"More than a car—more than a truck", the El Camino, new to the Chevrolet line for 1959, combines bold, fleet passenger car styling, comfort, handling, and appointments with highly acceptable truck utility.

The El Camino, which goes on display at Chevrolet dealerships October 16, is designed as a true dual-purpose vehicle for personal transportation and for hauling light or bulky loads up to 1150 pounds.

In its lithe styling with low belt line, large windshield raked back into the slim-lined roof, cadet visor projecting over the sweep-around rear window, and light airy lines, the El Camino carries a distinct passenger car concept. The extensive glass area, measuring 4121 square inches, affords controlled visibility to front, sides and rear.

Interior appointments and styling also bear the passenger car hallmark of quality and refinement. New seat treatments, belt-high wall trim, deep contoured instrument panel and distinctive steering wheel design are featured. Seats, sidewalls and headlinings are of leather grain or pattern vinyl which is easily kept sparkling clean. Color keyed to the exterior, they are executed in interesting designs, tones and embossments.

In its durable integrated cargo body, the El Camino assumes its versatile pickup truck character. Deeply contoured outer side panels blend into a unified extension of cab lines, and steel inner panels

## FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR JESS COVINGTON TUESDAY

The two-tone design consists of one color on the roof, upper pillar area and upper rear deck, with the rest of the vehicle in the second color.

## Medical Care Started At Local Hospital on Tuesday Afternoon

Dr. Nichols, of Plainview, was at the local hospital Tuesday afternoon to see patients who were in need of medical care. Mrs. James Whitfield will be at the hospital all day during the week and Dr. Nichols will make his second call Thursday afternoon. This will give Silvertown medical service twice weekly, and a nurse on the job each day.

Those in charge of cleaning-up the hospital stated they lacked two rooms having all the rooms redecorated. To everyone who have helped in any way, by labor, or gifts, they are very appreciative. Those in charge stated they still needed more donations for necessary equipment they are buying for the hospital.

Following is instructions to patients and their families prepared by Dr. Nichols, which you are requested to read carefully:

"In the first place we want to welcome you as a participant in our plan. We are doing our utmost to bring good medical care to your area.

"Unfortunately we can as yet give you only part-time coverage in person; we will have to fill in with telephone management of your problems between times.

"Anytime you wish, day or night, you can talk with one of us by calling Plainview Capital 4-2764. If the clinic is closed an answering service will tell you the telephone number of the doctor on call that night.

"Now note this please: If you ever call after hours and fail to get an answer it will only mean the answering device is busy with another call. Simply keep calling Capital 4-2764 and in a few minutes your call will be answered.

"We prefer that most of your calls be made through your local nurse—to save you money and to help us—her clinic number is—her home number is 3721. Call her first except in a few emergencies and she will relay pertinent information to us. Then through her, or through the druggist, or both we will try to help you.

"In case of poisoning: Call the nurse, she has proper equipment and exact instructions.

"In case of hemorrhage: Call the nurse. For emergency transfusions we are providing blood type files for your community.

"We want to encourage as many as possible to have their blood typed. For a charge of \$3.00 the nurse will make this determination, will furnish you with a blood type card and will add your name to the file if you are willing to donate blood. Those who have been typed elsewhere should bring in their cards so we can add their names to the file.

"As soon as the file is sufficiently built we will put a notice in the paper, at which time it would be wise for each family to select the names and telephone numbers of four or five potential donors for each type in it. Then we will know exactly where to turn in case of emergency.

"In case of infection: Here your local nurse can perform some of her most valuable functions. Call her or go to the local clinic when possible because usually the first thing we want is a blood count. For these reasons—not only do we learn much about the severity and possible danger of the infection, but we learn much of its type. Say you have a respiratory infection with fever, before, we can treat it sensibly we need to know whether it is viral or bacterial in origin. The blood count tells us: viruses are lower it and cause certain changes in cell type; bacteria elevate it and the cell type changes are different.

"And though blood counts add something to the expense of handling a case, we usually can effect

## 1119 BALE NUMBER GINNED LOCALLY EARLY WEDNESDAY

The local gins reported a total of 1119 bales of cotton ginned up to early Wednesday morning. Cotton pulling has been slowed down this week due to trace of moisture each night, enough to hinder gathering cotton. There is also a shortage of pullers in this area.

