**All Around
the Town**

Often you read statements by scientists in many fields to the effect that a time lag usually exists between the appearance of marvelous new discoveries and their wide use by the people they benefit.

But the really tragic time gap is in health, for there the costly spells death, disease and physical handicap—unnecessary in so many instances. Many of the millions of dollars fruitfully spent on medical research are not translated into bolstering health and saving life.

To dramatize this problem, the Public Health Service has put out an illustrated booklet setting forth the severe human cost.

There are said to be at least 200,000 needless cancer deaths a year. If all current knowledge were applied, we'd save 120,000 cancer patients annually, instead of 80,000. And millions in hospital bills and lost income would be saved.

Preventable attacks of rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease kill 20,000 annually. Simple, prompt treatment of throat infections that lead to these ailments can block them.

The nation has 500,000 mentally ill people who fill half our hospital beds. Yet mental health clinics, guidance services and psychiatric aid could nip many such cases in the formative stages. And new drugs and methods of care can shorten the time the mentally ill spend under institutional care.

Glaucoma and diabetes account for a fifth of all cases of blindness. Yet surveys show that a million persons with glaucoma and a million and a half with diabetes get no treatment at all, because they don't even know they have these ailments. They are recruited for the ranks of the blind. Easy tests can determine whether a person has either of these conditions.

We could be close to wiping out tuberculosis as a big health problem. Nevertheless, we still have 10,000 new cases and 12,000 deaths every year because treatment is either inadequate or is broken off.

Though the Salk vaccine has existed in ample supply for years and the total of polio cases has dropped dramatically, 6,000 persons were paralyzed by his disease in 1959. Surveys show a high percentage of low income families are not vaccinated. Nearly half the victims are under five years of age.

To wipe out the costly time lag, the Public Health Service urges us and our community to make the fullest possible use of: immunization against preventable disease; periodic checkups; rehabilitation programs for the chronically ill and disabled; trained health personnel and facilities. Millions suffer and die who need it. If this painful, costly loss is ever to end, they must act—in time—to help save themselves.

A fierce hail storm boiled out of angry clouds over Silvertown at about 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday of last week, dumping large amounts of hail over the area from Silvertown northeast to the Caprock. Hail stones ranged in size from small to golf ball size with many up to small baseball size. Many were about the size of the ice cubes in your refrigerator.

Heavy damage was reported by Troy Burson, W. E. Schott, J. C. Rhoderick, Shafe Weaver, Johnny Burson and others who farm in that locale. From 60 and 75% to 100% damage was reported to the wheat crops.

Mrs. Johnny Burson reported that the hail went over their place three times, breaking her storm door as well as doing extensive damage to crops.

Several residents of Silvertown reported damage to automobile and pickup windows and many reported roof damage. Many of the flat-roofed business buildings were damaged to the extent that insurance adjusters allowed the full amount of benefits.

A tornado struck the small community of Daugherty, near Floydada, only a short while before on the same afternoon, but warning had been given and residents huddled in storm shelters until it had passed. A nice rain shower was received in Quitaque, but no hail.

FFA GRASS JUDGING TEAM QUALIFIES FOR STATE MEET

Approximately 1,430 high school vocational agriculture students from throughout West Texas com-

peted in the contests, the largest regional event of its kind, at the 33rd annual Vocational Agriculture Judging Contests at Texas Tech recently.

The all-day program saw about 475 teams from 147 schools competing for top honors in the 10-event contest.

In addition to competing for overall honors, Areas 1 and 2 used the contests to determine the teams to represent them in the events at the state meet at College Station.

The Silvertown Grass Judging team qualified for the state meet by defeating the other area teams and placed second high in the Tech contest.

Jimmy Myers was third high individual in the entire contest and Lester Grabbe placed close behind him in fifth place.

Dr. Gerald W. Thomas, dean of agriculture at Texas Tech, pointed out at the awards program that "education is the primary purpose of today's activities."

"And whether you win or lose, we hope you have gained knowledge through your participation in these contests," he added.

INCREASES TO AFFECT POSTAL ORDERS, SPECIAL DELIVERY

Proposed increases in money order and special delivery fees starting July 1, 1961, were announced recently by Postmaster General J. Edward Day.

No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned.

Special delivery fees for second, third and fourth class matter will be increased by 10c in each of the

non-first class fee brackets.

The increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal revenues, based on current special delivery volume.

