## House is Appointed County Registrar

Jimmie House of Silverton has been appointed registrar for the Childress - Hall - Briscoe - Cottle-Collingsworth county draft board in the Silverton area.

Boys who reach the age of 18 can register in Silverton by calling on Mr. House at the Simpson Chevrolet Company during regular business hours, Monday through Saturday.

A registrar is maintained in the area so that men will not have to travel to the draft board at Childress.

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state director of the draft system, expressed public appreciation of the services of Mr. House.

"People of the Silverton area should appreciate the services he renders to them," Colonel Schwartz said, "he is doing the work without pay as a public service to his country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter. Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register are \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.

## MORRIS DELIVERS FIRST 1960 COTTON IN BRISCOE COUNTY

### Returns From Stay in Tulia Hospital

Mrs. T. J. Hodges came home from the Tulia Hospital Friday of last week. She had been a patient there since Sunday.

Mr. Hodges reports that his wife is improving this week. He stayed at the hospital with her during the daytime, and at night he stayed with Mr. and Mrs. John Kincaid, who formerly lived in this neighborhood and had two sons who attended a Sunday School class taught by Mr. Hodges.

A. L. Morris delivered the first 1960 cotton in Briscoe County on September 5. It was ginned by the Farmers Coop Gin in Quitaque, and the bale weighed 564 pounds. The cotton was grown on the Jimmy Baird farm east of Quitaque.

Morris received forty cents per pound from the gin for the cotton, plus a bonus paid by the Quitaque merchants.

Jim and Monte Smith delivered the first new cotton to Silverton on Friday, September 9. It was ginned by Tomlin-Fleming Gin, and the bale weighed 475 pounds.

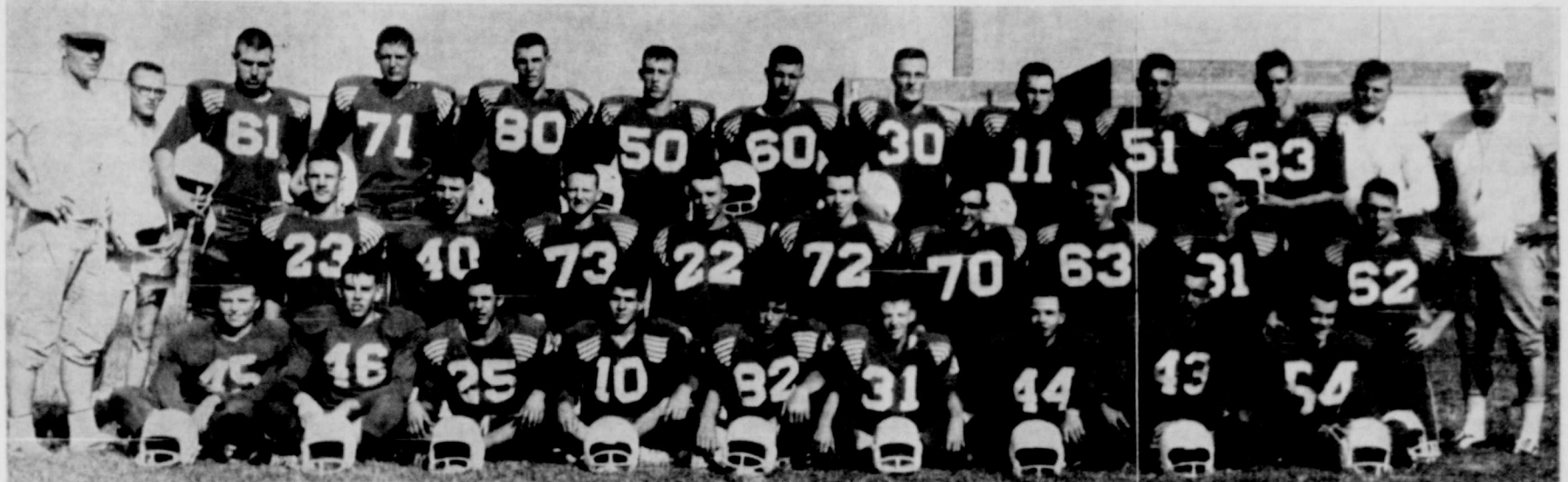
## EMERGENCY CARE RECORDS TO BE COMPILED BY SCHOOL

Beginning this week an Emergency Care Record form will be sent to parents of school children. The purpose of this record is to give the school authority to send school children to a doctor or hospital in the event that their parents or guardian is unavailable at such time as the school nurse deems a doctor's care advisable.

