

All Around the Town

A very good civil defense school was conducted in Silverton last week by Bill Verden, Harold Ballard and Darrel Cole. These teachers brought to the citizens of Silverton the information which they received in similar classes in Amarillo last fall.

In addition to the time they spent traveling to and from Amarillo and in attendance at the Saturday classes, the teachers spent a combined total of 24 hours of their personal time bringing the information before interested citizens of Silverton.

Public demand was the reason for holding the classes here. Following a traditional pattern, however, those persons who had waited longest for the course were not in attendance at any of the sessions.

A total of about thirty-five different persons attended at least one night, with only about half a dozen attending all four nights. If this lack of interest is not bad enough, it is also to be noted that not one of those responsible for the local civil defense organization were present one single night!

The indifference on the part of local residents regarding steps to be taken in the event of an atomic attack are not really too astonishing because without a county and community organization and plan for survival, many residents would not escape serious personal injury and death even with the information that was presented. The entire plan hinges on an effective warning system which is designed to pass from the President of the United States to the appointed committees to the districts of the nation to the state governors to the state committees to the county judges to the city mayors to the local committees and to the people.

With an alert net such as could be established, information could be relayed in a very short period of time. But when information is passed from one indifferent person to another, who has to appoint committees before the next step can be taken, valuable time evaporates into eternity.

While I have great faith in the defense preparedness of our nation and also in the awareness of this by our supposed aggressors, the possibility of an electronic miscalculation or human error cannot be overlooked.

And, while the danger of radioactive fallout seems small to most everyone at this stage in the game, it cannot be overlooked that the county organization is designed to function in the event of a natural disaster in almost the same manner. The "natural disaster" needs to be spelled out for the people of Silverton, since having one here in 1957.

At this time the plan for alerting local citizens is almost nil. People do not know what signal would be used to indicate "take cover" and a dangerous situation exists during this spring and summer season until steps are taken to correct this situation.

Several other points in the local plan were brought out during the school including the fact that Silverton has officially been designated as a disaster relief station for evacuees of nearby cities in the event of an emergency. Just exactly how the people of this small community could prepare on the spur of the moment to care for about a thousand people possibly in the middle of some night, is not something I can readily comprehend.

Even though this business of an atomic attack doesn't seem to us at the present a thing for which we should be prepared in six months, for example, it would not be practical for us to assume that we can live the rest of our normal lives without another war. I cannot reassure myself that our son can avoid being involved in the sort of thing before the end of his normally-expected lifetime.

There is really no present cause for alarm, but there is no practical reason for the indifference which is predominant here today. It would be so much safer for us all if we could be sure that the city would be alerted in the event of any emergency.

A meeting is now being planned to be held after the political campaign which is now in progress. A thing of this nature is not one to be rushed into because of political pressures. The county judge, sheriff, mayor, commissioners, ag-

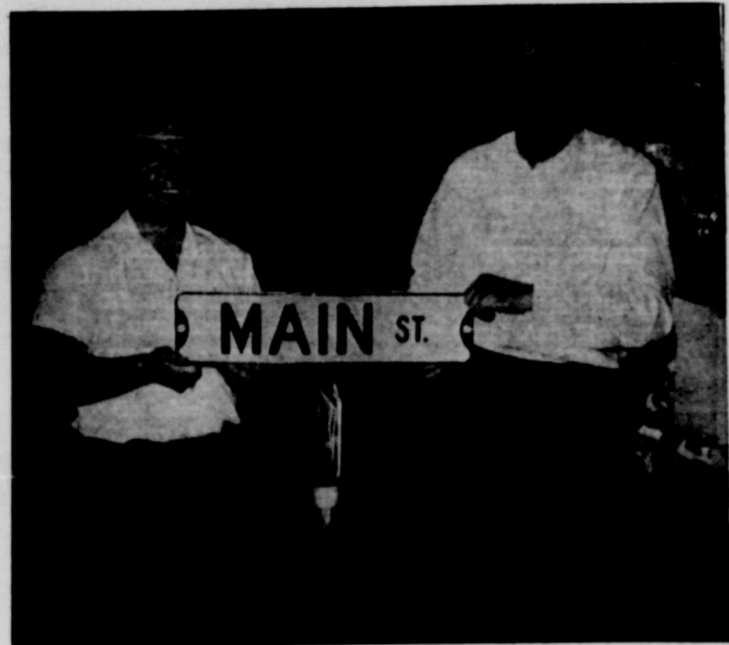

County Bank Deposits Near 7 Million Mark

As of the first quarterly bank statements of condition, Briscoe County banks had on deposit \$6,986,675.79.