Money orders up to \$5 and over \$50 will be increased by 5 cents. The new money order schedule will combine the present 15-cent and 20-cent fee brackets into one at 20 cents. It also splits the present 30-cent bracket at the \$50 level, raising to 35 cents the fee for denominations up to \$100. This change will affect over 100 million money order transactions. Based on this volume, new revenues would total about \$5 million.

These proposed changes can be put into effect by Postmaster General Day under his existing administrative authority. Similar action was taken recently to adjust postal rates for mail going to foreign countries.

These actions are part of the Post Office Department's program to place the Postal Service in a more favorable fiscal position, in accordance with the Postal Policy Act of 1958.

The Postmaster General is also requesting the Congress to take legislative action with regard to first, second, and third class mail to eliminate the revenue deficiency gap of \$741 million.

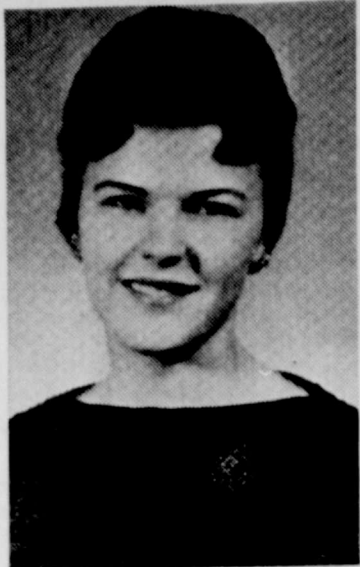

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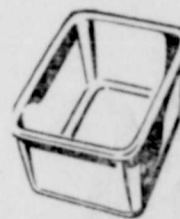

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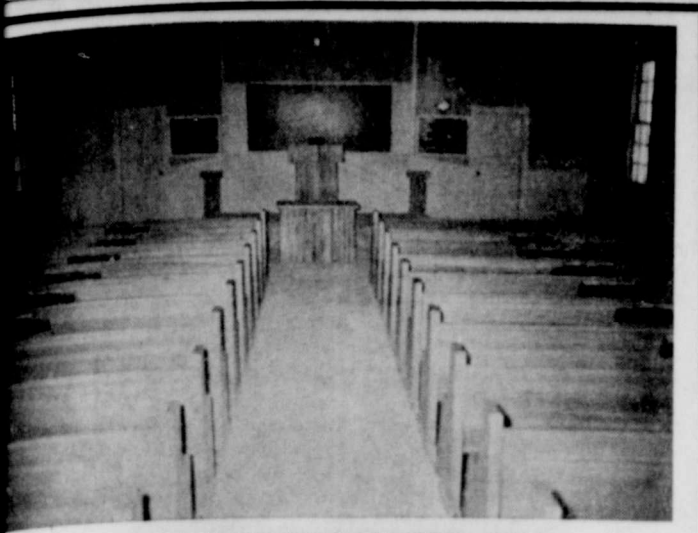