Moisture has also hindered the gathering of the grain crop. Combines are unable to operate until noon due to the moisture. The farmers are in need of dry weather to give them a chance to harvest one of the largest cotton and grain crops ever to be grown in the history of the county.

a return saving for the patient by prescribing more accurately; perhaps lesser amounts of an antibiotic given for a shorter period.

"Now concerning prescriptions we have gone to considerable trouble to work out a master list of those most used, and each of us—doctors, nurse, and druggist, will have a copy handy at all times. Then when we prescribe by telephone it will be by numbers which we think will much reduce any possibility of error. Each of us will always make a written record of medications given so comparisons can catch any discrepancies, also the druggist will always write out a copy of every prescription which will then be sent to the doctor for his signature.

"Please note this about antibiotics given for infections: In many instances we will deliberately halve the amount usually given, that is we will order a two days supply instead of the usual four. If that suffices, good, the patient has saved some money. But the main reason we are doing this is so no one will keep taking an ineffective drug when after a couple of days it is not doing the job. So frequently, to really kill out infections and prevent relapse antibiotic prescriptions will need to be extended or even changed. Toward this end we will ask the nurse to call you after you have taken such a medicine for 48 hours. But if she got busy and failed to contact you or if you have no telephone, please call her as soon as you approach the end of an antibiotic prescription. Please do this without fail even if you have made an apparent recovery.

"We especially want to urge all to have full immunization coverage. Today when immunizations are so sure, safe, and inexpensive we are foolish to take chances. In this connection we want to point out that as long as we bring itinerant 'bracero' workers into our communities we will be exposed to typhoid carriers, and on occasion may even encounter smallpox."

After the program a short meeting was conducted by Mrs. C. D. Bomar.