The form gives blanks for the telephone number at which the child's parents may be reached during school hours, and a space for the number of a relative or friend to be contacted if the nurse is unable to reach a parent. The family's physician should be named in another blank provided and his telephone number.  
The parent then signs a statement

of permission for the school to contact the family doctor when unable to reach the parent, and in the event the family doctor cannot be reached, authorizes the school to send the child to another doctor. The names of all the family's children in school are to be listed on the back of the form.

This form is especially needed for the proper care in an emergency of Latin-American children, who often don't speak English well or who become frightened when an accident occurs and refuse to speak. Farmers and business men who Latin-Americans are urged to see that the forms are filled in properly, signed and returned to the school nurse.

## BRONCHOS BUCK OWLS 40-0

With a one-sided score of 40-0, the District 2-A Clarendon Bronchos won easily from the District 4-A Silverton Owls in Clarendon last Friday night. A slow drizzle chilled spectators through the first quarter of play, but in the second

quarter it stopped and gave way to a more pleasant evening.

The Bronchos scored twice in the first quarter, first with Quarterback Dwight McAnear on a ten yard run, and again with the same fellow on a twenty-seven yard run. Neither attempted conversion was good, the first being an attempted run and the other an incomplete pass.

No score was made during the second quarter and at halftime the Bronchos led the Owls, 12-0.

Clarendon ran wild in the third quarter with Quarterback Neal Carter going twenty-five yards after a pass interception, Eddie Tip-ton ran for two extra points, Neal Carter scored on a five yard plunge and Bill Hermesmyer scored again on a twenty-five yard pass play from Neal Carter.

In the fourth quarter Guard Frank Hermesmyer ran twenty yards for paydirt again after a blocked kick and Bill Hermesmyer snagged a conversion pass from Dwight McAnear for two more points.

More penalties were assessed during this game than the Silverton fans have seen in a long time. Silverton received penalties for sixty-five yards and the Bronchos had one hundred twenty-five yards marked off against them. Silverton refused several Clarendon penalties, preferring to take the down, as the Bronchos had no trouble whatsoever in making up a fifteen yarder on the next run in several instances.

Penalties were given most often for holding, with being offside, delaying the game and clipping as other most-used offenses.

Silverton fumbled four times, recovered one of them and gave

Funeral services for Virgil Wiley Baldwin, 56, were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, September 11, 1960, from the Silverton First Baptist Church of which he was a member, with the Rev. G. A. Elrod, pastor, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ officiating.

Virgil Wiley Baldwin was born February 8, 1904, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Baldwin in Greer County, Oklahoma. He was married to the former Miss Nettie V. Rowell at Silverton on March 27, 1937. He had lived in Briscoe County for seventeen years and was engaged in farming southwest of Silverton in the Rock Creek community at the time of his death.

Mr. Baldwin departed this life on Friday morning at 1:49 a.m. in Swisher County Hospital in Tulia. He had been a patient in the hospital for only three days.

He is survived by his wife, of the home; two sons, Jack D. Baldwin, with the U. S. Navy at sea and Virgil Dan, of Silverton; three daughters, Mrs. H. A. Baughman of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Blain Comer of Los Angeles, California, and Mrs. Rex Jones of Silverton; one brother, W. T. Goodson of Amarillo; his mother, Mrs. W. F. Baldwin of Sentinel, Oklahoma; and eleven grandchildren.

**It's the Law in TEXAS**



**LAW REQUIRES STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES**

Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rules applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another it attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions

**SORRY SEEDS PRODUCE POOR CROP**

A campaign to acquaint farmers with the value of registered and certified seed is being waged by various agricultural groups throughout the state.

"In spite of all the many advances that have been made regarding agriculture in the past few years, one fact still stands out, that is you cannot produce a good crop from sorry seed," said R. J. Hodges, agronomist of the Texas Extension Service.

Strict rules and regulations have been set up for producing registered and certified seed in Texas. "The registered and certified seeds are reliable seeds a farmer can depend on as to quality and germination and other good characteristics," Hodges said.

Texas has a State Seed and Plant Board composed of five members—a representative of Texas A and M College, a representative of Texas Tech, a representative from the Texas Department of Agriculture, and a Texas Certified and Registered seed grower, and a marketer of seeds in Texas.

This group is charged with setting up rules and regulations that govern the production of registered and certified seeds. A certified or registered seed producer must follow these rules and regulations. To make sure this is done, impartial crop inspectors with the Texas Department of Agriculture check fields of certified or registered producers as many times as necessary in each growing season.

