## Senior Citizen Housing Nears Completion

### Applications Being Accepted Monday

Jim Hartline, Executive Director of the new senior citizens' housing complex announced Friday that the units will be completed in approximately two weeks. Other members of the Muleshoe Housing Authority are: Harmon Elliott, Chairman; Jim Cox, vice Chairman; Jesse Leal, Buck Campbell and Myron Pool, Board Members.

Applications for occupancy will be taken on September 3 and 4 between the hours of 9 a.m. to 12 noon both days at the City Hall.

In order to complete an application, persons interested in occupancy should be prepared to furnish proof of income and their social security number.

Hartline commented: "These units are now in the final stages of completion, and we anticipate occupancy being possible within the next two to three weeks."

The housing units are either one or two bedroom apartments, with cook stove and refrigerator furnished. Standard facilities also include refrigerated air and central heat. All rooms are carpeted with the exception of the kitchen.

A community room is also a feature of the new complex. It is furnished with a stove and refrigerator and will be available to the occupants for parties or family gatherings that are

too large for their apartments.

A community laundry will also be available to senior citizens for their convenience.

In addition to the niceties available, four of the units are built entirely for handicapped persons. All kitchen and bath facilities are lowered for easy access.

Mule fans were favored with various offensive and defensive play enactments performed by the 1981 Mules with a running commentary by head coach Windy Williams at the annual "Meet the Mules" night held last Tuesday evening in Benny Douglas Stadium.

Williams introduced the Mules to the fans and explained their symbol for this year which is a black dot. Williams elaborated: "This black dot is the symbol of unity, one for all and all for one. We are a unit and function together. This dot is to remind everyone that we are a close knit team and will work that way." Williams also stated that the Mules of 1981 will be known as the "Angry Black" - "not in the school halls, not in the class rooms - not at home --- but when we take the football field it will be with that attitude. We're going to be angry -- and hungry for winning."

Although the Mules are coming into the 1981 season with out at least 20 of the lettermen of 1980, they are still picked to challenge Littlefield's Wildcats for the District 2A title. Although there is inexperience in the team of 81, Williams intends to make up the difference with a host of talented players.

Monty Hysinger, a 5-11, 175 pound senior will be moved from the quarterback position to tailback, where his running ability will be an asset to the team. He will team in the backfield with wingback Mark Denny, and Hector Orozco.

