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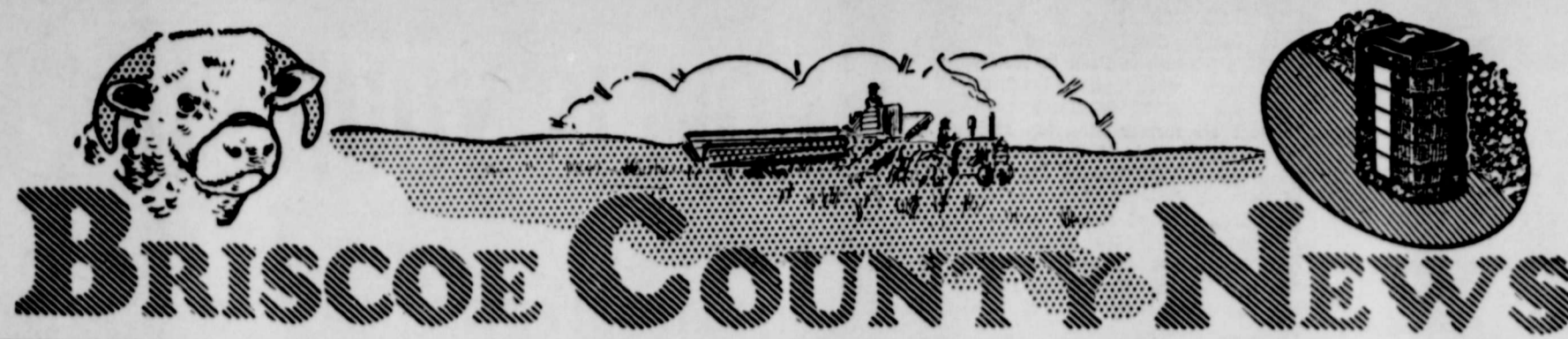

NEW METHODIST PASTOR IS NO NEWCOMER TO BRISCOE COUNTY

Rev. Marvin Fisher, who has come to serve the First Methodist Church in Silverton, is no newcomer to Briscoe County. Having been appointed to serve the Methodist Church in Quitaque in June, 1949, and remaining there until 1951, he is familiar with this county and is renewing old friendships as he makes new ones.

When Rev. Fisher and his wife, Ruth, assumed the pastorate at the Quitaque church, the congregation was meeting in a crumbling old basement which at the time of its building had been intended as the foundation of a fine large building which never materialized.

The congregation decided in the fall of 1949 to tear out the old basement and build a new church. From an idea born in the mind of Mrs. Fisher and other ideas, an architect's drawing and plans for the new church were drawn. The contractor's estimated figures for the building amounted to \$61,544.80. However, it was through the generous discounts of business houses which furnished materials, the supervision of the construction foreman, Elbert Hedrick of Turkey, the cooperation from workmen who donated labor, and utilization of material salvaged from the old basement which had served as a church for more than 20 years, the cost was cut to a little more than \$32,425.00.

The new church stands today on the same site on which the Quitaque Methodist Church has been located since 1908. The dedication service was held on November 19, 1950. The last service held in the old basement was on December 4, 1949, when Mrs. Fisher's father, Rev. J. M. Dye of Littlefield, a retired minister, preached the sermon. Services were then held in the school auditorium and later in the hospital building until the beautiful new church was completed.

Since leaving Quitaque, the Fishers have served the Wesley Memorial Methodist Church in Big Spring, First Methodist Church in McLean, and the Methodist Churches in O'Donnell and Lorenzo. For the past year they have resided in Childress.

Rev. and Mrs. Fisher have one son, Rev. Delton Fisher, pastor of the Methodist Church at Leuder, Texas. Delton married the former Rose Davis while the family lived at Quitaque. Rose is the sister of Mrs. John Francis, of Silverton.

Delton and Rose have two daughters, Eugenia and Janis. In the first services in the church here last Sunday morning, J. S. Hinds introduced Rev. and Mrs. Fisher to the congregation. An unusual sidelight is that this is the third time Mr. Hinds has been a member of Rev. Fisher's congregation.

Rev. Fisher in a special statement to the news, stated that he and his wife, who wish to be known as Marvin and Ruth, come to Silverton with love in their hearts and a Christian attitude and spirit, hoping that the community will gain from their being here and hoping that they will gain from having come our way.

The congregation of the church is happy to welcome the Fishers and believe that their ministry in Silverton will be a blessing to both the church and community.

