All Around the Town

As the old year, 1961, draws its last fleeting breath and prepares to fade away, and just before the dawn of the new year, we review the months just past and take stock of our resolutions for the future. It is good, at the end of a year, to stop to remember the past...

Residents flocked to the local clinic to secure Schick tests and inoculations against the dread disease which has cropped up due to a general decline in immunity of our population as a whole. The city was fortunate, and an epidemic was prevented, to the relief of all.

John Deere Day was held on January 7, with a large crowd enjoying barbecue and all the trimmings at Ray Thompson Implement Company. The public library reported the addition of a large number of new books through the efforts of the March of Time Study Club's Book Shower and Silver Tea.

Cotton ginning continued into January because of the damp, cold weather conditions.

Frank Cobb purchased two registered Hereford bulls for his herd. The Junior Fat Stock Show was held and Dewey Estes and Warren Lee Merrell exhibited the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion animals. Stanley Fogerson showed the Grand Champion gilt.

Clearance sales dominated the local scene at Salem Dry Goods, Tiffin's Department Store, Vivian's and Bellinger's Department Store.

Woody Frazier succeeded E. I. Jenkins as manager of General Telephone Company, Ralls office.

E. A. Birdwell was named the outstanding conservation farmer and rancher; Tom Barbee, the outstanding come-back farmer and rancher; and O. R. Stark, Jr., was named the outstanding businessman assisting the Soil Conservation District.

Don Thomas closed his Radio and TV Repair Shop to take a position with Santa Fe Railroad. Don is at present serving his country in the armed forces.

Ted Hester sold his service station interests to H. G. Boyles.

Mrs. Ben Whitfill was elected President of the March of Time Study Club, while Mrs. Gene Morris was selected to head the Century of Progress Study Club.

The Junior high boys won the Happy Tournament, and the Junior High girls won second place. The high school boys and girls split two games with Idalou, and won two from Crosbyton.

Mike Baird and Dean Butcher startled the area with the discovery of a "centuries old guillotine," which turned out to be the handwork of an Amarillo citizen who "built it for a backyard conversation piece, and then became frightened and abandoned it." The guillotine, however, was an excellent replica and remains an interesting find.

FEBRUARY, 1961: The Silverton FFA Grass Judging Team won first place in the Amarillo Fat Stock Show. Dick Reid was top individual scorer in the contest, with Jimmy Myers taking fourth highest individual honors, and Lester Grabbe placing eighth.

Quitaque hosted the Briscoe County Soil Fertility Day, and Tomlin-Fleming Gin in Silverton gave a community barbecue to celebrate the ginning of more than 5,500 bales of cotton.

The Silverton Owlettes clinched the district title, while the Owlet tied with Idalou for the championship.

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Strange celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary, and Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Strange observed their silver wedding anniversary.

The Briscoe County News was printed in the Tullia Herald shop due to a press breakdown during the week of February 16.

MARCH, 1961: Teachers were re-elected for the 1961-62 school term and two-year contracts were given to teachers who had been with the school system for five years or longer. Superintendent Hinds was given a new three-year contract.

Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Dunnagin observed their sixtieth anniversary quietly, while Mr. and Mrs. Fulton Gregg celebrated their golden wedding anniversary with open house.

Charles Wayne Mayfield was elected to Phi Kappa Phi, national honorary scholastic society.

The Briscoe County 4-H Clubs celebrated 4-H Week by preparing material for a special edition of the Briscoe County News.

A decision was announced by the VFW Post to rebuild the rodeo arena.

Early spring snows left 2.08 inches of moisture after decorating the landscape with a breathtakingly beautiful blanket.

Two District Federation of Women's Clubs officers were selected from the March of Time Study Club.

Announcement was made that Haun Kite would succeed L. L. Thornton as minister of the Church of Christ in Silverton.

APRIL, 1961: Celene Lanham and Doris Estes earned their State Future Homemaker Degrees. Faris Martin, Shellie Tomlin and Jack Strange were elected to the City Council, while W. E. Schott, Jr., and Ray Teeple were elected to fill vacancies on the school board.

Reports showed that the drop of the underground water level during the past year in Briscoe County had been very slow.

Ann Wingo was elected Lions Club Queen. The T.F.&R. Teens brought home a trophy from the National AAU Tournament in St. Joseph, Missouri. Janice Lewis won the county spelling bee.