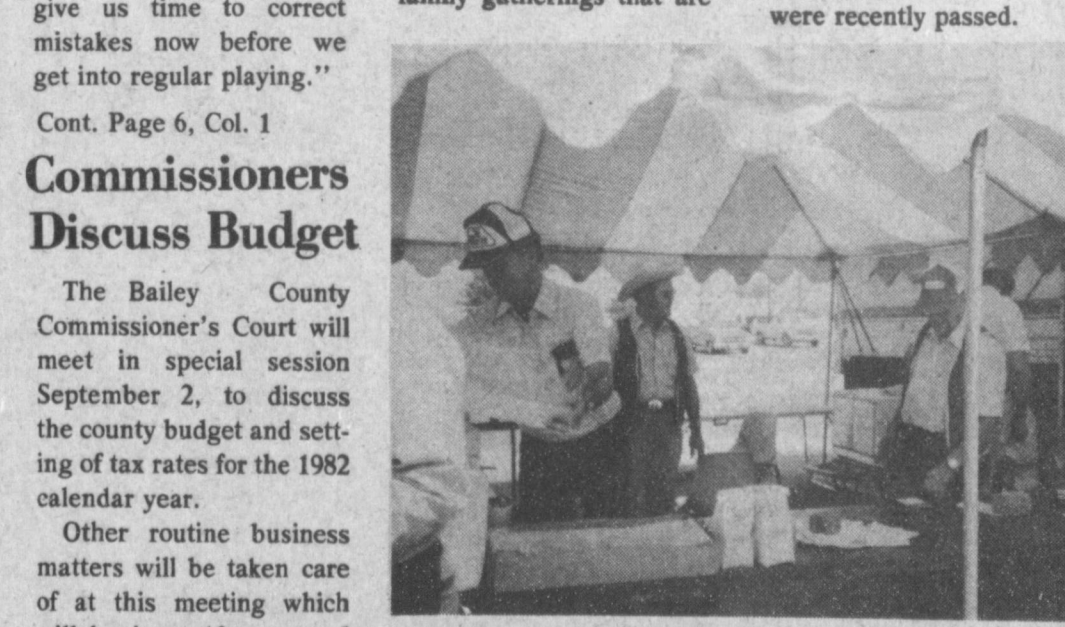

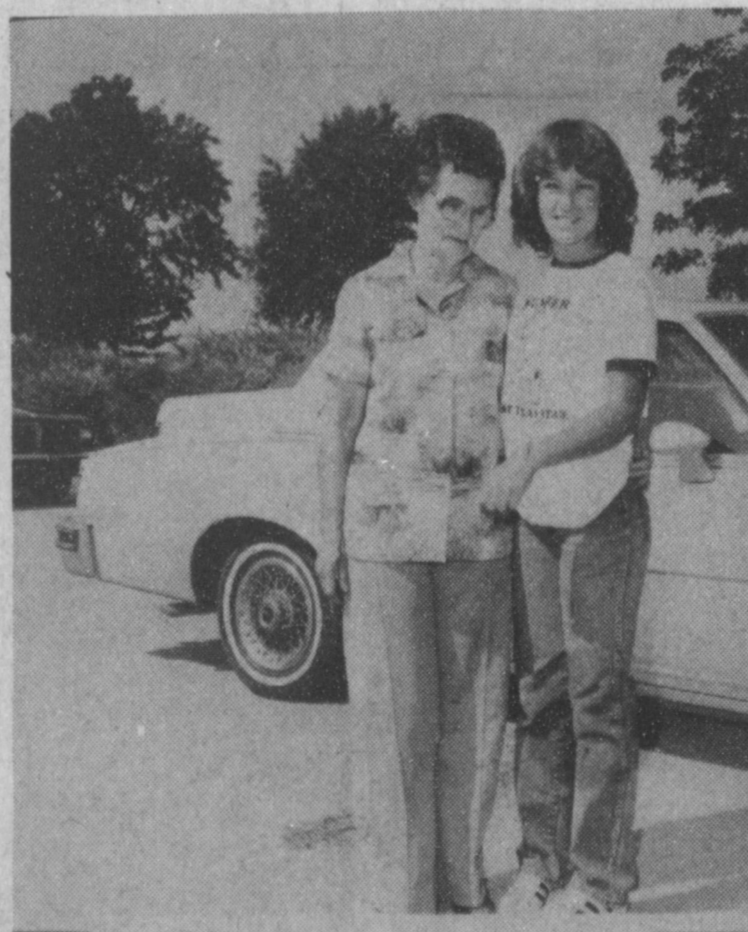

In the same year, the wheat crop was valued at slightly over \$9 billion. Although much of the nation's corn production is centered in the "Corn Belt", the grain is, in fact, grown in virtually every state in the Union. And, although the actual production and dollar figures are a source of surprise to many visiting foreign agriculture specialists and economists, it is no surprise that the United States far outpaces the rest of the world in corn output. No other country even approaches the figures, with major foreign output centered in wheat or rice. Although wheat is nearly synonymous with the word food here and the world over, U. S. corn production overshadows wheat production nearly threefold.

**Texas Corn Growers Ask Sale Restrictions**

Texas corn and grain sorghum producers recommended to Agriculture Secretary John Block that sales of government-held corn stocks in the Texas High Plains area be restricted to export only.

The Texas corn and sorghum producers associations told Block the possibility of sales of Commodity Credit Corp. corn stored in the High Plains area have depressed local corn prices.

Last year, as a result of the embargo on grain sales to the U.S.S.R., the CCC purchased 200 million bushels of corn, of which 45 million was transferred from the upper Midwest to

**Public Hearings Set For September**

On Sept. 2, at 10 a.m., a second hearing will be conducted in Waco, in the McLennan County Commissioners' Courtroom.

Most of the proposed changes in the three-year plan, which was adopted in 1980, relate to new responsibilities the Texas Department on Aging (formerly Governor's Committee on Aging) will assume, as directed by the 67th Texas

storage in the High Plains region.

Officials of the Texas associations met with Block about the CCC corn sales and later met with reporters and House Agriculture Committee staff members.

Elbert Harp of Abernathy, executive director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, said Block made no commitment on the CCC corn sales policy, but agreed to consider their request.

The associations also proposed that if USDA sells any of the CCC corn because it is out of condition, it should be replaced with purchases of corn in the High Plains area.

If the corn were sold for export only, the CCC would likely to receive a lower price than if sold directly in the High Plains area, but the government would be able to sell the corn faster and save storage costs, Harp said.

**MEASLES IMMUNIZATIONS FURTHER TIGHTENED**

A tightening of the measles immunization requirement for fall entry into schools has been made by the Texas Board of Health in a stepped-up effort halt the spread of measles in Texas.

