All Around the Town

I had a dream last week. Far from being the delightful fantasy I usually enjoy, I awoke from it shaken. To achieve the state of mind required for a nightmare such as this, I had not eaten some wild conglomeration of foods as does Dagwood, of newspaper comic strip fame.

We had listened to President Kennedy's address to the nation before retiring, and the comments of newsmen and senators which followed the message had made me think how likely it is that many of our friends and relatives may soon be called to wear the uniform of our country. I went to sleep, as I am sure other wives of men of draft age also did, with thoughts of how we will be affected by this Berlin crisis, and the personal sacrifices that will have to be made.

It is not unusual for me to dream up a nightmare occasionally, but I usually awaken with only vague memories of the episode. In this particular sequence, the "boogie man" had an identity. I could see faces very clearly, though I recognized none of them. The scene was clearly here in Briscoe County. We were attending a drive-in movie. Some people in another car kept annoying us, and we left before it was over. We were proceeding as usual along the highway home, when we noticed the car was following us.

They tried to run us off the road, drove up the road and turned around. We locked the car doors, drove off the highway, and ducked into the seat of the car. They passed again, and we resumed our trip home.

When we stopped at our house, the car passed the house. We again hid ourselves (not a very logical action) so they would not see us. After they had rounded the corner, we dashed into the walls of our heretofore private domain and locked the doors behind us. The car, which had five or six men and women occupants, stopped in front of the house.

I ran to the telephone, dialed the operator in the dark and asked her to connect me with the Sheriff. She replied that she could not, because all the lines in Silverton were down—yet, mine was not.

Shocked, I began to realize that these people had the situation well under control. They not only knew where we were and what we were doing, but they had observed us (and likely our neighbors) long enough to know our pattern of habit.

So, finding help unavailable, we crept into a hiding place where we could observe the moves of the aggressor. Another car with a similar number of men and women relieved those who had been there. They prepared a light and it shone in on us. I held my breath, hoping I would not die of a heart attack, and silently praying that they would either overlook me or think the other group had already disposed of me.

Then I awoke. A light was shining in my face. I lay there and shook until Reality was kind enough to point out to me that the curtains had blown open and a light from outside was shining in my face. I was safe in my own bed and there was no one threatening me. Or was there? That annoyingly persistent thought gnawed at me.

They ARE present. I cannot recognize them, but they are present watching and planning. In the analysis of the President's message, it was stated that the speech was designed to alert, not panic, the nation. Clearly, I had gone overboard in my thinking, but nevertheless, the situation is serious.

It is true that our country is probably on the brink of disaster. We are just exactly as so often described—fat and lazy—wallowing in

Quarter Horse Clinic Is Slated Aug. 11-12

In other action, Umbarger took a tighter hold on second place with a 6-3 victory at the expense of Nazareth, Plainview moved in-

In 1943, as in the other war years, merchants capitalized on the war and used it very effectively in their advertising. For instance, this ad: **HELP STOP SABOTAGE ON THE HOME FRONT!** Just like Tojo the Jap, **MOTHS STRIKE WITHOUT WARNING!**

May 24, 1943: Thursday afternoon, May 20, a special assembly of high school students was called to consider the adoption of a new school song, "Alma Mater." Using the music of the school song of Spur, the students were invited to write new words. Mr. McCarty, Superintendent, submitted a complete song. Carolyn and June Wimberly also wrote lyrics for the song. The judges, Miss Linton, Mrs. Wilkerson, and Mrs. Hutchinson combined the two lyrics, taking the first stanza of Mr. McCarty's, with the chorus and second stanza of Carolyn and June's offering to make the following:

On the boundless plains of Texas

'Neath a clear blue sky,
 Proudly stands our Alma Mater
 As the years go by.

Hail to thee, our Alma Mater,
 Let our voices ring.
 We will praise thee everlasting,
 Hail, all hail, we sing.

When we travel life's long journey
 We will think of thee
 As the symbol of our making;
 Faithful we will be.

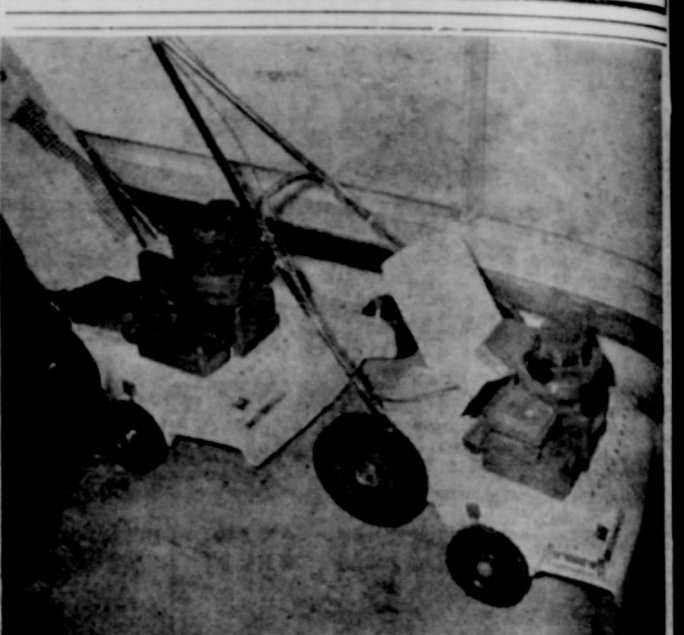
