



There are some who seem to feel they can reserve a few things for themselves and STILL HAVE JESUS. Jesus says IT CAN'T BE DONE. They are only deluding themselves. Jesus knows man's heart. He knows when one has given all to follow Him. (That's what a Christian IS-one that "follows Him.") He says further, to emphasize His point, "Whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not ALL THAT HE HATH, he cannot be My dis ciple," (Lk 14:33). He teaches here that unless we forsake EVERY-THING WE HAVE, that being His disciple is an IMPOSSIBILITY.

It isn't hard to see why there aren't more PRACTICING CHRISTIANS. It costs more than many are willing to pay. Also, it is easy to see why many would like to CHANGE God's word a little-to suit their own ends. There are a few things they don't want to GIVE UP, and by changing His word a little, they can keep those things. They are willing to risk their eternal salvation that God will "let them get by.

Christians are sometimes called "weaklings" and "sissies" by the world. There may be some "sissies" and "weakling" among those who PLAY at Christianity, but don't let anyone tell you it takes less than a MAN, a real HE MAN, to "FORSAKE ALL THAT HE HATH" to follow his Lord. Yes sir, what the world needs is NOT someone to AGREE with Christianity, but somewith the strength of character it takes to unequivocably accept God's will and PRACTICE IT! !


