

Soon after the organization of the county, Minor Crawford, the first elected sheriff, arrested two horse thieves who had come from New Mexico. The first District Court, held in August, 1892, found a bill against them. They were tried and sentenced to serve five years in the penitentiary.


The first records, kept in Donley County, were transferred and those kept for several years after the organization of the county, are on record in long hand. The deeds for the first land titles have marker references such as: a pile of rock, clump of hackberries, cottonwood, mound of stones, etc. The first records were filed at Jacksboro, in Jack County, from which Briscoe was coined in 1882.


