

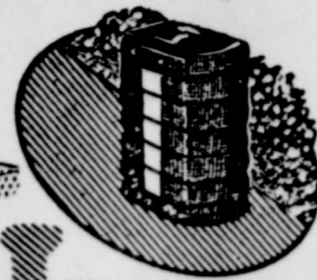

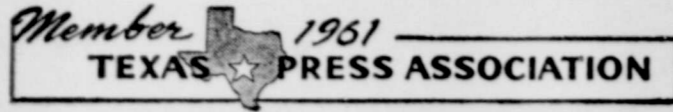

The Lions Club plans to have a food concession at the VFW Rodeo. Make your plans to eat with the Lions.

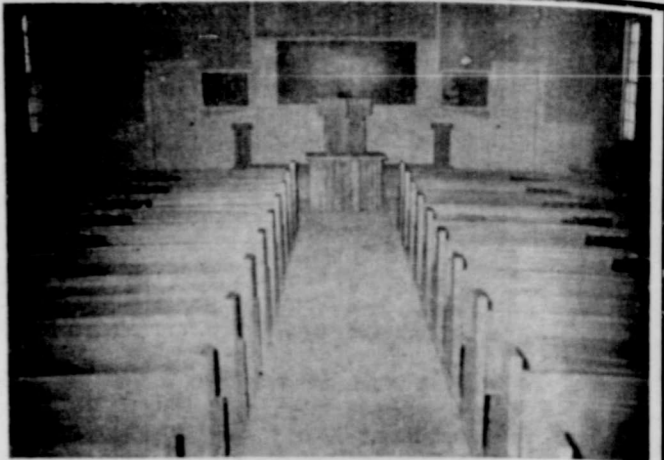

**OBITUARY**

MOHLER, IDAHO — A farm wife alone in a burning house lost her life recently while trying to save momentos of her children and her mother.

Lewis County Sheriff, Buel Bartlett, Nezperce, said Mrs. Paul (Nora) Ragan, 41, apparently had discovered the fire, which broke out about 10 p. m. and had run upstairs to get the items. She was trapped in the stairway by flames on her way down.

Her body was found in the remains of the stairway. Clutched in her arms were charred booklets containing photographs and the history of each of her two children and a few things which had belonged to her mother. Her mother was killed in the tornado in Silverton in 1957.

It was 4:30 a. m. Sunday before authorities and friends could cool and clear the ruins of the building enough to reach the body.

The fire was reported by a neighbor and by three forest look-outs. Fear was expressed then that Mrs. Ragan might be in the house.

Her husband, Paul Ragan, was at Lewiston at the time of the fire. Their daughter, Sharon, 15, had gone to Grangeville with friends and their son, Gary, 16, was at a show at Nezperce.

Fire fighting equipment was dispatched by the Craig Mountain Fire Protective District and Kamiah Highway District. However, the house had almost burned to the ground by the time equipment could reach it.

Lewis County Coroner Phillip Clovis of Craigmont ruled the death accidental.

Mrs. Ragan was born February 5, 1920, in Archer County, Texas. She attended high school in Silverton and business college, and worked for the sheriff and tax assessor's office in Silverton. She attended Hunter College in New York City, then joined the Women's Marine Corps, serving from 1943 to 1945.

She was married to Paul Ragan at Santa Barbara, California, July

Are some farmers placing too much reliance on vaccination in today's livestock health picture? Are some relying on it too little?

The answer is "Yes" in both cases. Plain misunderstanding of present-day livestock vaccines, how they should be used and how they should not be used, lies at the root of much of the livestock operator's failure to get full value out of modern vaccination.

Take hog cholera, as a case in point. Heavy cholera outbreaks are striking again in many areas because farmers let down their guard. Lulled into false security because they had "gotten by" without vaccination for a few years, they coasted along. Now, cholera is striking again with serious losses. Farmers simply forgot that the only way to stop cholera is to keep hogs vaccinated against it.



The vaccinating needle can be a friend or enemy of the livestock owner, depending on whether used properly or improperly.

But vaccination involves more than merely sticking a vaccinating syringe into an animal and letting nature do the rest. The condition of the animal needs to be checked, there is often a choice between different types of vaccines, there is a right way and a wrong way to do the vaccinating; for these reasons, a good many livestock owners leave the whole matter up to their veterinarian. Then they know their animals will be protected and protected properly.

Another important point—there is a growing list of diseases against which protection can be given by vaccination today. These include cholera, erysipelas, enterotoxemia, blackleg, anthrax, sleeping sickness, rhinotracheitis, brucellosis, leptospirosis and others. The farmer who doesn't inform himself on these, and have his animals vaccinated when the need arises, is missing a bet, and missing profits.

But, vaccination alone isn't the magic answer. There has to be good husbandry and good management, too. Good management, plus proper use of modern protective vaccination, is an almost unbeatable combination for better profits.

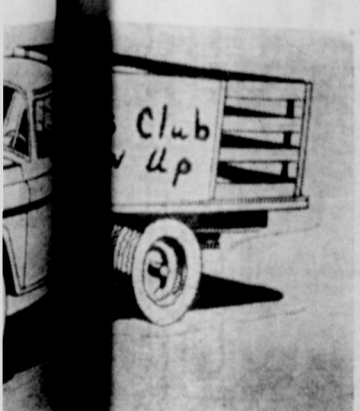

### Beneficiaries May Receive More Now

"Recent changes in the Social Security Law mean that a beneficiary, generally speaking, can now get more in combined earnings and benefits than he could previously," Hal Geldon, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, said today.

Beneficiaries who earn over \$1200 and \$1700, and a dollar of benefits for each dollar of earnings over \$1700. Except that they are eligible for social security benefits for any month in which they do not earn over \$100 in wages and have not worked in their own business.

"After age 72, there is no restriction on a person's earnings, although the limits apply to all months before the 72nd birthday," Geldon said.

If you or anyone in your family is receiving old-age and survivors insurance and expect to earn over \$1200 during the year, it is important to notify the Social Security Office promptly of such earnings in order to avoid receiving an over-payment. All such overpayments must be repaid.

"This applies to all people receiving social security benefits," Geldon said, "including wives, widows, and dependent children under 18 as well as the retired person."

#### Tax Facts For Drivers

Last year, you and your fellow motorists in the United States paid more than \$12 billion in Federal, state and local taxes for owning and operating cars. That's ten per cent of all Federal-state taxes for the year.

Nearly half this money came from the tax on gasoline. The gasoline tax adds, on the average, 47¢ to every dollar's worth of gasoline you buy. (When you spend a dollar at a night club, 10¢ goes for taxes.) On a gallon of gasoline, the Federal Government gets 4 cents. The state tax varies from 4 to 7 cents. Nationally, the total of Federal and state gasoline taxes averages 10.15 cents per gallon.

Some cities add a sales tax. In some places, a motorist pays a sales tax on the fuel and on the Federal and state taxes. In a few areas, there are also city and county gasoline taxes.

Since 1950 the cost of living has gone up 21 per cent. The price of gasoline has gone up only 5 per cent—but fuel taxes have risen 51 per cent.

Even more money is paid through "other automotive taxes"—10 per cent excise tax on new cars, 8 per cent on parts and accessories, and taxes on special fuels and lubricants, plus registration fees, drivers' licenses, sales taxes, tolls, parking meter fees, and personal property taxes on motor vehicles.

But tax or no tax, your car is still your most convenient transportation.
