## All Around the Town

Lots of our readers call us on the telephone now and then to ask us questions. We are always glad when we can supply the answers, but the other day I jokingly asked a caller what information I could supply, and he asked me explain the new farm grain program. That one could be the \$64,000 question, as it seems that even the men who are planning the program have run into snags.

The safest suggestion that I can offer to the individuals who farm is that it is wise to check with the local ASC office before planting time. John Montague, manager of the local office, is receiving more information all the time, and is happy to pass it on to the producers. Ranchers and farmers who intend to grow grain sorghum, oats or corn under the government's 1961 feed grain program can save themselves a lot of troubles and complications if they will check with him at the earliest possible date.

Changes have been so numerous and fast that the county and state officials themselves admit difficulty in keeping up with the meaning of the fine print. And it's the little things that often cause trouble. For instance, it has been explained that a farmer who plants several hundred acres of oats, but hasn't been planting any grain sorghum or corn, has no base acreage for planting the latter two grains. Oats, however, aren't in the program, but could be indirectly affected by anticipated price supports.

Should he plant even one row of grain sorghum or corn for any reason (excluding a row or two of sweet corn in the garden—not a field corn variety) he loses eligibility for support price on his oats. Another technicality which we learn may foil the unsuspecting farmer is that he has to have a base on corn and grain sorghum (even one acre will give a base) to be able to rotate the crops from year to year.

The program, of course, is designed to reduce the acreage of feed grains by 20 per cent, thereby decreasing surpluses. The government would return grain or pay cash to farmers participating. The controversy has come from grain merchants who object to the Secretary of Agriculture's being placed in the grain business.

However, each farmer is an individual case, and by April 15 the county ASC offices should be in a position to consider each farm separately and accept applications by farmers and ranchers who want to participate in the program. At the time of application, advance payments of 50 per cent of the total payments may be made and a certificate for grain (in kind) may be issued for acres diverted from grain production to conservation uses, as I understand it.

If a farmer or rancher desires cash instead of grain, he may endorse the certificate to the Commodity Credit Corporation and receive a check for payment in lieu of the grain. He may have the grain or cash.

If he returns the certificate and takes the cash then the CCC will market the grain. The CCC cannot sell more grain than is represented by certificates.

The effect the feed grain act is supposed to have on the market price of grain in normal channels will depend on the number of farmers who participate.

A farmer who doesn't participate may plant as many acres of grain sorghum, oats or corn as he desires, making him ineligible for support prices. The feed grain act, unlike the wheat, cotton and peanut program, does not place marketing quotas and penalties for overplanting.

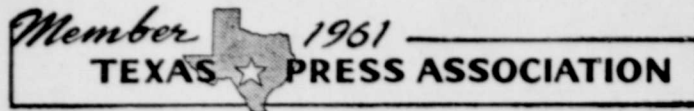
