## Owls Fall To Matadors In Season Opener

Silverton's Owls traveled to Matador last Friday evening to suffer a 47-0 defeat at the hands of the more-experienced Matadors. The Matadors indicated that pre-season expectations may be fulfilled as they scampered through the game, scoring twice in each of the first three quarters and once in the fourth period of play. Displaying their kicking skill, the Matadors completed five out of seven conversion attempts. One kick fell short, and one attempted run for two points also failed. The Owls completed four drives good for first downs; the Matadors drove for eleven first-and-tens, in addition to several long runs for touchdowns. In the passing department, both

teams failed to make a good showing. Matador attempted five passes and had all five of them fall short of the intended receivers. Silverton attempted six, had three of them fall incomplete, and completed three of them to eager Matadors. Matador fumbled and lost the ball twice, and Silverton fumbled three times, giving the ball over to the host team all three times. Silverton received a 15-yard penalty for roughness, while the Matadors drew penalties totaling twenty-five yards for being off-side and for holding. Silverton's inexperienced young team showed sparks of greatness, especially in the second quarter of play. However, they were no match for the more experienced Matadors.

Stubble Mulch Farming and/or Crop Residue Use

With a protective surface mulch, farmers using modern implements can reduce wind and water erosion, increase water intake, and add organic matter to their soil.

Stubble-mulch farming offers one of the most economical and effective measures for controlling erosion and conserving moisture in the dryland areas.

Briefly, stubble mulching means keeping as much plant residue as possible on the soil's surface for protection against wind and water erosion. Each tilling, planting, cultivating and harvesting operation is performed with that objective in mind.

Some of the most effective implements used for stubble mulch farming are the Hamey plow, equipped with chisels or with sub-surface blades or sweeps, one-way disc, with shallow tillage operations.

Some of the farmers and ranchers who are doing a good job of stubble mulching are Walter Graham, J. T. Persons, and Bert Hawkins in the Quitaque area, and E. A. Birdwell, Johnnie Burson and Frank Cobb on top of the Caprock. Today's farmer can practice stubble-mulch farming easily and economically, and, of more importance, he can protect his soil from erosion by wind and rain.

## Witnesses Cancel Local Meetings

Jehovah's Witnesses in this area are cancelling all local meetings September 8th through the 10th for their circuit assembly in Wichita Falls, in Barwise Junior High School.

The Texas Circuit No. 9 meet has adopted the theme, "Walk in the Name of Jehovah Forever."

V. D. Tiffin, overseeing minister of the Quitaque Congregation of Witnesses, said, "Jehovah's Witnesses' organization is designed to teach a unified program with a unified force in all of its 1,561 circuits throughout the world."

The highlight of the conference will be Sunday, 3 p. m., when Mackey will speak on the subject, "The 20th Century in Bible Prophecy."

## MEMORIAL FUND IS PART OF CANCER RESEARCH PROJECT

A Memorial Fund Program has been set up in Briscoe Co. where by contributions to the American Cancer Society may be made to the County Chairman.

When a Memorial Gift is made, the family of the deceased is notified with a Memorial card. This card carries the name of the person in whose memory the memorial has been given and the name of the donor. The names of all persons in whose name a Memorial has been given will be entered in a permanent Memorial book of the Texas Division. The donor also receives a receipt card.

Funds from Memorial contributions to the American Cancer Society are used to support cancer research hospitals, laboratories, and clinics; to provide fellowships for doctors and scientists and to help train the manpower needed to carry out future research.

Dr. Clarence Mast of Midland, who is the husband of a former resident of Silverton, Joni Bundy, has recently spent two years doing research for the American Cancer Society in Rochester, N. Carolina.

According to a report from the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society office in Austin, Texas, 11,000 persons died in Texas during 1960 from cancer.

Briscoe County lost 7 persons to the killer. Deaths in surrounding counties are as follows: Motley, 6; Collingsworth, 2; Childress, 15; Donley, 9; Swisher, 11; Hall, 9; Hale, 25; Floyd, 15; Crosby, 15; and Castro, 6.

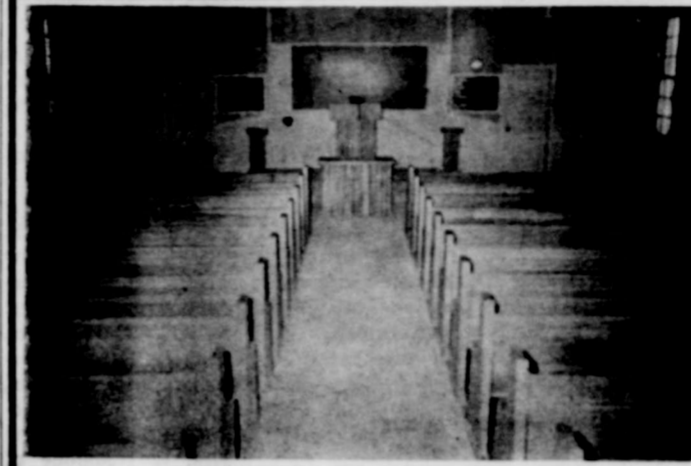
