All Around the Town

Texas' first Primary Election is less than two weeks away and local Democratic leaders are busy with plans for the event which has importance in presidential election years.

At the polling places, voters must have their party affiliation stamped on their poll tax receipts or exemption certificates or they must sign an affidavit giving that information.

This makes it particularly desirable this year for voters to bring their exemption certificates and all tax receipts to the voting place. Printed on them in red ink are the words "Party Affiliation" followed by a blank line which is to be stamped with the party of the voter by the election judge.

All voters who do not have their poll tax receipts or certificates must sign affidavits swearing they are such an instrument and stating their party affiliation before they can vote.

Considerable time will be saved by voter and compilation of election returns may be materially reduced if citizens will bring their receipts and certificates to the polls. The party affiliation procedure is also closely tied in with the Democratic Precinct Conventions to be held on election day. Only voters with proof of Democratic party affiliation will have a voice in the conventions.

Jack Bowen of the Johnson-for-President Headquarters in Austin is in Silvertown last week. The movement to name Senator Lynn Johnson, Texas' favorite son, as Democratic Presidential nomination is gaining momentum throughout the state.

Bowen, who travels throughout Texas, says he has found the sentiment strong for Senator Johnson. The people are ready to go "all the way with LBJ," he says. When asked his opinion of the most probable choice for the president-vice president team, he says that he firmly believes the team of Johnson and Kennedy will lead the bid.

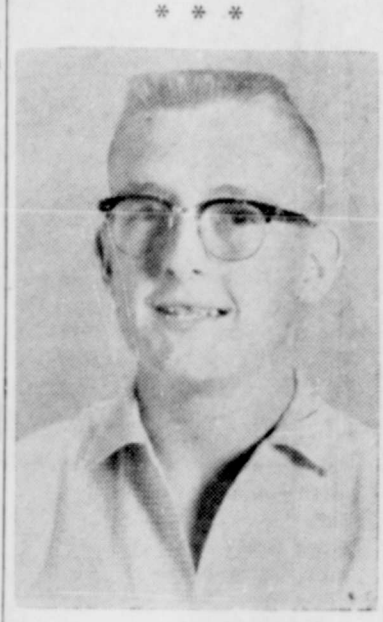

Funeral Service Held for Mr Whittemore

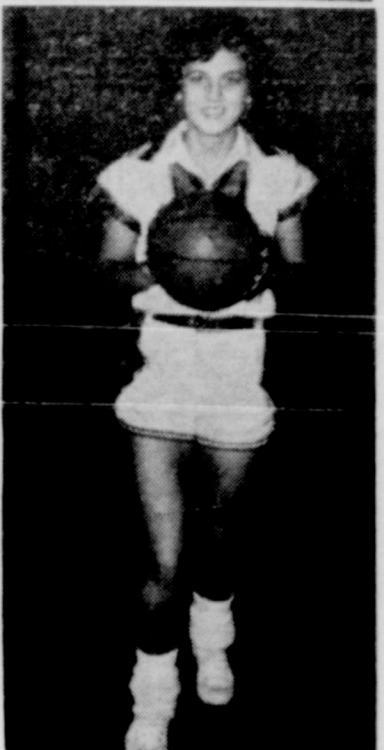

ASC Gives 1960 Wheat Information

Wheat will be subject to marketing quotas in 1960. Price support will be available where the acreage harvested on a farm is not in excess of the farm allotment.

On farms with no wheat allotment or with small wheat allotments, 15 acres may be harvested and marketed without penalty, but will not be eligible for price support. The wheat acreage harvested under such conditions will not become history for the purpose of establishing future allotments.

Planting Underway in County

Cotton planting is expected to pull stride in the area by the end of the weather cooperation with generous sunshine.

Some cotton has already been planted; Susie Wynn and a few other early farmers had their in-ground several weeks ago.

The right kind of rain, meaning slow, easy fall, would not be helpful on the cotton already planted, and moisture would be welcome on wheat that has been irrigated, and quite a bit of that crop has not been watered, generally, irrigation farmers would put the rain off a while they had their "druthers" about it.

Particular attention should be given to the depth of cotton plantings, it is advised. The seeding in shallow warm soil and using press wheels can bring good results. Shallow plaiting gets cotton off to a better start, generally.

The ideal application of fertilizers is one-half before planting and the other half as side dressing. In some instances fine results have been obtained where all the fertilizer was applied before planting, but the season must be favorable.

Soil Conservation Ranching Has Many Benefits

H. T. Luther's Flying "L" Ranch, fourteen miles east of Silverton on the Memphis highway, offers mute evidence of the benefits of conservation ranching. When purchased less than five years ago, this ranch had the typical raw-hided appearance that accompanies prolonged heavy grazing. Except in protected spots, the better native grasses had died out, dense thickets of mesquite and cedar had invaded every pasture, and severe erosion damage was occurring, even on the rangelands.

Today the ranch is recovering rapidly to its full protective potential. The good grama grasses are making a dense turf. The brush is gradually being controlled by dozing and root plowing, and the erosion damage halted with terracing and residue management on the cropland.

