## Pilot Injured In Air Crash Here Tuesday; DelMar In Hospital

### Export Agency Formed By U. S. Grain Producers

An export marketing program to expand sales abroad for U. S. grain farmers was announced this week by 19 major farmer-owned regional grain marketing associations.

They joined in the establishment of the Producers Export Company, incorporated in Delaware. It has authorized capital of \$5 million and will concentrate on marketing and shipping sales abroad of U. S. grains and oilseeds, emphasizing quality.

The announcement in this area was made by J. Frank Triplett, General Manager of the Producers Export Corporation with headquarters at Amarillo, which serves farmers of Texas, New Mexico, and a portion of S. W. Oklahoma. He is a member of the original group of directors of PEC, and his organization is one of the 19 associations subscribing capital in its formation. Mr. Triplett was also President of the Board and Chairman of the Executive Committee.

The regional associations now have storage space in excess of 215 million bushels. Together the local and regional associations have aggregate warehousing space in excess of a billion bushels.

In all, more than one million farmers now utilize their associations for grain merchandising and storage services in all of the principal grain and oilseed producing areas.

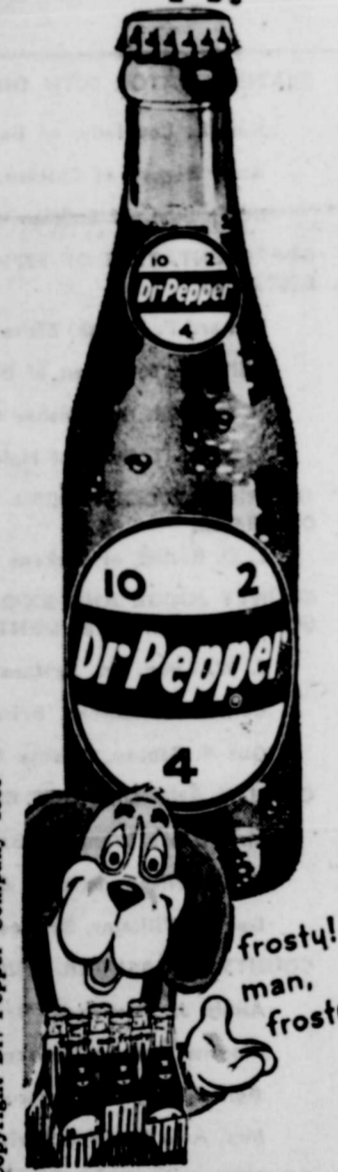

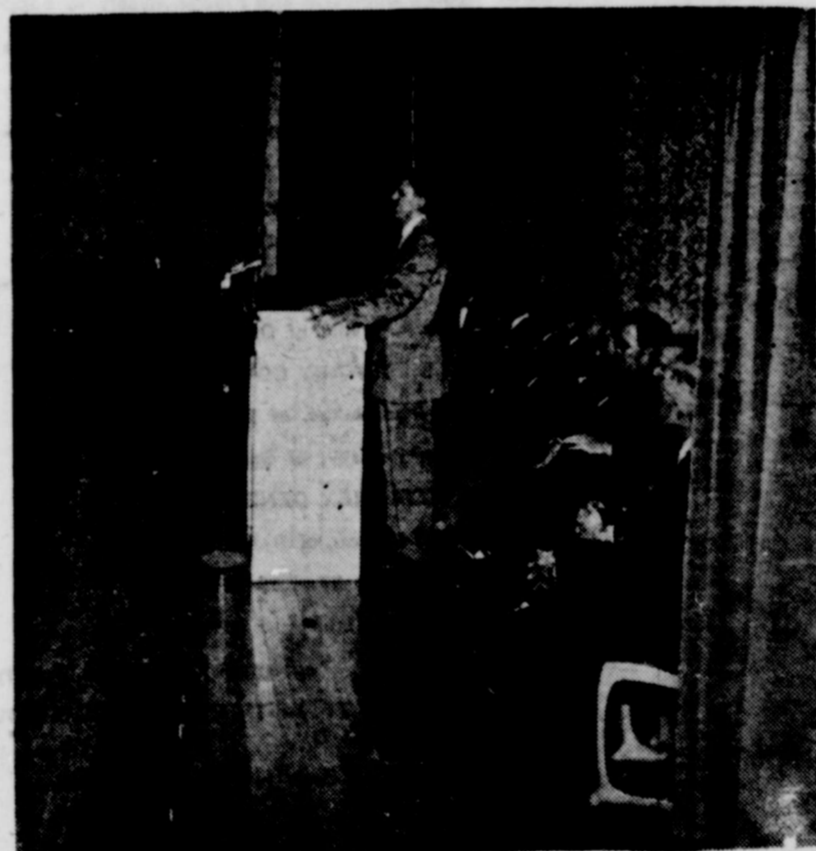

A dozen leaders in the district were programmed to speak. They, typically, represented a cross-section of Plains life.

One was the Senator's pastor. He lauded the honoree for his fight against liquor, narcotics, and lewd literature. "Senator Rogers is always on the right side of every moral issue," said the churchman. "He wants and works for a high moral atmosphere to prevail."

A county teachers' association president called attention to Senator Rogers' work in behalf of public education. A Memphis druggist related that Rogers has always had an "open ear" for the small businessman.

A district judge praised the quality of legislation introduced and supported by the Senator. A mayor and insurance man emphasized the value of Andy Rogers' fight against corruption in Austin, particularly in connection with the insurance investigations.