First State Bank in Silverton had deposits totaling \$3,827,296.57 as of the March 26, 1962, reporting period. On March 25, 1961, First State Bank listed deposits of \$2,709,193.86, and on March 25, 1960, deposits totaled \$2,619,124.10. The Silverton bank has seen an increase in deposits of \$1,208,172 since 1960.

First National Bank in Quitaque, in their statement of condition published in the Quitaque Tribune for March 26, 1962, listed deposits totaling \$3,159,379.22. On March 25, 1961, deposits were reported at \$2,561,396.00, indicating an increase during the past year of \$597,983.22.

According to William Strange, vice president and cashier of First State Bank in Silverton, the peak of deposits usually comes just after the first of the year. It is unusual to reach a peak during March and April when income taxes are being paid.

Most banks in this region report that deposits are at an all-time high for this time of the year. There was an increase of 14 percent in deposits over the first quarter in 1961 over the entire area.

Bankers attribute the gains to a combination of circumstances, including good crops, business expansion, and an "aura of confidence" in general.

Two From Silverton Win Regional Events

Robert Hughes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Hughes, was the regional first-place winner of the Class A division of Extemporaneous Speaking. His subject was "How Valuable Have The Results of our Space Program Been?" Hughes has been the district

winner of this competition each of the four years he has been in high school, and this is his second time to win the regional contest. In 1960, he placed fourth in the state meet.

Robert Rhode, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carman G. Rhode, was the regional first-place winner of the Class A Poetry Interpretation event with his interpretation of three of Shakespeare's sonnets.

During his high school career, Rhode has been the winner of several district ribbons, and this is his first regional medal.

Both Roberts are honor students in Silverton High School.

Briscoe Cooperative Gin Signs Contract

The Briscoe Cooperative Gin signed contracts for gin machinery on April 9, 1962. Contract was with Harwick Etter Gin Co., of Sherman, Texas. Work on the gin location is expected to start about the first of May.

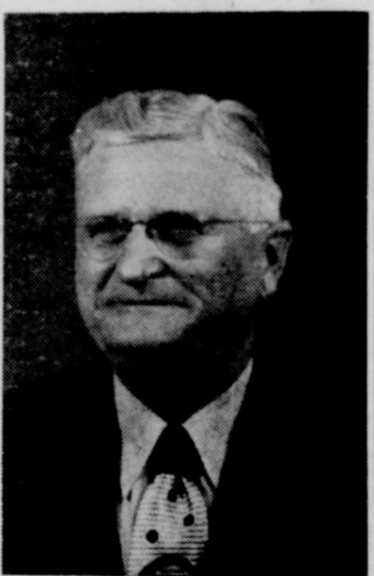
The new gin has a complete new plant. There are four 177 saw stands. The machinery is set up on

a split stream operation. The plant will be capable of ginning 12 to 15 bales an hour.

The manager of the new gin has been selected. He is Jerry Tucker of Levelland. Mr. Tucker has managed Opdyke Coop Gin for two years and before that he managed the Clayton-Anderson plant at Dell City, Texas, for six years.

This cooperative association is now made up of 82 stockholders. These include 77 farmers. The Coop will use the coop compress of Plainview and the world's largest oil mill, the Plains Coop Mill, of Lubbock.

The Coop mill and compresses are owned by the stockholders of Coop gins of this area and are organized and operated strictly for their benefit. They receive their cotton and seed solely from the cooperative gins of this area.

Funeral services for H. Roy Brown, who had been a resident of Silverton for more than a quarter of a century as a businessman and farmer, were held Saturday afternoon, April 14, in the First Baptist Church here.

The 73-year-old real estate man and retired farmer, died at 8:40 a.m. Thursday in Swisher County Hospital at Tulia, where he was taken after a two-car collision on Highway 86 in Silverton.

Carlos McLeod, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Earl Cantwell, minister of Rock Creek Church of Christ, Masonic graveside rites were conducted by Woodson Coffee of Dumas, a former Silverton businessman. Mr. Brown was born March 19, 1889, in Wise County near Greenwood, Texas. He had lived in Briscoe County since 1922, having moved here from the Cedar Hill community in Floyd County where

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Jamee Gaining in Arthritis Fight

Gloom—heartbreak—despair. These were nine-year-old Jamee Scholl's feelings for so many of the long months of her battle with arthritis. She was at least 60 pounds overweight and could scarcely recognize herself in the mirror. Once a gay and carefree little girl, Jamee's unbearable pains and changed appearance had turned her into a surly and hostile child. But, as the accompanying "before-and-after" photos suggest, Jamee's progress so far makes her future look quite encouraging. Much of the transformation of Jamee took place at the March of Dimes-supported Arthritis Clinical Study Center, University of Rochester Medical School, where the blue-eyed child was first hospitalized in January, 1959. Her pains from rheumatoid arthritis, felt in almost every part of her body, were of such severity that Jamee spent most of her time crying—even screaming with pain.

