The boys ran hard, hit hard, and played their heart out before a capacity crowd at Owl Stadium. The Owl's offense was sparked by James R. Brown behind a hard blocking line. McWilliams, Dyrle Maples, and John Schott were also outstanding in the Owls' backfield. Dave Schott did some excellent punting to get the owls out of trouble several times, but Crosbyton's Big Eleven was too much for our freshman year in this conference. J. E. Patton, Wendall Patterson, along with the rest of the Owls forward wall were on their toes the entire contest.

The Chiefs offense was sparked by Charlie Moore at quarter back on a straight T. He did some outstanding passing along with his sneaky ball handling.

The Owls are now looking forward to the contest next Friday night at Ralls. They need your support. Come along with us and receive a treat.

If the boys continue to play the rest of the season as they did last Friday night, some of our conference veterans will be looking up to their little freshman conference brother (The Owls) by the end of the season.

Friday night, October 24, the Silverton Owls will meet the highly rated Ralls Jackrabbits in a conference 4-A football game at Ralls.

This will be the second conference game for both teams. Last week the Jackrabbits were defeated by the Idalou Wildcats by a score of 14-8, and the Owls were defeated by the Chiefs from Crosbyton 22-6.

The improved Silverton Owls will be out to upset the early season favorites of conference 4-A. The Owls are working hard this week in preparation for this district contest and barring injuries during the week, the Owls should be at full strength.

In last weeks game played at Owl Stadium against the Crosbyton Chiefs, the Owls played a good hard game and looked much better than in the previous non-conference tilts. The owls offense showed improvement and it is hoped that more improvement will be shown this week. Behind the good blocking of the forward wall, the Owl backs were able to combine their running attack with their passing game to roll up a total of 237 yards and 14 first downs. However, they were unable to keep a sustained drive together long enough to produce more than six points.

In other conference games this past week the Petersburg Buffaloes were defeated by the Hale Center team, Idalou beat Ralls, and the Owls were defeated by the Crosbyton Chiefs.

Dewey's steer was a 1015 pound steer that was bred by the Lemons Ranch of Silverton. He placed 12 in the middle weight class. There were 25 steers in this class, all of which were exceptionally good.

Joe Seay's calf was a 900 pound angus that won a blue ribbon. This meant that the steer was graded a prime in the commercial steer division. There was only 69 out of 260 that rated the blue award.

In addition to this, Joe was in the showmanship finals. To get in the finals he was the top showmanship winner in his class.

There was over 300 steers in the show this year. The junior show had some of the best steers that had ever been in the State Fair.

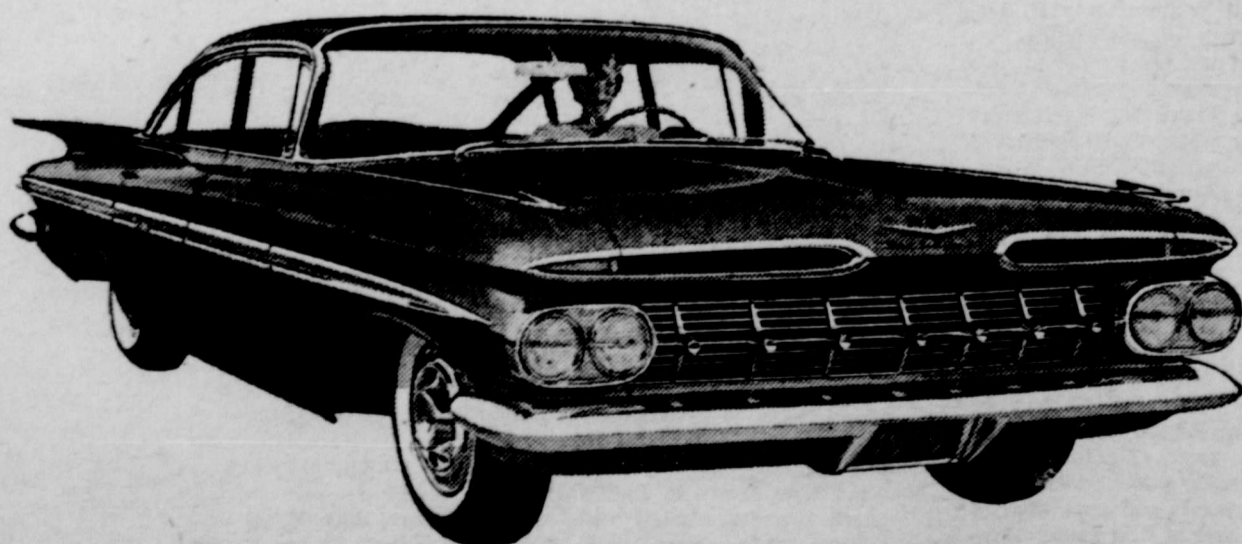

Gilbert Elms Mentioned In "The Cattleman"

Gilbert Elms, San Jacinto, was featured recently in "The Cattleman" under the heading "Top Grass; Top Quality Cattle."

The San Jacinto farmer was recognized for his conservation practices that has produced a fertile two section pasture that has held up through the drought years when other pastures failed from lack of moisture. The sub-head stated, "By leaving a good growth of grass on the land at all times this rancher is making maximum use of rainfall."

The article stated that the ranch was in excellent condition and that due to an excellent grass coverage, rains 'walk' away instead of 'run' off.

Elms' program started in 1948, when he began practicing deferred grazing of each section pasture for six months each year. He added a couple of water wells, broke out additional acres, constructed ponds, and since 1958, has planted supplemental pasture crops.

This past winter he grazed his herd on 40 acres of wheat.

Elms never has over 50 mother cows and two bulls. The calves are dropped in the winter and usually sold in June. During this short period the calves will weigh between 400 and 450 pounds. If a ready market is not available the calves are grazed on one of the numerous lush pastures.

In the winter a 3 to 4 inch blue blizzard holds snow and rain and is also a contributing factor in reducing buffalo grass.

Elms was the first cooperator in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District to sign a contract for the Great Plains Conservation Program. His plans include construction of 7,000 feet of net wire diversions to spread water, four erosion control dams, seed an old 280 acre field with blue grama.