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AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND REGULATING ITERANT MERCHANTS, ITERANT VENDORS, PEDDLERS, AND PERSONS SELLING OR TAKING ORDERS FOR GOODS, WARES, MERCHANDISE, SERVICES, PHOTOGRAPHS, NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES OR SUBSCRIPTIONS TO NEWSPAPERS OR MAGAZINES: PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE AND A LICENSE FEE: REQUIRING A BOND: EXEMPTING THOSE ENGAGED IN INTERSTATE COMMERCE FROM LICENSE FEE AND BOND, BUT REQUIRING SUCH PERSONS TO REGISTER WITH THE CITY SECRETARY; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, INCLUDING A FINE NOT LESS THAN \$10.00 NOR MORE THAN \$200.00: CONTAINING A SEVERABILITY OR SAVING CLAUSE: REPEALING CONFLICTING PROVISIONS OF ALL OTHER ORDINANCES: AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF SILVERTON, TEXAS:
Section 1. This entire ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the City of Silvertown, for the public safety, comfort, convenience and protection of the city and citizens of said city, and all of the provisions hereof shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.
Section 2. That is shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Silvertown, Texas, soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines or subscriptions to newspaper or magazines, or for any iterant vendor to sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Silvertown, without having first applied for and obtained a license so to do from the City Secretary of said city. It shall also hereafter be unlawful to sell or solicit in said city as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soliciting or selling. The term "iterant vendor" as used herein means and includes and shall be construed to mean and include all persons, firms, associations or corporations as well as their agents and employees, who engage in temporary or transient business in the City of Silvertown, Texas, of selling or offering for sale and goods, wares or merchandise or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof. The word "temporary" as used herein means and shall be construed to mean any such business transacted or conducted in the City of Silvertown, Texas, for which definite arrangements have not been made for the hire, rental or lease of premises for at least 90 days in or upon which said business is to be operated or conducted, or from which said business is to be operated or conducted. The word, "transient" as used herein means and shall be construed to mean any such business of an iterant vendor as defined herein as may be operated or conducted by persons, firms, or corporations or by their agents or employees who reside away from the City of Silvertown, Texas, or who have fixed places of business in places other than the City of Silvertown, Texas, or who move stocks of goods, wares or merchandise or samples thereof into the City of Silvertown, Texas, with the purpose or intention of removing them or the unsold portion thereof away from said city before the expiration of 90 days.
Section 3. That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Silvertown, Texas, to sell or solicit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, or any iterant vendor desiring to sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Silvertown, Texas, shall make written application to the City Secretary of said city for a license so to do at least 5 days prior to the date of his contemplated sale or exhibit to be held in the City of Silvertown, Texas, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm or corporation, if any, that he or she represents and the kind of goods offered for sale, and whether such applicant upon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said city.
Section 4. The application mentioned in Section 3 hereof shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$2,000.00 signed by applicant and signed, as surety, by some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the final delivery of goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, magazines and newspapers in accordance with the terms of any order obtained prior to delivery and also conditioned to indemnify any and all purchasers or customers for any and all defects in material or workmanship that may exist in the article sold by the principal of said bond, at the time of delivery, and that may be discovered by such purchaser or customer within 30 days after delivery, and which bond shall be for the use and benefit of all persons, firms or corporations that may make any purchase or give any order to the principal on said bond, or to an agent or employee of the principal, provided that in case applicant is a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaging in any activity mentioned in Paragraph 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees, such persons, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association shall be required to enter into only

one bond, in the sum of 2,000.00 as above required, which bond shall be made to cover the activities of all its agents or employees.
Section 5. That an iterant merchant or an iterant vendor as the terms are used in this ordinance shall be held to be any person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof.
Section 6. That the license fee for an iterant merchant or iterant vendor shall be \$100.00, provided, however, when a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engages in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees, such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association, shall, in addition to said \$100.00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$100.00 for each agent or employee so engaged, all of which licenses shall be valid for one year from the date of their issuance. The fees herein provided for shall be used for the purpose of defraying expenses incident to the issuing of aid licenses.
Section 7. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to sales by to dealers by commercial travellers or sales agents in the usual course of business, nor to ale made under authority and by order of law, nor to vendors of farm or dairy products who actually produce said products on their own premises.
Section 8. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged in interstate commerce as that term is herein defined; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for persons engaged in interstate commerce to go from house to house or place to place in the City of Silvertown, Texas, or to sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purposes of taking orders for the sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Silvertown, Texas, without having first registered without having first registered with the City Secretary of said city, giving the following information:
(a) Name, home address and local address, if any, of registrant.
(b) Name and address of the person, firm or corporation, if any, that he or she represents or for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.
(c) Nature of the articles or things which are to be sold or for which orders are to be solicited.
(d) Whether registrant, upon any sale or order shall demand or receive or accept payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery.
(e) Period of time which registrant wishes to solicit or sell in said city.
and said persons shall file a bond as required by Section 4 of this ordinance.
The registrant at the time of registration, as herein provided for, shall submit for inspection of the City Secretary written proof of his identity which may be in the form of an automobile operator's license, identification letter or card issued to registrant by the person, firm or corporation for whom or through whom orders are to be solicited or cleared.
The term "interstate commerce" means soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, photographs, newspapers or magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines which, at the time the order is taken, are in another state or will be produced in another state and shipped or introduced into this city in the fulfillment or such orders.
Section 9. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance or failing to observe any provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$200.00, and each and every day or fraction of a day during which this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be violated, shall be deemed a separate offense and punishable as such.
Section 10. Each and every day, paragraph, sentence and clause of this ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof shall be ineffective, invalid, or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone.
Section 11. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.
Section 12. It is deemed that an emergency exists for the passage of this ordinance and that the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting be suspended, and that this ordinance be passed as and take effect as an emergency measure and such rule is hereby suspended and this ordinance is passed as and shall take effect as an emergency measure and shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its passage and approval, and it is so ordained.