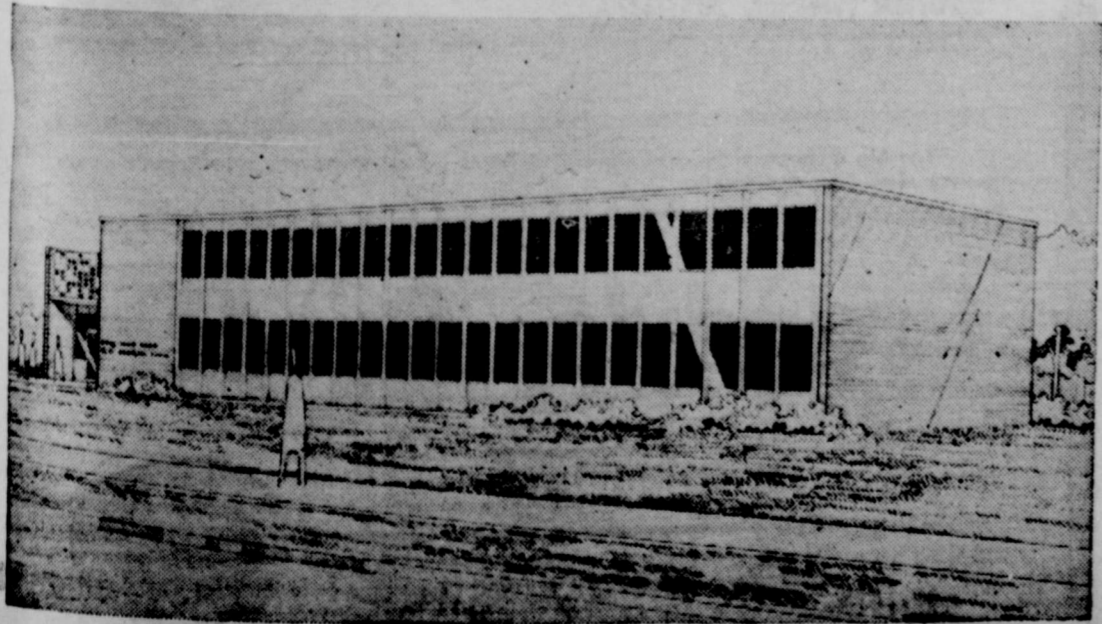

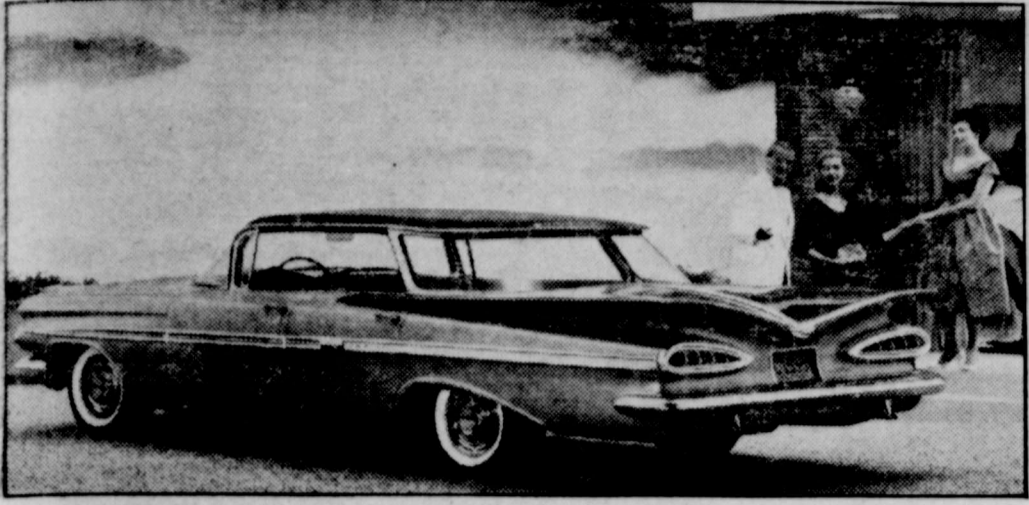

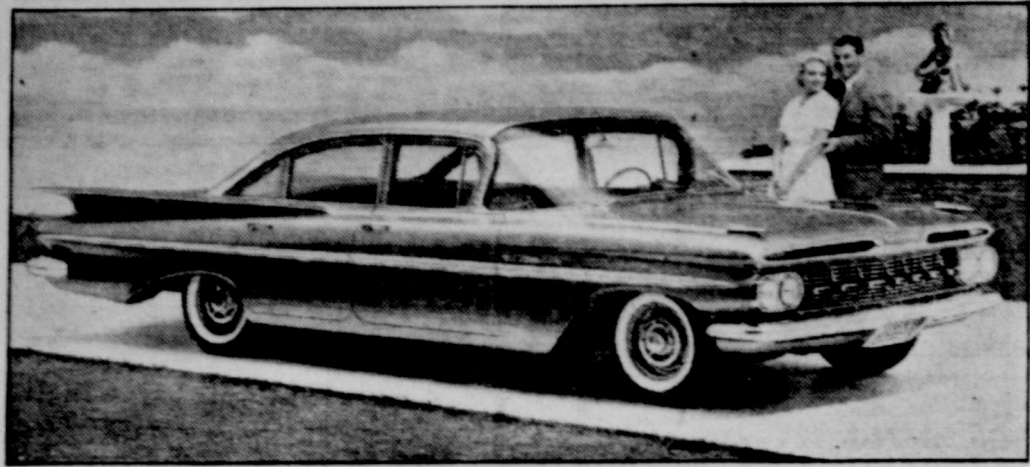

Fuel injection, Chevrolet's mechanical innovation of 1957, is specified in

Chevrolet has incorporated increased luxury, comfort and safety in the cockpit of Corvettes. Seats have a more pronounced "bucket" effect. **CITIES TO VOTE ON WATER BONDS FOR MULTI-CITY WATER SUPPLY**

Haskell, Texas — Development of a multi-city municipal water supply by the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority hinges on a \$3,800,000 bond election to be held Saturday in Haskell, Rule, Munday and Goree.

The four towns compose the NCTM Water Authority, created by an act of the last legislature.

If the bond issue is authorized by a majority vote in each of the four towns, the authority plans to build a 25,000 acre feet reservoir by constructing a dam on Miller Creek, about 12 miles east of Munday, to supply municipal water for the four towns.

