All Around the Town

A new year dawned last Sunday morning on a world plagued by problems from the past, but hopeful for the future.

As 1961 arrived, fresh, bright and new, millions thrust cares and burdens aside for the moment to celebrate with gay party, fervent prayer, the relaxation of sports events and other carefree pastimes.

The traditional crowd gathered in New York's Times Square to cheer the changeover, heralded by the descent of a huge illuminated globe on a pole atop the Times Tower Building.

Others joined in solemn Watch Night services in churches or lifted toasts at night spots and in homes around the world.

Children, on this special night, probably were allowed to stay up late to watch the festivities on the television screen.

Noisemakers, funny hats and confetti were the order of the midnight hour as the world took a temporary respite from its troubles.

But the changing of the calendar found the globe gripped in tension between the free peoples and those under the domain of communism, bloody strife in Laos, rioting in Belgium, racial and political disorders in Africa and human unrest elsewhere.

Bleak as the picture appeared, however, there were rays of hope for better times.

United Nations Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld chose the burgeoning of the new year to fly abroad with a personal appeal for peace and good will.

Pope John XXIII, the 79-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church, voiced the hope that 1961 would be a year of "spiritual renaissance and of harmony between heaven and earth."

In Yugoslavia, President Tito said international prospects were worrisome but added that "we should not lose hope that the forces of peace, which everyday increase in numbers and strength, will prevent war."

The new year will bring major transitions in U. S. affairs, changes of prime interest around the world.

Dwight D. Eisenhower leaves the White House after an eight-year Republican administration, tendering the reins of government to a Democratic administration headed by John F. Kennedy.

Dampness Slows Harvest in County

Cold moist air covered our area this past week. On December 29 a trace, .02 of an inch was received, and on December 31, .26 of an inch fell in the form of sleet and rain. According to Raymond C. Bomar, Silvertown's official weather recording instruments have measured 23.36 inches of moisture for the year which has just retreated like a lamb. This is less moisture than was received last year, but is more than the 1940 yearly rainfall average of about 20.00 inches.

Icing conditions made driving hazardous in the morning hours on Saturday of last week; however, that condition cleared up rapidly under clear skies with the sun brightly shining.

Daytime temperatures have remained very low in spite of the sunshine, and drying has been very slow. A few loads of cotton were noted heading ginward at midweek.

Before she completes her thesis, she will have read through every available legal record concerning this county.

He conducted his search by asking among those considered old-timers. Miss Brotherton read the records, and when asked about this she replied with a smile, "He didn't find out, but I did."

On one of her future visits here, she plans to interview as many as time allows of those who can relate first-hand history of Briscoe County. Cap Rock SCD Reviews 1960 Progress

The Cap Rock Soil Conservation District compiled a very fine record of accomplishment during 1960. The amount of important conservation practices installed was high. Following is a list of the more important conservation practices and amounts installed during 1960, compiled by Virgil Henson of the local SCD office:

- Farm Ponds — about 30
 - Erosion Control dams — 2
 - Brush Control on rangeland — about 5,000 acres
 - Underground Irrigation Pipe — about 12 miles
 - Livestock Water Wells — about seven.
- Besides the above practices which were cost shared, the following are other practices which were carried out by cooperators

- with the Cap Rock SCD:
 - Proper Range Use — 400,000 acres
 - Conservation Crop Rotation — 70,000 acres
 - Stubble Mulching or proper use of crop residues — 65,000 acres
 - Proper Use of Irrigation Water — about 25,000 acres
 - Contour Farming — about 20,000 acres
- In addition to the above, during

1960 final details were completed for a detailed survey and installation of structures on the Kent Creek Watershed. The Planning Party will be here this month to start the survey.

The above required a great deal of work and cooperation by farmers and ranchers, businessmen, the Board of Supervisors, Agricultural Agencies and others. Members of the Board of Supervisors

WHY READ THE BOOK OF ACTS

Why do members of the churches of Christ encourage people to read the book of Acts? Are not other parts of the bible just as important? Different books of the bible serve different purposes. For example, the first four books of the New Testament are to prove Jesus is God's Son. They do this by telling of his miraculous birth, His miraculous powers and of the Father's expressed approval of Him. These matters are related to lead men to believe Jesus is the Son of God (John 20:30-31).

The book of Acts, however, tells of those things that occurred immediately after Jesus went back to heaven. It tells of the Holy Spirit coming upon the apostles as Jesus had promised them (John 14:26; Acts 1:8); of the beginning and growth of the church He promised (Matthew 16:18; Acts 2:47) and of the preaching of the gospel of the apostles first in Jerusalem as Jesus had com-manded (Mark 16:15; Luke 24:47).

Of special interest, it relates how sinners obeyed the gos-pel and were saved (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38). It tells what the apostles preached and how sinners became Christians. This is especially important today. To learn what to do to be saved one needs to read what the apostles preached and how sinners obeyed. Jesus had said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved. (Mark 16:16). In Acts we see this in action.
