NO PEDDLERS OR SOLICITORS ALLOWED CITY ORDINANCE NO. 186

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND REGULATING ITERANT MER-CHANTS, ITERANT VENDORS, PEDDLERS, AND PERSONS SELL-ING OR TAKING ORDERS FOR GOODS, WARES, MERCHANDISE, SEVICES, PHOTOGRAPHS, NEWSPAPERS, MAGAZINES OR SUB-SCRIPTIONS TO NEWSPAPERS OR MAGAZINES: PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE AND A LICENSE FEE: REQUIRING A BOND: EXEMPT-ING THOSE ENGAGED IN INTERSTATE COMMERCE FROM LIC-ENSE FEE AND BOND, BUT REQUIRING SUCH PERSONS TO RE-GISTER WITH THE CITY SECRETARY: AND PROVIDING PENAL-TIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, INCLUDING A FINE NOT LESS THAN \$10.00 NOR MORE THAN \$200.00: CONTAIN-ING A SEVERABILITY OR SAVING CLAUSE: REPEALING CON-FLICTING PROVISIONS OF ALL OTHER ORDINANCES: AND DE-CLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF SILVERTON, TEXAS: Section 1. This entire ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the City of Silverton, for the public safety, comfort, convenience and protection of the city and citizens of said city, and all of the provisions hereof shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.

Section 2. That is shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Silverton, Texas, soliciting, selling or taking orders for or offering to sell or take orders for any goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines or subscriptions to newpaper or magazines, or for any iterant vendor to sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Silverton, without having first applied for and obtained a license so to do from the City Secretary of said city. It shall also hereafter be unlawful to sell or solicit in said city as aforesaid without carrying such license while engaged in such soliciting or selling. The term "iterant vendor" as used herein means and includes and shall be construed to mean and include all persons, firms, associations or corporations as well as their agents and employees, who engage in temporary or transient business in the City of Silverton, Texas, of selling or offering for sale and goods, wares or merchandise or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof. The word "temporary" as used herein means and shall be construed to mean any such business transacted or conducted in the City of Silverton, Texas, for which definite arrangements have not been made for the hire, rental or lease of premises for at least 90 days in or upon which said business is to be operated or conducted, or from which said business is to be operated or conducted. The word, "transient" as used herein means and shall be construed to mean any such business of an iterant vendor as defined herein as may be operated or conducted by persons, firms, or corporations or by their agents or employees who reside away from the City of Silverton, Texas, or who have fixed places of business in places other than the City of Silverton, Texas, or who move stocks of goods, wares or merchandise or samples thereof into the City of Silverton, Texas, with the purpose or intention of removing them or the unsold portion thereof away from said city before the expiration of 90 days.

Section 3. That any person desiring to go from house to house or from place to place in the City of Silverton, Texas, to sell or solicit orders for goods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, newspapers, magazines, or subscriptions to newspapers or magazines, or any iterant vendor desiring to sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Silverton, Texas, shall make written application to the City Secetary of said city for a license so to do at least 5 days prior to the date of his contemplated sale or exhibit to be held in the City of Silverton, Texas, which application shall show the name and address of applicant, the name and address of the person, firm or corporation, if any, that he or she represents and the kind of goods offered for sale, and wether such applicant supon any such sale or order shall demand, accept or receive payment or deposit of money in advance of final delivery, and the period of time such applicant wishes to sell or solicit in said city.

Section 4. The application mentioned in Section 3 hereof shall be accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of \$2,000.00 signed by applicant and signed, as surety, by some surety company authorized to do business in the State of Texas, conditioned for the final delivery of gods, wares, merchandise, services, photographs, magazines and newspapers in accordance with the terms of any order obtained prior to delivery and also conditioned to indemnify any and all purchasers or customers for any and all defects in material or workmanship that may exist in the article sold by the principal of said bond, at the time of delivery, and that may be discovered by such purchaser or customer

one bond, in the sum of 2,000.00 as above required, which bond shall be made to cover the activities of all its agents or employees.

Section 5. That an iterant merchant or an iterant vendor as the terms are used in this ordinance shall be held to be any person, firm, com- THE STATE OF TEXAS pany, partnership, corporation or association engaged in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof.

Section 6. That the license fee for an iterant merchant or iterant vendor shall be \$100.00, provided, however, when a person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association engages in any activity mentioned in Section 2 hereof through one or more agents or employees, such person, firm, company, partnership, corporation or association, shall, in addition to said \$100.00 fee above mentioned, pay a license fee of \$100.00 for each agent or employee so engaged, all of which licenses shall be valid for one year from the date of their issuance. The fees herein provided for shall be used for the purpose of defraying expenses incident to the issuing of aid licenses.

Section 7. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to sales by to dealers by commercial travellers or sales agents in the usual course of business, nor to ale made under authority and by order of law, nor to vendors of farm or dairy products who actually produce said products on their own premises.

Section 8. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to persons engaged in interstate commerce as that term is herein defined; provided, however, that it shall be unlawful for persons engaged in interstate commerce to go from house to house or place to place in the City of Silverton, Texas, or to sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purposes of taking orders for the sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Silverton, Texas, without having first registered placed in my hands for execution without having first registered with the City Secretary of said city, giving the following information:
