Our public school teachers are sorely underpaid.
This is a statement heard frequently and agreed with usually by all teachers and most citizens.
Our teachers are pushing hard to get a pay raise but the average citizen is just sitting back as a spectator when he should be actively participating in this fight.
Frequently this excuse for inactivity is stated:
"Why, I know some of those teachers up there. They don't know as much as I do and believe me, they're being paid too MUCH!"
In a few cases, we may agree.
This is exactly the reason why we should be promoting a pay raise. To that large group of competent and capable teachers we should certainly grant more pay and more prestige.
And to the other group, small, but still present, we sincerely plead eliminate them.
For a pay raise because that will do it is not enough to say that a teacher is being paid as much as he is worth or more. The object should be to get rid of those teachers who do not measure up. The only way to do that is to make teaching jobs so desirable that the teaching profession can have its pick of the "cream."
This is a matter of vital concern to every parent and to every citizen.
We say **PROMOTE THE PAY RAISE**—promote it to give those who deserve it a break and to get rid of the others.

RECIPE FOR QUICK CINNAMON BREAD

¾ cup lukewarm water (¾ cup fresh milk may be used); 1 pkg. yeast; 2 T sugar; ½ tsp. salt; 2 T melted margarine or oil; ¼ tsp. cinnamon; ¼ tsp. vanilla; 1 egg, slightly beaten; 2½ cups flour, sifted; ¼ cup dried milk solids.

Add yeast to warm water and let dissolve about 5 minutes. Then add sugar, salt, melted margarine or oil, cinnamon, vanilla, and slightly beaten egg. Combine dried milk with flour and add to above mixture. Beat vigorously for 2 to 3 minutes. Cover and set in warm place to rise until doubled in bulk. (45 to 60 minutes.) Then pour batter in greased 8x8 pan and cover top with glaze. Then immediately in the 375 F. oven for 25-30 minutes. Serves 8. Batter may be dropped by tablespoons into greased muffin pans.

GLAZE: ¾ cup sugar; 1 tsp. cinnamon; 3 T water; 1/3 cup melted margarine; ¼ to ½ cup nuts.

WHY I BELIEVE THE BIBLE

The Bible claims to be the word of God. Over 2000 times the expression, "Thus saith the Lord," is found on its pages. It tells us "God has spoken" (Hebrews 1:1-2). It says that "Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (11 Peter 1:21). The scriptures are inspired (11 Tim. 3:16-17). Some say the Bible is a good book but not inspired of God. This cannot be. If it is not the word of God, it is a fraud. Are there good reasons for believing the Bible to be the inspired word of God? We believe there are.

THE UNITY AND HARMONY OF THE BIBLE. The volume called the Bible is composed of 66 books. These were not all written at the same time. They were written by about forty different men over a period of about sixteen hundred years. These men wrote on many subjects and approached them from a variety of angles. Finally, the books were assembled and bound together. As one reads he is impressed with the fact that HERE IS ONE BOOK! Harmony, unity, and consistency are seen throughout. The records are complimentary and supplementary rather than contradictory. Suppose a group of scientists should thus compose a book. What do you suppose would be the result? It would be filled with inconsistencies. Yes, the unity of a book produced under such varying circumstances and by so many different men argues strongly for the supernatural guidance of these men. This evidence we are now considering is called "internal evidence." The Bible carries its evidence of inspiration upon its pages. One of the best ways to increase your faith in the Bible is to read it.

PROHECIES AND FULFILLMENT. Possibly the point on internal evidence that impresses the Bible reader most is the remarkable foreknowledge displayed by the writers. They wrote of future events as accurately as if they had been recording history. This constitutes a strong link in the chain of evidence. There are three outstanding groups of prophecies in the Old Testament Scriptures.

Those prophecies pertaining to the rise and fall of nations and the destruction of cities. Josh. 6:26 was fulfilled more than five hundred years after it was uttered (1 Kings 16:34). Both Nahum and Zephaniah foretold the destruction of Nineveh. Isaiah predicted the fall of Babylon and gave the name of Cyrus before that king was born (Isa. 45:1). Daniel predicted the successive rise and fall of the world empires (Daniel 2). The destruction of Jerusalem was described by Jesus before it occurred. (Matt. 24).

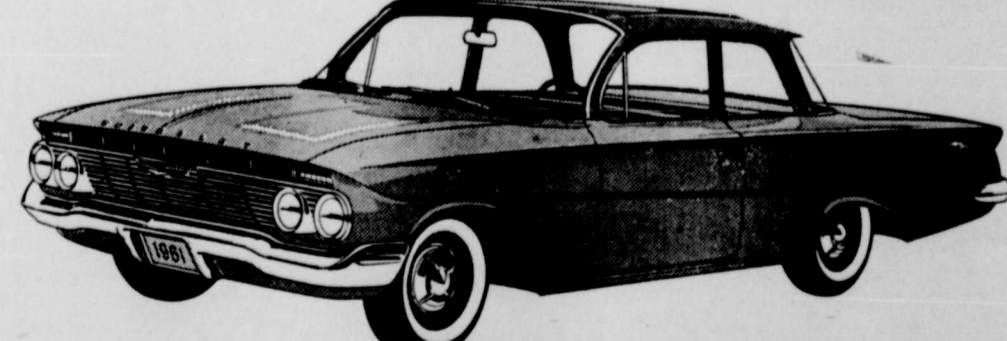
