

Therefore, if we are to believe the Bible. no other foundation can be laid to stay, be it communism, nazism, facism, or even modernism in the churches.

But when a doctrine or a church or a demonination is founded upon the shifting sands of this world or a "penknifed" version of the Holy Bible, it will surely fall, even though it might stand for a while and even prosper. Therefore, let us not be as the foolish man who built his house upon the sand, and when the storm came it fell (Matt. 7:26,27). Let us dig deep into the foundation rock of Jesus Christ and anchor our salvation there It is not the doctrine or the building or the congregation that really counts — it is where the foundation is laid that will decide whether it will stand or fall.