They are checked for mutations, cross-pollinated plants, noxious weeds, diseases, isolation from other crops, and all sorts of other things, Bill Staffel, chief of the Texas Department of Agriculture seed division explained.

Even the harvesting and processing equipment is checked to make sure there are no seeds or other foreign material from previous field work left on or in them.

After harvest the seed is sampled and analyzed. If the seed passes all of these inspections, checks and tests, it can be packed and labeled with either the purple tag for Texas Registered or the blue tag for Texas Certified seed.

The purchase of certified seed is the best guarantee of varietal purity, says John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture. Certified seed must meet a certain standard of perfection. They trace back directly to the first seed release of a particular variety and should be the best seed of a particular variety available for planting by a farmer.

To be certified, each bag of Texas Certified seed must have the blue certification tag and the official metal seal. If these are not attached, beware. The seed are not certified.

The certified tag and seal mean:

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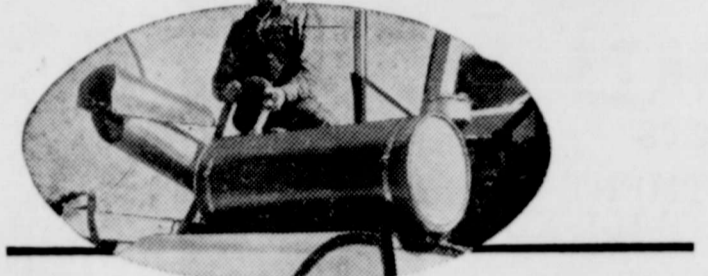
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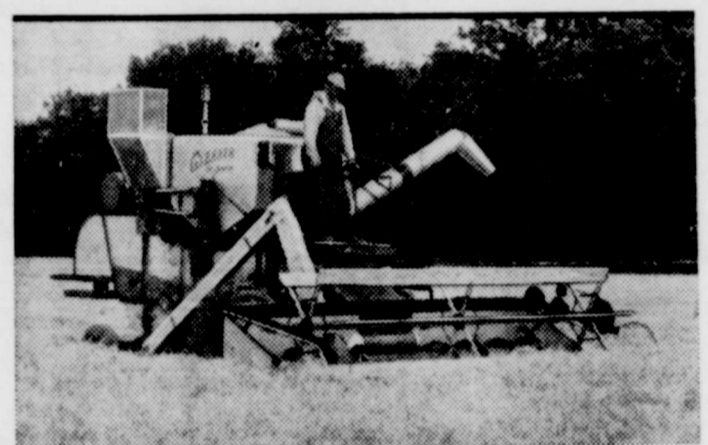

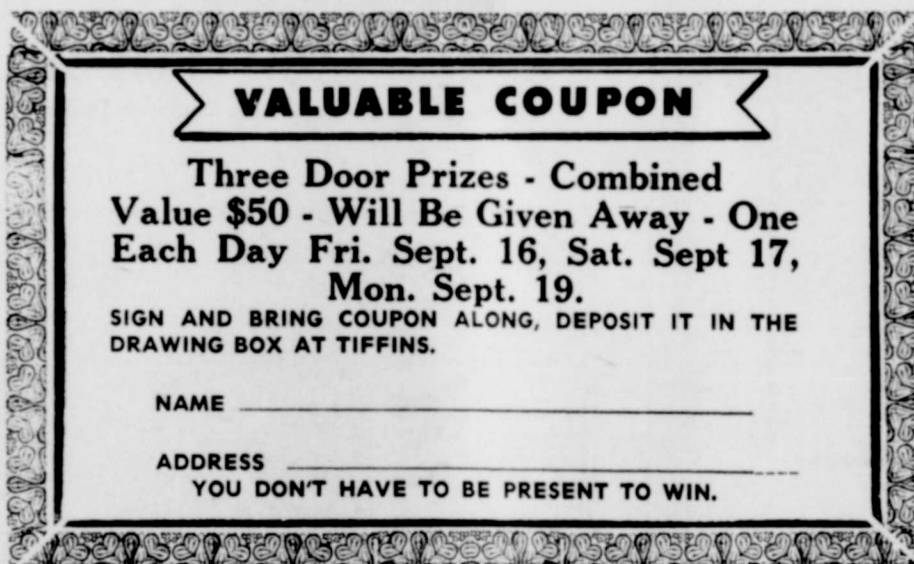