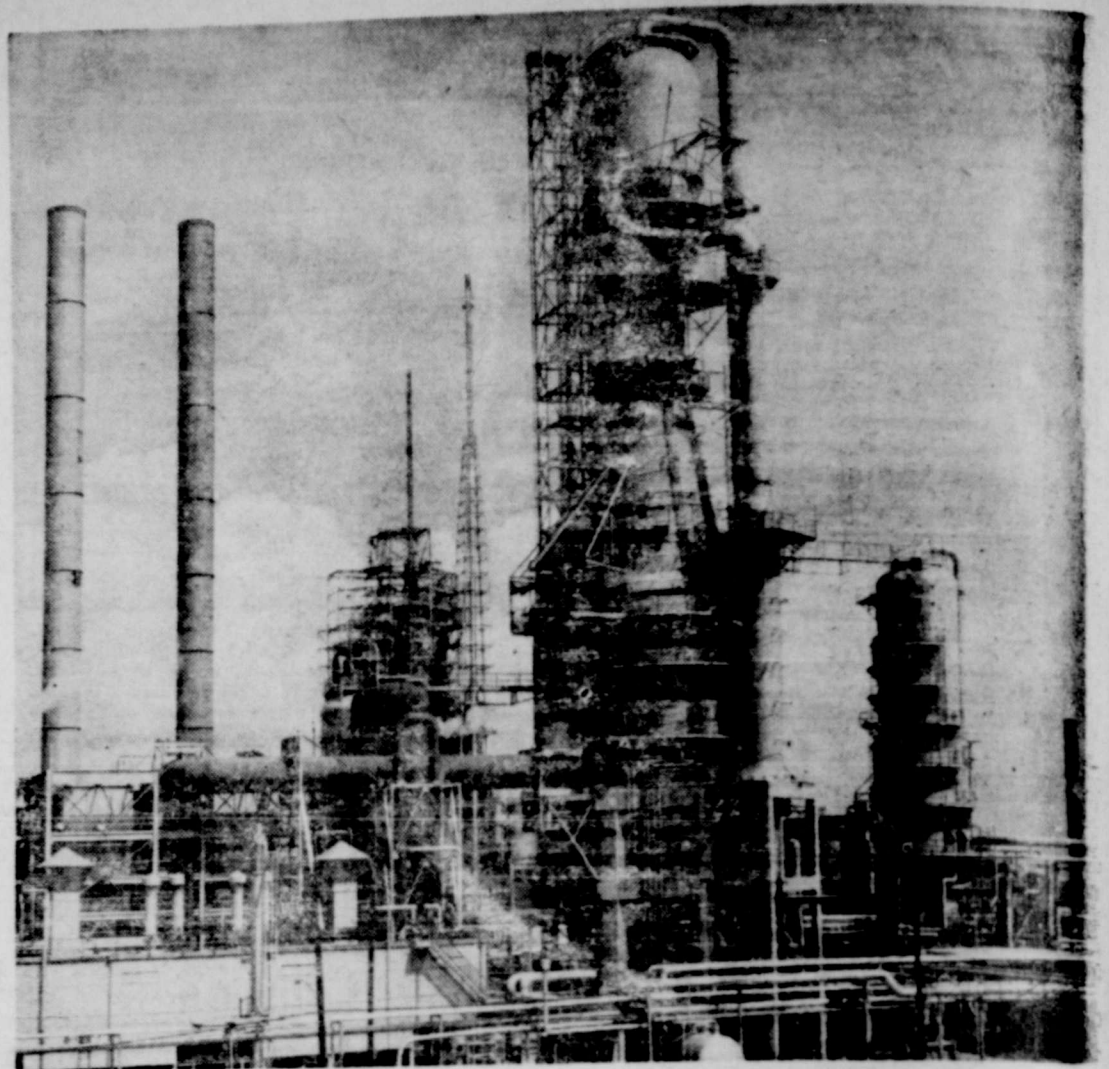
The \$3.8 million project would also include pumping and filtering plants, together with pipeline system which would deliver filtered, treated water to each town.

It is estimated that approximately 70 per cent of the cost of the project will be paid from net operating revenues from sale of water to member towns in the authority. The remainder will come from an ad valorem tax to be levied by the authority.

