General Rain Falls in Briscoe County

During a violent electrical storm and with severe weather alerts Saturday afternoon and evening, Silverton and the surrounding area received rainfall totaling near a quarter of an inch. Lightning flashed, thunder rolled, and large, dark clouds caused moments of anxiety, but no severe weather resulted.

In an early morning rain on Monday of this week, additional moisture was received to total better than half an inch in the rain gauge of Ray C. Bomar, our official weatherman. Small hail showered the area west of Silverton, and it was reported that it almost covered the ground. Damage reported from the storm was thought to be minor. Some farmers reported that tender plants had suffered some, but they expect them to outgrow it.

Another rain shower on Tuesday evening added to the already damp conditions prevailing. It is certain that every thirsty blade of grass on surrounding pastures which have suffered so much during these days of hot, dry winds welcomed the rains.

In another week to ten days the wheat harvest should be well underway in the county, barring unfavorable weather conditions. The hot, dry winds have ripened the wheat a little earlier this year.

An adult tailoring class will be taught during the month of June by Mrs. Buster Miller, the Silverton High School Home Economics teacher. The class will meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays throughout the month from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Home Economics room.

The first meeting will be held June 7 at 2:00 p.m. Materials you will need are: a pattern the size and brand you usually buy, fabric (the required amount, which is rather firm in texture), interfacing, about 2 yards (select interfacing which is about the same weight as your fabric, example — hair canvas — for heavy weight wool, Veriform — crisp, keybak, pella — for medium weight fabric; muslin, cambric, taffeta, for light weight fabric; lining (it should be colorfast, durable, and smooth surfaced); will tape 1/2" wide, buttons; zippers; needles, size 7; pins; thimble; sharp scissors; and tracing wheel and carbon paper or tailor's chalk.

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The Bible Alone As Authority In Religion

Our purpose is not to prove the Bible is the Word of God, but appeal to that body of good and sincere people who believe in Christ and in His Word, yet are divided into many different sects and denominations. We believe that the fundamental cause of these divisions is that men have departed more or less from the teachings of the Word of God and have supplanted it with authority that is human instead of divine. Our plea is for the return to the Bible ALONE as the sole authority in all matters of religion, and thus to restore primitive Christianity and the unity among believers for which Christ prayed.

The early disciples were of "one heart and one soul." Within a few generations however, believers began adding to the Word of Christ the doctrines of men. This resulted in division and culminated in the apostasy of the Church. The good efforts of the Reformation, occurring many centuries later, left believers divided, as each denomination followed different creeds written by men. The greatest error has been the addition of some human authority to the Bible itself. Some accept the Bible plus human creeds; some plus their own opinion or judgment; and others, the Bible plus some kind of feeling or experience, etc. If the Bible is what we believe it to be, it is the very Word of God, living, indestructible and unchangeable, and enjoining us against any other authority, it seems waiting in the world for every man born of Adam's race to direct his life and destiny.


The Church of Christ can speak assuredly that unity upon God's Word alone can be easily achieved if it is sincerely desired; and that it would unify all lovers of the Lord on Earth. (Scripture reference: 11 Timothy 3:16-17; 11 Peter 1:13; James 1:25; Mark 13:13; John 12:48).

Meanwhile the international kettle is boiling. We hope it continues to let off steam and doesn't blow up.

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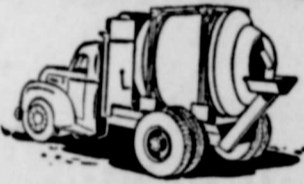