Thrips in The Cotton Fields

The time has arrived once again when cotton farmers find themselves comforted with the question of spraying for early season insect control, or losing some early cotton to the bugs.

As the wheat begins to ripen and the weeds mature, thrips, the very tiny but costly insects, are invading the cotton fields.

By looking very closely in the terminal buds of the very small cotton, a grower may find eight or ten thrips at work sucking the life juices from the plant.

Thrips normally cause heaviest damage from the time of plant emergence until early squaring. The first sign of thrips damage on newly emerged cotton is wilted, wrinkled, blackened leaves and terminal growth. A severe attack of thrips causes silvering of the lower leaf surfaces.

Bill Verden, Robert Ledbetter, Briscoe County Agricultural Agent Clarence Kerns can give you valuable information on this tiny insect pest. Guide for controlling cotton insects in the High Plains suggested in Leaflet 508, Extension Service, is available at your County Agent's office.

This fleet belongs to Sanders and Pepper, custom harvestors, who make Plainview their headquarters. The wheat grown on this section had received hail, and first expectations were exceeded when

the final average totaled 22 bushels per acre. On the three sections, all receiving hail, which were harvested for Mr. Graham, the average was 17 bushels per acre. It has been estimated that the harvest in this county is 80 to 90% complete with yields which average higher than did those of the previous year in spite of hail storms received. Soon the combine crews which have been so numerous here will move northward with the ripening grains.

Silverton Receives Nice Shower

A summer shower cooled temperatures a bit Monday afternoon when .17 of an inch was measured in Silverton. Harvesting operations were slowed by the dampness, but were rolling again by noon on Tuesday.

The shower was a welcomed refresher to yard plants and flowers, as well as to the young cotton and feed crops. Heavier rain and hail was reported in Floyd County near South Plains Monday afternoon. Wheat crops in that area were said to have received serious damage.

Tuesday evening showers again visited the area. Tullia reported two inches which fell in about two hours' time, flooding drainage systems and causing highways to be closed to traffic for a short time.

Showers received in Silverton Tuesday night were very light. Cloudy skies and occasional sprinkles were the order of the day on Wednesday, with measurable rain forecast.

HIGHWAY PATROL INVESTIGATED ONE RURAL ACCIDENT IN MAY

The highway patrol investigated one rural accident on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of May, according to Sgt. D. R. Dowdy, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

This accident accounted for a property damage of \$800.00. This brings the total for the first five months of 1961 in this county to

six rural traffic crashes resulting in no persons being killed, one injured, and a combined property damage amounting to \$1,670.00.

In the thirty-one-county area, nine fatalities have been reported in five traffic accidents this year.

In Potter County one was killed in one accident; in Wheeler County, two died in one accident; and in Wilbarger County, six died in three traffic mishaps.

A total of 103 accidents have been investigated so far this year. The property damage total for the year to date is \$75,685.00.

After noting the accident picture for this county for the first five months of this year, the Sergeant pointed out another significant fact. As summer approaches with longer days and additional good driving weather, the driver should be especially aware of the danger period at dusk. Many accidents happen during this period. One cause of this is the driver fails to turn on his lights soon enough. Although the law sets out when lights must be turned on, the driver should also use his own good judgment. Any time a driver cannot see an unlighted object approximately one-half mile away, he should turn his lights on. He may be able to see the other driver, but can the other driver see you?

New Water Well Connection Is Completed

The newest well of the City of Silverton water system has now been connected and is contributing mightily to the water supply here.

Line difficulties last Saturday left the city almost without water, as most residents realized when a tiny stream of water trickled from open faucets.

Now that the connection has been made and the storage tanks are full of water, no further shortage is expected.

John Arnold, who played an important role in the development of Silverton and Briscoe County, died at his home here at 7:25 p.m. Thursday, June 8. He had been bedfast since 1958, and his condition had become much worse several days before his death.

Mr. Arnold was born on September 27, 1884, in Uvalde County, and moved to Silverton as a small child with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Arnold.

On March 13, 1912, John Arnold was married to Miss Gertrude Braidfoot in the home of her parents in Silverton. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. W. F. Cunningham.

He was elected County Clerk on August 22, 1942, and served two terms in that office. After leaving public office, he was employed by Willson-Nichols Lumber Company in Silverton as a bookkeeper.

Mr. Arnold was a member of the Silverton First Baptist Church, the Odd Fellows Lodge and the W.O.W. (Woodmen of the World) Lodge.

