Highway Patrol Investigated One Accident

The Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of June, according to Sgt D. R. Dowdy, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

This wreck accounted for a property damage of \$500.00.

The Rural Traffic Summary for Briscoe County during January through June of 1961 shows a total of 7 crashes. As a result of these crashes there was one person injured and no persons killed. The estimated property damage amounted to \$2,170.00. This compares with the first six months of 1960's total of nine rural crashes injuring seven people, killing no persons and causing an estimated property damage of \$6,130.00.
