Held For Little Randy Teeple

Funeral services for Randy Teeple, 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Teeple of Route 1, Silverton, were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the Silverton Church of Christ. Randall Irwin Teeple was born in Lockney, Texas, on February 1, 1956. He had lived in Briscoe County all his life. The boy died at about 4:30 p.m. Thursday, November 10, 1960, in a two-car collision at the intersection of two farm roads four miles south and two miles west of Silverton. His mother and her sister-in-law, Mrs. Joe Montague, and six-year-old Quin Montague, remain in a Plainview hospital. Officiating at the funeral services were L. L. Thornton, minister of the Silverton Church of Christ, and Richard Williams of Snyder, former minister in Silverton. Mrs. Teeple has been listed in critical condition at the Plainview Hospital and Clinic. Mrs. Montague is in fair condition, as is her son, Quin. Mrs. Teeple and Randy were

traveling north at the time of the accident, while Mrs. Montague and Quin were driving east. The two women were enroute to their homes after attending a club meeting at the home of Mrs. Elton Cantwell. The crash occurred about a mile from the Teeple home. Mr. and Mrs. Montague live in Silverton. All those involved have been suffering from injuries about the head. Both automobiles were demolished.

Randy Teeple is survived by his parents; a brother, Monty Ray; two sisters, Venita Fay and Marsha Kay, of the home; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Teeple, of the Lone Star Community, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Dan Montague of Silverton.

OWLS FALL IN LAST GAME OF SEASON

In last Friday night's grid contest, the Silverton Owls bowed to the Petersburg Buffaloes, 32 to 8. The Owls drew first "blood" after a pass from Larry West to Robert Rhode set up a touchdown on the six yard line. Van Breedlove went over on the next play for the TD and Larry May drove in for the two extra points to put the Owls in the lead, 8-0.

In the second quarter, Petersburg's Stanley Self drove over from one yard out to score after Sandy Matthews blocked a Silverton punt on the Silverton fourteen yard line. No conversion points were made and the score stood at 8-6, favoring the Owls.

Silverton took the ball at the thirty-three yard line, made two short carries and fumbled to Petersburg who then scored on two completed passes. The touchdown pass was from Matthews to Self, and conversion points were gained on a completed pass from Stephens to Lyde. The score stood at Petersburg 14, Silverton 8, with 51 seconds remaining in the first half.

The Buffs scored again late in the third quarter on a forty-four yard drive by Hollis Mahagan. The pass for extra points was no good, and the score was 20-8, favoring the visiting Buffaloes.

Early in the fourth quarter, Petersburg scored again on a pass play from Stephens to Self, to raise the score to 26-8. Only a few plays later, Self ran thirty-two yards to score for Petersburg, making the final count in their favor, 32-8.

Statistic-wise the game was a lot closer, with Silverton making nine first downs to the eleven made by Petersburg. The new score clock was enjoyed as the official time on the field. George Miller operated the new clock from the press box, and he deserves the thanks of all the fans. George gave up his enjoyment of the game to perform this service, which is a great deal more work than pleasure.

This year, as in the past, a big part of the program will be done by the choir.

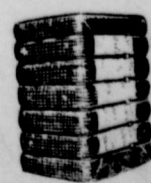
Lorena Edwards will direct the choir this year, and the first choir practice is set for Friday night November 18th, at the school house. All singers of the community are urged to be present for this practice.

BRUSH CONTROL IS POPULAR PRACTICE IN BRISCOE COUNTY

Brush control is an important observation practice in this district, and a great deal of it has been done this year. Over seven acres were completed by one of the various methods that are effective.

Theo Geisler, whose ranch is north of Quitaque, has completed over four thousand acres in the past three years. Geisler is convinced of the value of the practice. He feels that within two years he has doubled the carrying capacity of some of his pasture. Some areas on Geisler's ranch were so heavily infested with mesquite that very little grass could grow prior to the

brush control. He has used the dozing method of control on his ranch.

Bill Cushing, whose ranch is northeast on the Memphis road, has used chemical control by aerial spraying with good results.