A new series of articles from back files of the Briscoe County News

In 1925 Delux Ford Fordor sedans were selling for \$660. A cheaper Ford Touring Car could be purchased for \$290. Closed cars were advertised in color. Demountable rims and starters were extra on open cars.

A typical joke of 1925: "The average flapper has to look at herself every ten minutes."

"At least she receives no startling jars. Usually she looks rather well."

If you have to read the joke twice to get the meaning, don't worry. This joke, a real side-splitter in its day, doesn't even seem humorous to most of us.

The Carter-Houston Department Store in Silverton featured men's Florsheim shoes at \$4.95 a pair, silk or wool suits at \$25.50, women's silk dresses starting at \$9.75, and women's silk hose at \$1.39 a pair.

The Silverton football team's record was quite impressive in 1925 4 wins, 1 loss and 1 tie.

November 26, 1925: Saturday night the Junior girls and part of the Seniors went to a slumber party at Miss Anna Burson's. The girls present were Misses Dickerson, Pyeatt, Morgan, Bomar, Cloyd, Jackson, Crawford, Coffey Frieze and Burson.

The music department of S.H.S. presented "Miss Cherryblossom," a musical comedy, on December 18, 1925. Playing the title roll was Anna Burson. True Burson, Edwin Crass and W. E. Schott had supporting roles. Zelda Brown, Inetha Montague, Iris Crawford, and many others were also in the play. From all indications, the musical was a genuine success.

Articles from the December 17, 1925, edition of the Briscoe County News:

Yes, sir, a cow belongs to the local Methodist Church. No, she didn't come in by the usual methods. Members of the flock went out in the byways and forced her to come. The new pastor, W. L. Jenkins, has a large family and there are several youngsters who demand a certain amount of milk at every meal . . .

"THEY SO SPAKE"

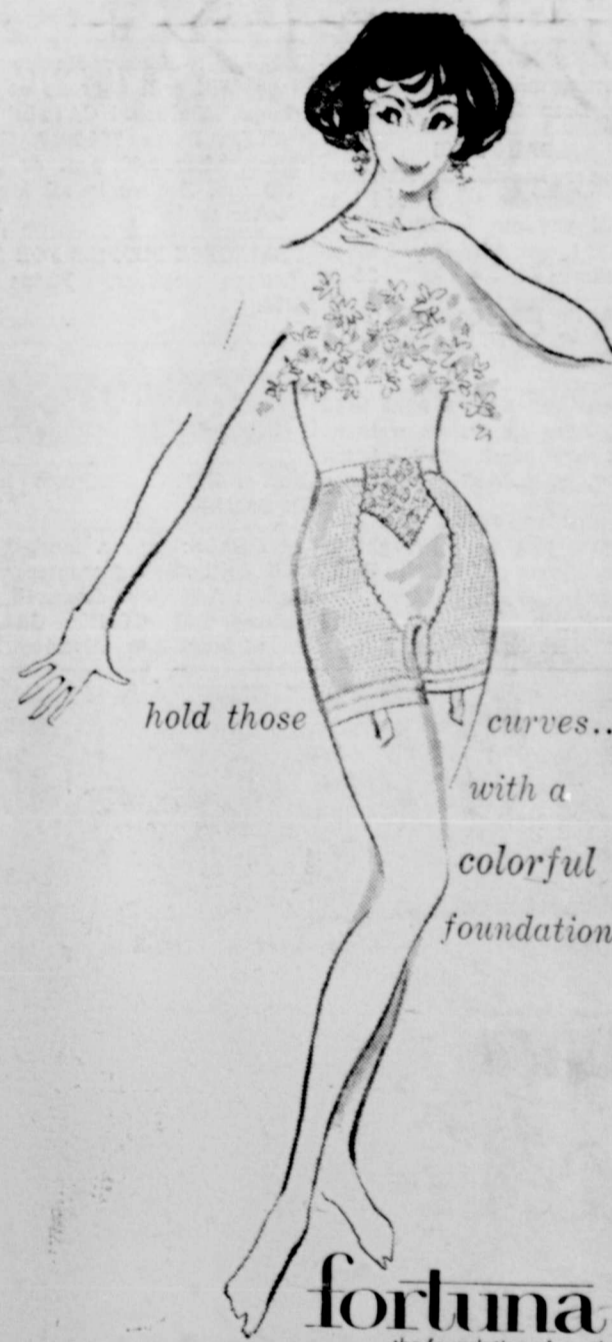
