall of bricks, a room-long wall of windows at the rear, and a floor-to-ceiling window at the side.

There are two full bathrooms, a lavatory off the entrance foyer, a 15-foot kitchen with breakfast nook, and an extra living room that can be used as a den or TV room.

It's a house designed for comfort, and in keeping with this theme Matern has specified thick mineral wool insulation throughout—four inches in ceilings over the upper level and in the sloping ceiling over the lower level areas at the rear, plus three inches in walls. As the plan shows, a portion of the unheated garage is located under the sleeping level. Here the floor