A gradual increase in revenues is anticipated which will eliminate the ad valorem tax within a few years, according to W. R. Johnson, Haskell, who is president of the Authority.

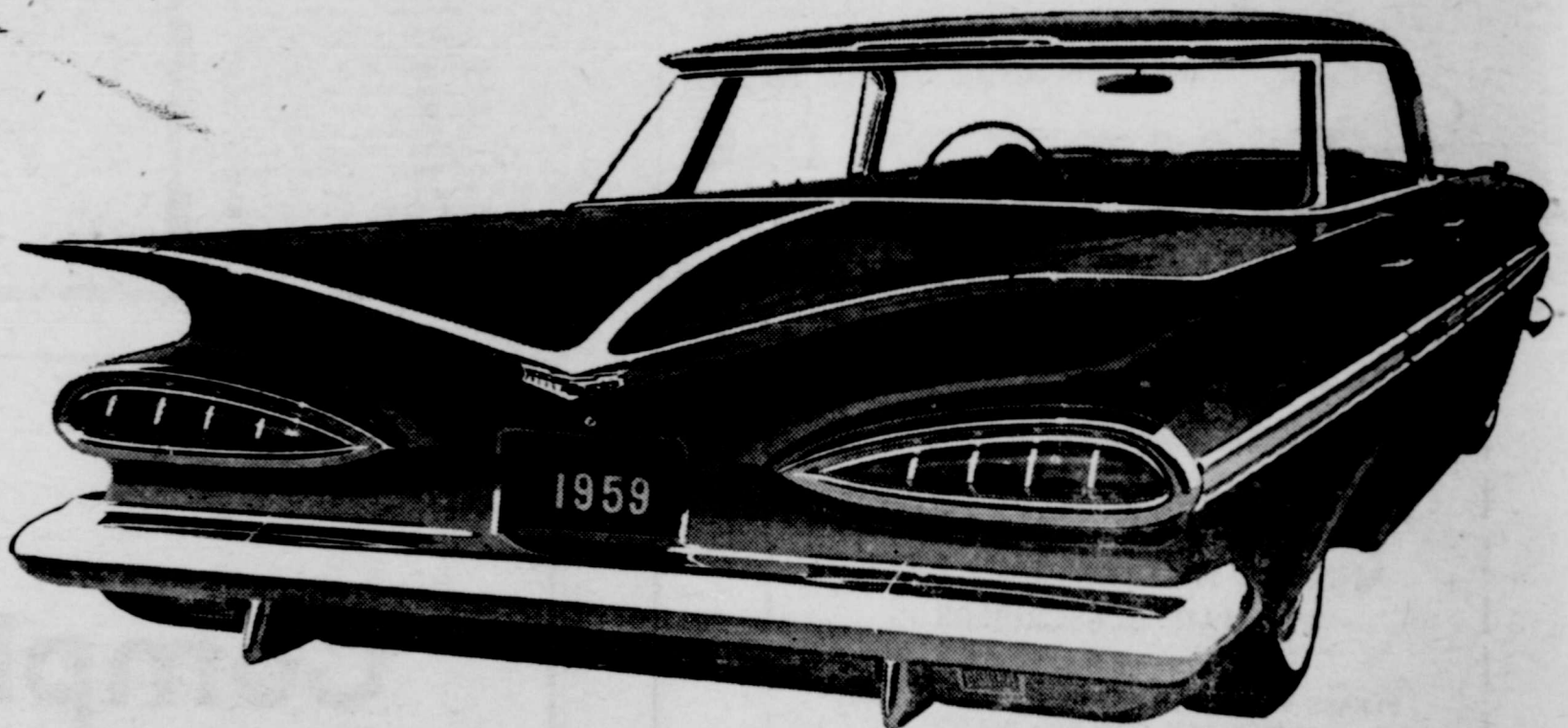

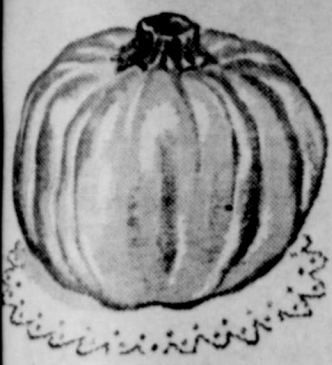