Effective September 1, all case histories of measles must be supported by a physician's written statement. If a student who was previously enrolled is unable to submit a physician's statement, then measles vaccination will be required.

Under the newly-adopted rules, all students through the 12th grade will be required this fall to have had measles vaccine on or after their first birthdays, or provide physician-validated histories of the illness.

In addition, all students who were immunized before January 1, 1968, will be required to obtain a measles vaccine booster. Measles vaccines used prior to that date did not offer the protection of improved, present-day measles vaccines.

Under the new regulations, an estimated 250,000 students out of approximately 2.9 million enrolled will be required to receive either initial or booster doses of vaccine for attendance in Texas schools during the 1981-82 school years.

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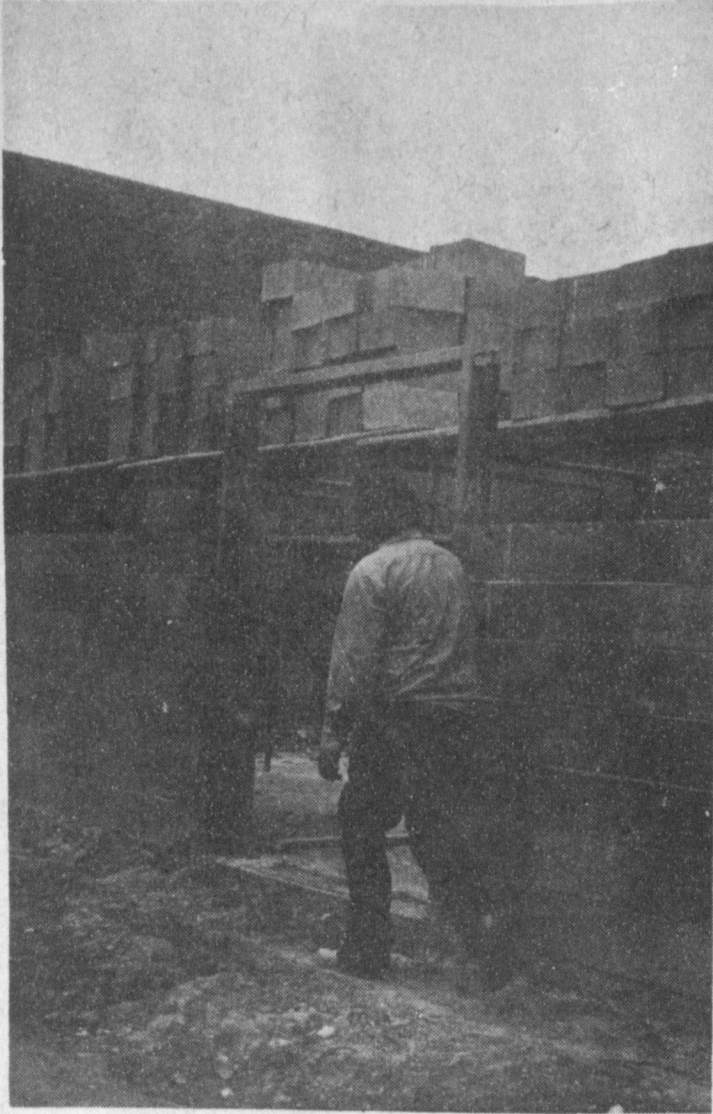

### Every 'Crib Death' Is A Tragedy

No disease tragedy is more heart-wrenching than the crib death of an infant. One minute there is life and breath; the next minute, the child is lifeless. Known as *Sudden Infant Death Syndrome* (SIDS), the anomaly is just one of the pediatric illnesses fought by the American Lung Association (ALA). The ALA supports research in search of a cause for SIDS.

Theories about SIDS abound -- but no single cause has been discovered. Theories are sometimes labeled "definite maybes".

The newest "definite maybe" is reported to be a liver deficiency of biotin, a member of the vitamin B complex. Two doctors, one from Australia and the other from England, report that 35 SIDS victims had significantly lower biotin levels than 169 infants who died of other problems.

These researchers believe biotin insufficiency may leave an infant in a weakened condition where SIDS can be triggered by mild stress -- and infection, a missed meal or even excessive heat or cold. Diet supplements might provide the needed biotin, but by no means is the biotin insufficiency theory accepted by all scientists studying SIDS.

Other causes cited are: suffocation, allergic reaction to cow's milk, metabolic disorders, change of climate, spasm or closure

of the larynx.

Whatever the cause -- or causes -- medical scientists care, and are studying and theorizing over this infant threat which takes the lives of some 10,000 children a year in the U.S.