For nearly two years, the child's doctors were compelled to administer cortisone, one of the steroid hormones, to reduce the intolerable pain Jamee was undergoing. In many cases of rheumatoid arthritis, cortisone serves to reduce inflammation. It often restores at least some mobility in the joints which, in turn means that the indispensable exercises of physical therapy can begin. Unfortunately, cortisone in the large doses Jamee required for relief sometimes has its drawbacks. Side effects in her case included a "moon face" appearance. Specialists at the March of Dimes-supported clinic treated Jamee with intensive physical and hydrotherapy (exercise baths in swirling water), and carefully regulated her diet. Gradually the little girl's cruel pains decreased, permitting a reduction in the cortisone dosage. The swollen "moon face,"

which had so distressed the child, began to diminish. Her weight came down from an incredible 118 pounds to a normal 54 pounds. Muscle strength and joint motion increased. This meant more weight-bearing ability and, thus, occasional escape from bed and wheel chair. Today, Jamee looks into her mirror without terror, loathing or pain. She no longer sees a frightening reflection. She sees a pretty and winning child, home at last with those she loves.

Jamee Returns Home

Jamee's hospitalization ended. But continuing home therapy was indispensable. The Monroe County (N. Y.) chapter of The National Foundation-March of Dimes provided for twice-a-day visits by a physical therapist and also supplied a hot-pack machine. Since both of Jamee's parents have been ill, a "homemaker" was recruited to help with the domestic chores.

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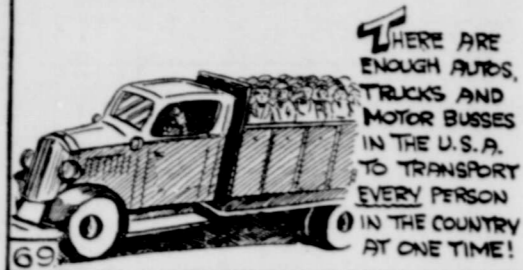

Glimpses of Briscoe County History Since 1892

The Churches of Briscoe County THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

A Union Sunday School was organized in October, 1891, and held in the school house in the southwest part of Silverton. In 1892, church was held in the courthouse until the spring of 1893, when the church was built. The ladies helped to make the money by giving ice cream and strawberry suppers.

The first pastor was Rev. J. W. Beck.

In 1900 a large revival was held, and Judge Daniel and Mr. Sedgwick got up a collection of \$200.00 for an addition to the church. All denominations in the town worshipped together, each receiving one Sunday in the church building. In 1901, the Baptists withdrew and built their own church, and in 1902 the Methodists built.

The charter members of the Presbyterian Church were R. A. Watson and wife, Bob Maxwell and wife, R. Sedgwick and wife, D. L. Landreth and wife, A. P. Donnell and wife, Mrs. Witherspoon.

W. A. Sedgwick, Edna Sedgwick, W. W. Reid and wife, and Mrs. Braidfoot.

The church building was sold to the members of Our Lady of Loreta Catholic Church in 1959.

CALVARY BAPTIST CHURCH

The Calvary Baptist Church of Silverton was organized June 4, 1933, with 37 charter members, under the able hand of Rev. W. M. Lawrence, who was called as pastor of said church the same day.

Mrs. Mae Bomar was elected treasurer and H. C. Long, clerk. The Sunday School was organized the next Sunday, and Ray C. Bomar was elected Sunday School Superintendent.

The church started to work on the church building in August, 1933, completing same in September, 1933.

Brother H. L. Burnam was called to pastor the church in August, 1934.

The church was dedicated before it was twelve months old. Brother Lawrence preached the dedication service.

This congregation was later com-

bined with the congregation of First Baptist Church.

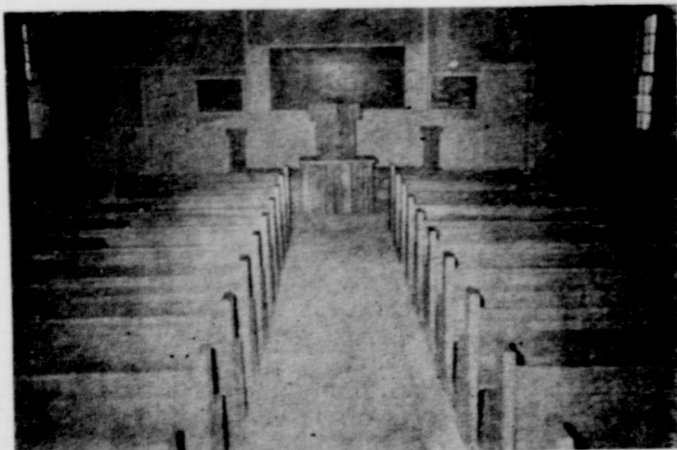