This has been accomplished primarily by reducing the grazing load and by reducing the maximum use of supplemental grazing crops of small grains, sudan and improved pasture grasses. This planned grass management has allowed the native grassland to be rested through most of each growing season. Good grazing distribution has also played an important role.

Though the herd of mother cows is still less than half of what was carried when the ranch was purchased, last year's calf crop at weaning equaled 85 per cent of the production in pounds of beef produced under the old heavy

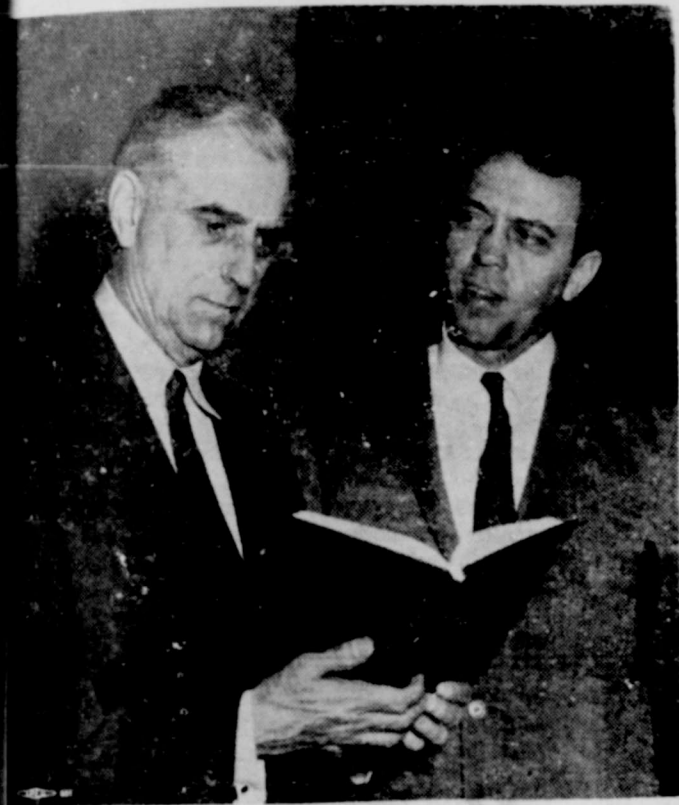

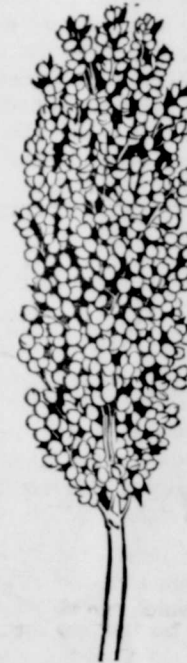

"That they also may be one in us; that the world may believe that thou has sent me." John 17:21.

We come now, not with any "holier than thou" attitude but with earnest and humble hearts, to study this subject which is near to the hearts of us all. These words of our Lord's prayer, uttered almost at the foot of the cross, reveal that the deepest desire of His heart for His disciples was that they might all be one. The clear implication is that the conversion of the world would depend upon this unity.

Almost everyone will agree that the divisions and denominations of Christendom are a gross violation of the thought and spirit of this prayer. We most surely believe that creeds and doctrines of men are the causes of these divisions and that unity among believers in Christ may be accomplished by rejecting these causes of divisions and accepting the Bible alone as our rule of faith and practice in religion. Some may argue it is impossible to have such a unity, but they have not stopped to think that Jesus and His apostles taught unity, and prayed for it, and commanded it as an absolute essential.

But let us suppose the Apostle Paul were to return to earth and preach in our fair city; and all of us believers in Christ should go to hear him. We might all gladly carry with us the Holy Bible in which Paul has fourteen epistles, but we should not expect to see in the hands of any of us a creed or opinion of man decreeing what the will of God shall be.

and when he had finished, we would not be divided into parties. We would all wish to hear the inspired man of God preach but would all be rejoicing together in the gracious religion of Christ.

We cannot hear the apostles speak personally, but Providence has given us their words and the complete will of God written down that we may believe it and obey it without error.

Let no man who expects to see the Father's face in peace ever say the Bible cannot be understood. True, there are some deep sayings that no man may ever be able to fathom, but every revelation of His divine will to man is so simply revealed that the 12-year-old boy or girl may learn it perfectly. One great essential is learning the proper divisions of the Bible, for it is very systematically arranged. These divisions are clearly set forth by the Bible itself, but beginners need to know what circumstances the particular language was addressed.

The unity for which Jesus prayed is not a union or federation of denominations could unite, but upon the Bible alone, this is not only possible but is very easily accomplished, in reality, all parties want the truth of God and nothing more.


Furthermore, it has been the thought and ideal of so many great leaders who did not attempt to put it into practice. John Wesley said, "Would to God that all party names and unscriptural phrases and forms which have so long divided the Christian world were forgotten, and that we might all agree to sit down together as humble, loving disciples, at the feet of our common Master, to hear his word, to imbibe his spirit and to transcribe His life into our own."

Let us then walk by the Word of God which will guide us all into the same path and unify all men on earth who love the Lord. To this cause our efforts are unceasingly committed.
