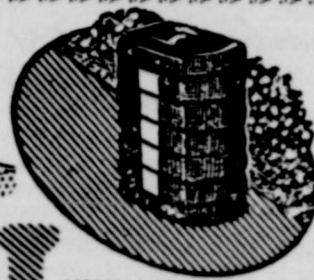
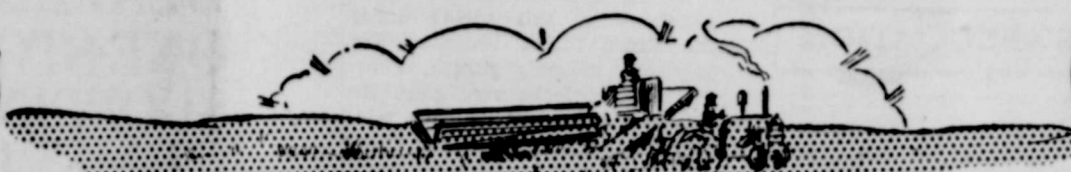

Carolyn Garrison of Silverton, received a \$400 college scholarship Monday night at the 40th Annual 4-H Club Congress which is meeting in Chicago this week. This national award was received for excellence in gardening and was one of 38 awarded for excellence in achievement, beef production, gardening, health and recreation and other facets of the 4-H program.

Allis-Chalmers, the donor of the National Gardening Award, sponsored a dinner for the 4-H Club boys and girls Monday evening. Carolyn represented Silverton by giving the invocation at the dinner, which especially honored the gardening winners.

Carolyn is among eighteen Golden Spread boys and girls who are spending a thrilling week in Chicago. The group were interviewed on television earlier this week. They are the official delegates from Texas and New Mexico, and are among 1,400 club members from all 50 states and several foreign countries.

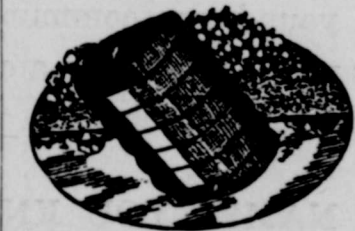
For most of the boys and girls, all state-wide winners in 4-H accomplishments, this is their first visit to Chicago. They are staying at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, which serves as headquarters for the National 4-H Club Congress.

Between free meals, banquets and conferences, these delegates from Texas and New Mexico are joining other 4-H members on educational tours of farm machinery plants, the Chicago Museum of Natural History and Chicago's famous "Loop."

They have also attended a "Pop" Concert in Orchestra Hall and visited the International Livestock Exposition, a nine-day show which was expected to draw 400,000 persons to see 10,000 livestock entries from 37 states and Canada. Awards totaling \$135,000 have been distributed among the 4-H winners.

## LEGAL NOTICE

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 23a of Article 1525b, Vernon's Annotated Penal Code, Proclamation No. 164 was issued on the 26th day of September, A. D., 1961, by the Governor of the State of Texas, designating all of Briscoe County, Texas, as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area, effective on and after the 10th day of January, A. D. 1962; and

WHEREAS, such proclamation designating all of Briscoe County, Texas, as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area was publicized by posting copies thereof in at least three public places within said Briscoe County, Texas, and at the door of the courthouse of the county seat of said County; said proclamation informing the public that a hearing would be held on the 22nd day of November, A. D. 1961, at 9:30 A.M., in the office of the Texas Animal Health Commission, at which hearing any person owning cattle within Briscoe County, Texas, who desired to protest the designation and establishment of said County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area had the

right to appear, either in person or by representative and express to the Texas Animal Health Commission his views and opinions as to why Briscoe County, Texas, should not be designated as set forth in the proclamation issued by the Governor of the State of Texas on the 26th day of September, A. D. 1961; and

WHEREAS, such hearing was held on the designated date and time, and no person appeared at the hearing to protest the designation and establishment of Briscoe County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area;

NOW, THEREFORE, Briscoe County, Texas, is designated as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area effective on and after the 10th day of January, A. D. 1962.

## S.C.S News

Field checks of grass seedings made during 1961 and 1961 showed some very good results. Last week Virgil Henson of the local Soil Conservation Service office checked several grass seedings northwest of Silverton in the San Jacinto area. Merle McMurtry seeded half a section in the spring of 1960. He planted a mixture of side oats grama and blue grama.

McMurtry obtained an excellent stand and the grass looks fine now. All of it made seed and it is about knee high now.

C. M. Flowers seeded about twenty acres this spring under the Great Plains Program. For only one season's growth, Flowers' seeding looks very good. He obtained a good stand of a mixture of about four grasses. Flowers plans to seed some more grass next spring.

For the past few years, we have had good winter moisture. It appears that subsoil moisture, accumulated during the winter, helps assure a good stand of grass and also helps assure that the grass will live. Grass has been observed to come up following a light rain, then die for lack of subsoil moisture.

With the good moisture already received in this area, it appears that this would be another good year for grass seeding.

The technicians of the local Soil Conservation Service will be glad to work with anyone interested in grass seeding this next spring. The Soil Conservation District has a grass seeder available, and we can assist on kinds of grasses, seeding date and rates and other information.

Fatal accidents in all activities totaled 129,000 in 1960, according to figures released by the National Safety Council.

Industrial fatal accidents averaged 16 per 100,000; deaths from falls 12 per 100,000; drownings 4 per 100,000.

Football fatalities ranked near the bottom of the list with an average of 1.1 per 100,000. In the 15 to 19 year age bracket, the incidence of accidental fatality was 40 per 100,000.

Danger Over-Stressed

These data emphasize the fact that football is not as dangerous as stressed in publicity given when a fatality occurs in this sport.

This year in Texas there are 915 schools participating in the league football program. Add the private and parochial schools participating in their own leagues and the total is at least 1,000 schools playing football.

There will be about 15,000 football games played, and untold numbers of contact scrimmages among these various football units.

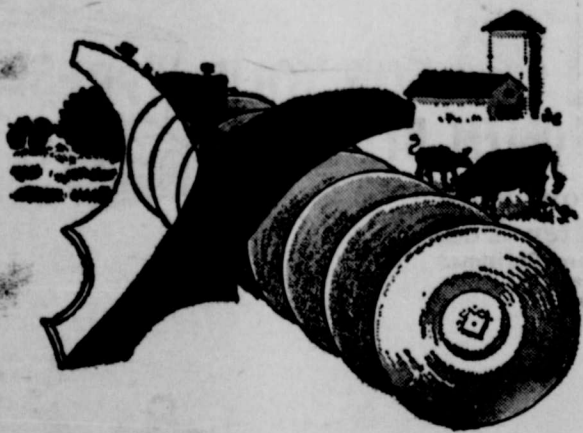
