



2. It results in a larger amount or active organic matter from a given quantity of crude cotton

3. It provides an additional supply of available nitrogen for the crop that follows.

4. It prevents any depression in yield which may result from plowing down heavy applications of cotton burs which are high in woody materials and low in nitro-

We also should remember that decomposition of materials is ac complished by small organisms in the soil. These organisms are only active when the soil temperature is 60 degrees or higher. Also, a good rule of thumb when applying chemical fertilizer to burs or stubble is 20 pounds of actual nitrogen should be applied for every ton of residue applied. Sometime when you have extra heavy wheat or grain stubble and the carbon-nitrogen ratio is very wide, you may need to go to 30 pounds of nitro-





Still, since man must conform to God's will to receive His promises, the question must be asked, "What must God think about it?" We would leave a few thoughts for you to

An allwise God nowhere left us the time of His Son's birth. Had he have wanted it observed, surely He wouldn't have been so absent-minded. About the only thing certain about the time of our Savior's birth is that it WAS NOT Christmas time. This is regarded as certain.

God's word, our guide to perfection (2 Tim 2:16, 17), never authorized any celebration of Christ's birth. To engage in any worship NOT AUTHORIZED is "vain". (Matt 15:9). Christ's resurrection is that which is to be celebrated. It happened on the first day of the week. Christmas in Apostolic times celebrated He death as often as the first day of the week came.

There is no harm in social gatherings, interchanging of gifts and presents, and other kondly offices; but to make it appear a a religious service, done on, and motivated by the birthday of our Savior, may have your or my authority, but it does not have God's authority. Sincere people will do well to hear God again when He says, "Ye shall not ADD unto the word which I command you neither ye diminish aught from it." (Deut 4.2).