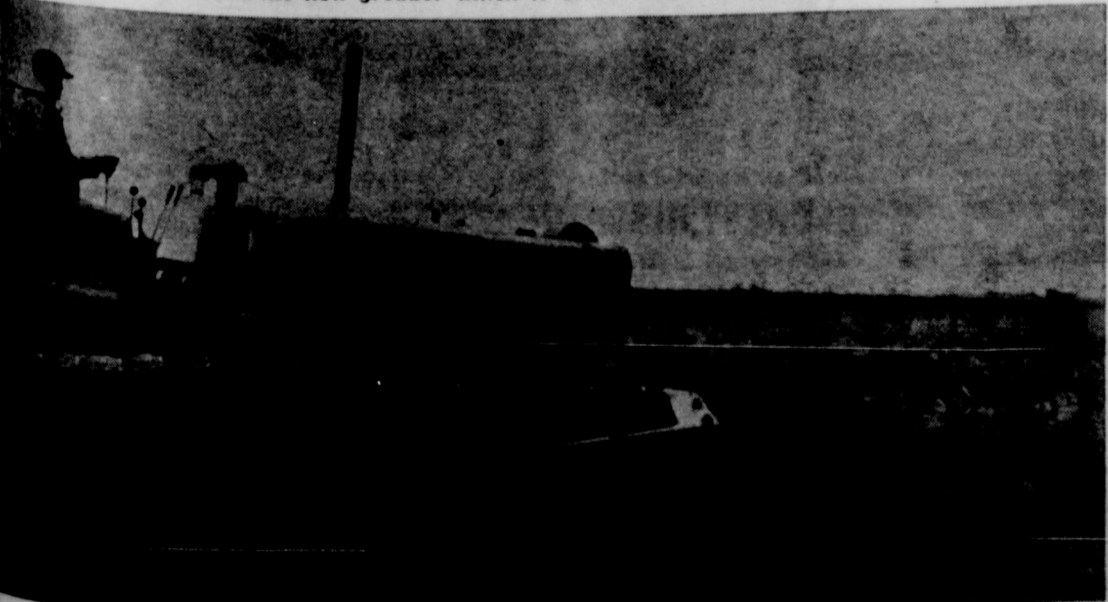
Dick Mayfield, west of Silverton, uses basal chemical control on an individual tree basis, and is getting good results.

However, the large majority of brush control is done by the dozing method, where the trees are actually pushed out of the ground. Of course, cost share assistance is available, both through the ASC and through the Great Plains Program.

JESUS IS CONSTANT

The Hebrew writer wrote for brethren to "be content with such things as ye have (13:5); to follow those who taught them the word of God" (13:7), and not to be "carried with divers and strange doctrines" (13:9). To encourage them he pointed out that Jesus is "the same yesterday, today and forever" (13:8).

Hebrews 13:8 does not teach that Jesus still does everything He once did or that He does things the way He once did. He once talked directly to men; today, He speaks through the Bible. He once pardoned directly as He did the thief on the cross; today, He pardons those who obey his gospel. He once healed bodies instantly at His command; today, He heals bodies through His divine providence.

Were this passage to teach that Jesus still does everything He once did in the same way or in the same manner, it would prove that He is still on earth in bodily form, for He once said: that He still walks upon the Sea of Galilee, for He once did and that He still heals bodies instantly at His command. Hebrews 13:8 was not written to teach such as should be obvious.

This passage was written to help discouraged brethren by pointing out that their Savior is constant. He is for truth day after day. He is sympathetic day after day. He is dependable. So ought Christians to be dependable and constant. They must keep on keeping on.

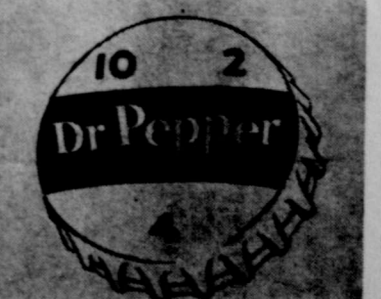

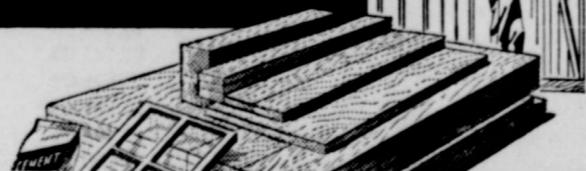