Said an official of one of the veterans' organizations: "Andy told us for a long time there was serious trouble in the veteran's land program. He was right. And when this was cleaned up, Andy worked hard to see that this good program was not scrapped."

A newspaper editor and publisher, a former president of the Panhandle Press Association, observed: "This is the first time I've ever heard of people traveling so far just for a state senator. But it's fitting," he added, "for Andy Rogers for a job well done."

Spokesmen for the major farm organizations expressed approval of the Senator's record on farm-to-market roads, local ownership of underground water, rural electrification, and other legislation of concern to agriculture. Said the farm spokesman who rounded out the program:

"In view of all Andy Rogers has done for agriculture, I'm amazed to hear from the other speakers here this evening that he's had time for such effective work for so many others, too." The farmer concluded:

"Andy Rogers must use a six-row political tractor!" The Senator acknowledged the praise-filled evening with obvious humility. He spoke humbly, too, of his "close personal friend" — Lewis B. Taylor of Austin and Waco—who had been stricken with a fatal heart attack there a few minutes earlier.

To the series of "thank you's" which had been expressed during the evening, Rogers responded:

"What's been accomplished, you've done. The credit belongs to you, to my parents, and to my wife who have all supported me so strongly. I really feel like I owe you all an appreciation dinner."

## JAPAN "BUYS AMERICAN" IN TEXAS AND IN ALL THE 48 STATES

A Survey Shows How Each State Benefited from Trade with Japan in 1957

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A report provocatively entitled "Japan Buys American in All 48 States" has just been released by the United States-Japan Trade Council.

The 12-page report of charts, graphs and text summarizes an exhaustive state-by-state survey. The survey's purpose was to estimate how much "each of the states shared immediately in the benefits from the \$1,221,350,000 worth of commodities exported by the United States to Japan in 1957."

Texas with \$105 million worth of commodities was the top exporter, but every other state made substantial shipments (see map).

The report points out that, although Japan is fairly well known as our best customer second only to Canada, not many Americans realize the nature and value of exports to Japan from their own state.

The 10 chief commodities exported to Japan in 1957 were (in millions of dollars): Iron and steel mill products \$241.1, Raw cotton \$217.3, Industrial machinery \$121, Grains \$113, Soybeans & other oilseeds \$63, Petroleum & products \$59.1, Bituminous coal \$53.3, Copper & products \$49.4, Chemicals \$36.7, Inedible animal oils \$19.6.

In releasing these figures, the Trade Council made two important points: First, that Japan's U. S. purchases have shot up dramatically, by 300 per cent, since 1950 - and not simply in several but in all categories of products; second, that Japan in 1957 bought more than twice as much from, as it sold to, the United States.

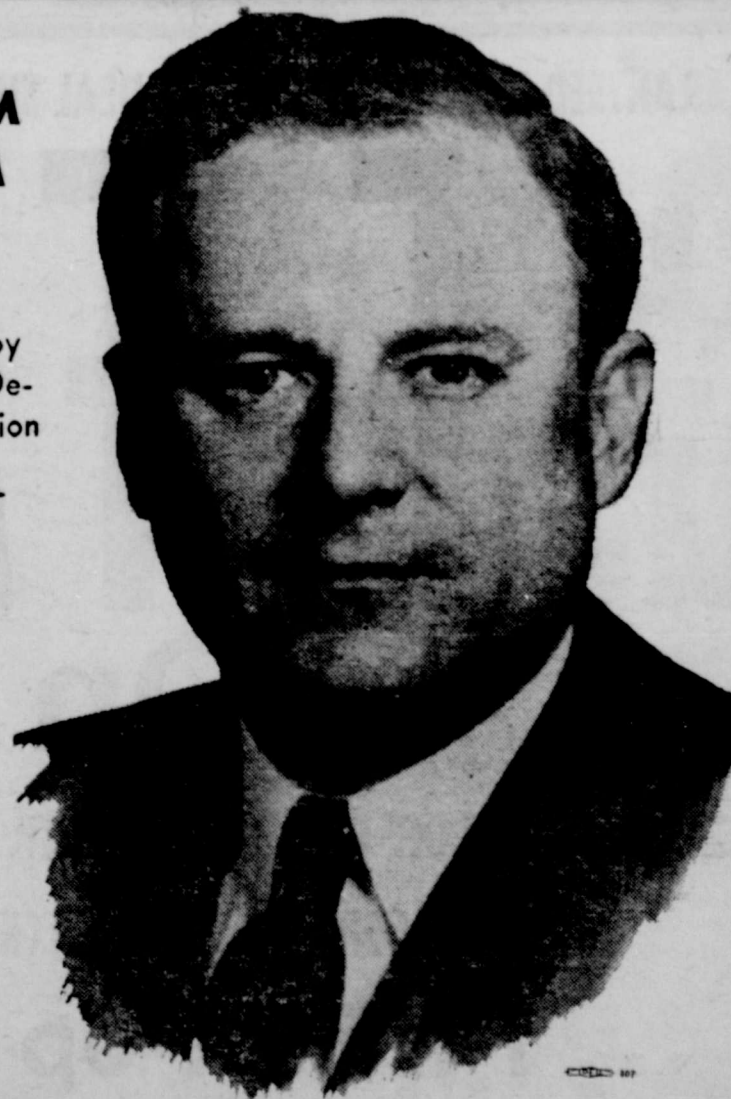
