## Owls Fall To Turks

The Silverton Owls, while making a lot of yards against the Turks last Friday night, failed to hold the ball long enough to make enough points to avoid going down in defeat in a 33-6 ballgame.

Turkey's first touchdown was made after Jerry Weatherly received a pass and ran 70 yards

on the second play of the game. The second Turk tally came when Quarterback Guest ran 17 yards for the touchdown three plays after Weatherly intercepted a Silverton pass.

The last play of the first quarter saw Guest intercept a Silverton pass and carry to the 50 yard stripe. That touched off Turkey's only real drive for pay dirt, and eight plays deep in the second quarter, Turkey's Weatherly received the touchdown pass.

Silverton's touchdown drive began after receiving the Turkey kick-after-touchdown. Jowell carried to the Silverton 44 yard line for a first down; Breedlove picked nine; May drove down to the Turkey 40 yard stripe for a first down; Breedlove carried for another first; Whitfill, May and Breedlove teamed up for the next first down; Breedlove carried down to the one yard line, and May carried the touchdown over.

The next Turkey score came on the first play after Silverton kicked to the Turks. Lane received a long pass at about the Turkey 35 and raced all the way. The final score came in the third quarter, on the next play after Silverton fumbled to Turkey. Weatherly ran 44 yards for the score.

In the fourth quarter Silverton fans were brought to their feet by good runs by Bobby Kitchens and Jay Towe. Towe picked up two first downs and ran down to the Turkey 18 yard line before Silverton fumbled the ball away.

Silverton attempted five passes; had two intercepted; and three were incomplete. Turkey passed eleven times; completed five, three for touchdowns; had six incomplete, and none were intercepted. Silverton fumbled seven times; recovered two of them; and gave the ball away five times. Turkey lost the ball by fumble one time.

Silverton made thirteen first downs as compared to ten made by Turkey. Turkey was penalized 75 yards, while Silverton had 35 yards marched off against them.

This is the second game the Owls have lost while beating the opponent on first downs. The inexperienced players have gained valuable knowledge in these first three games; however, this last game was a good example of the fact that a team that fumbles cannot win.

The Briscoe County News and Silverton Cafe have made an agreement to feed the football boys a congratulatory supper the next week after the first game the Owls win. It is hoped that the dinner will be collected next week, after a Silverton win over Happy Friday night.

## SILVERTON METAL WORKS TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE

In order to expand, McDaniel Hardsurfacing and Fabricating Co. has been incorporated and has been moved to a new location west of Silverton Gin, Inc. The business is now operating as Silverton Metal Works, Inc.

Among the fittings now being mass-produced in the shop are risers and vents for plastic underground irrigation pipe, pump distributors and cooling systems.

A unique assembly line for making clamps for coupling plastic pipe has been originated. Six to 12" clamps are being produced.

These irrigation supplies have been shipped to buyers in Kansas, Arkansas, Nevada, Colorado and the Texas Panhandle.

Services which may be obtained at Silverton Metal Works, Inc. include general farm repair work, hardsurfacing of tillage tools, and aluminum pipe welding. A complete line of flap valves, new six through 15 1/2" pipe, and replacement parts such as extra lids and extra brass screws for Waterman Alfalfa Valves are available.

Plans are now in process for adding several items of interest to farmers and ranchers to the line of goods now offered for sale, including cattle oiler-scratchers, grain beds and dump hoists.

### Seniors Maken Melodye With Chaucer

This language, in which Chaucer wrote his *Canterbury Tales*, is our language as it was spoken in the fourteenth century.
