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
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# Fat Stock Show To Be Held Saturday

## **CALLING ON THE NAME OF THE LORD**


"Whosoever shall call on the name of the Lord shall be saved." (Acts 2:21b). "Saved" means to be pardoned. "Whosoever" means any man. Hence, every man is pardoned who calls on the name of the lord.

This passage does not teach that sinners are pardoned by crying "Lord, Lord". Jesus said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven." (Matt. 7:21a). There is a difference between calling "Lord, Lord" and calling ON the name of the Lord. One might call the Lord's name day after day without calling on the name of the Lord.


What then is meant by calling on the name of the Lord? It means to obey the will of God. Jesus said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord shall enter into the kingdom of heaven." (Matt. 7:21). Obeying God's will is essential to pardon.

How men call on the name of the Lord is demonstrated in God's word. On Pentecost, for example, when sinners cried out, 'Men and breathern what shall we do?", after Peter had already told them that all who call on the Lord would be saved (Acts 2:21), he replied, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins." (Acts 2.38a). Hence, one calls on the name of the Lord by obeying the Lord.