The Briscoe County News received two awards at the annual Panhandle Press Association Convention in Amarillo. Silverton was extended a cordial invitation to attend the dedication service of the Sunnyside Baptist Church which had been destroyed a few months earlier by a tornado, and at which time Silverton made a sizeable contribution toward the rebuilding.

Rev. G. A. Elrod, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Silverton for sixteen years, announced his retirement from the ministry. Gene Morris was elected Lion Boss. Mrs. Alvin Redin was awarded a Science Scholarship for six weeks' training at Texas Woman's University at Denton. Mrs. Alva Trout received one of the American Studies Program Scholarships. A spray pilot for Clayton Spraying Service escaped injury in two plane crashes which occurred within 72 hours.

James E. May received his "Wings of Gold" after completing the course of instruction given by the Naval Air Advanced Training Command with a fine record of accomplishment. Toni Rhode was elected Sophomore Senator at Hardin-Simmons University. Carolyn Frizzell and Dave Schott were presented at the annual Personality Pageant at West Texas State College. Mr. and Mrs. H. Celene Lanham was named Valedictorian of the 1961 graduating class, and Dale Francis the Salutatorian. All had a very enjoyable time.

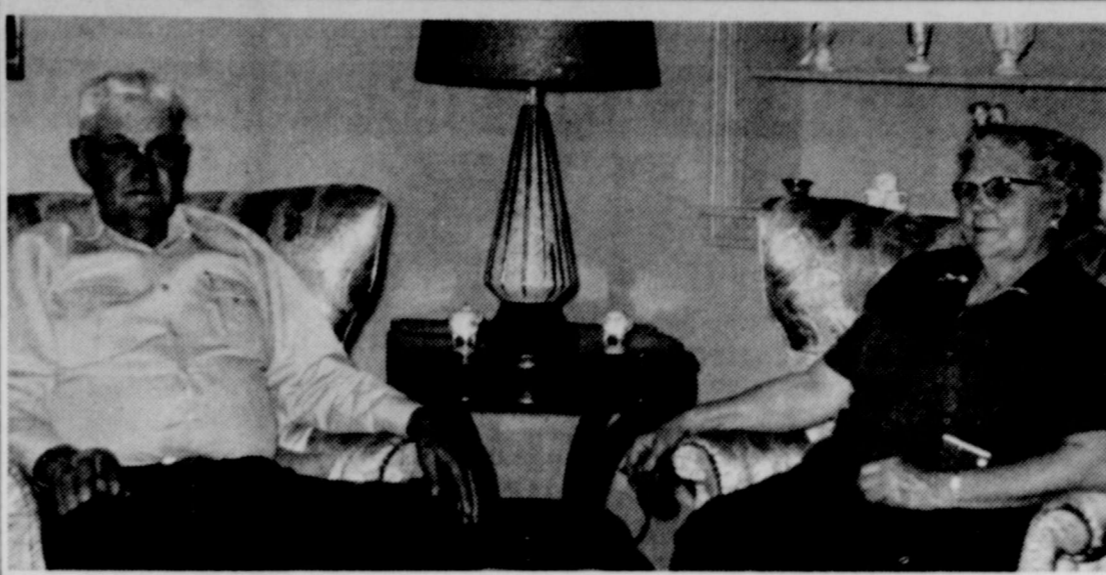

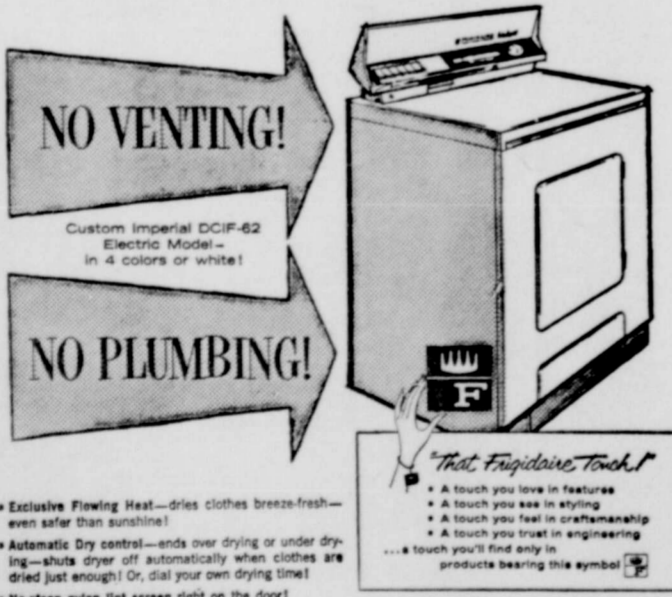
