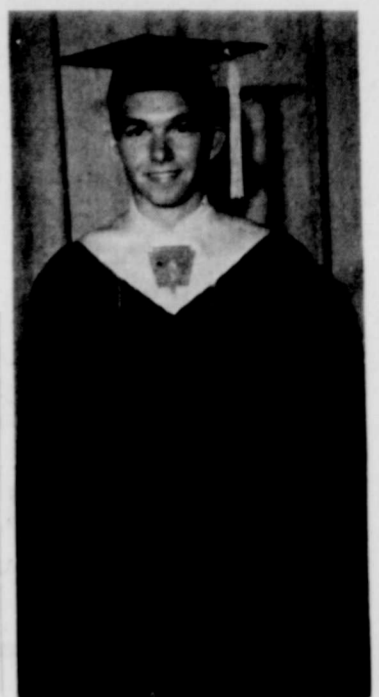
The average of the four-year grade averages turned in by these twenty graduates is 87 percent, of which the school system is justly proud.

Commencement exercises will be at 8:00 p.m. Friday, May 25, in

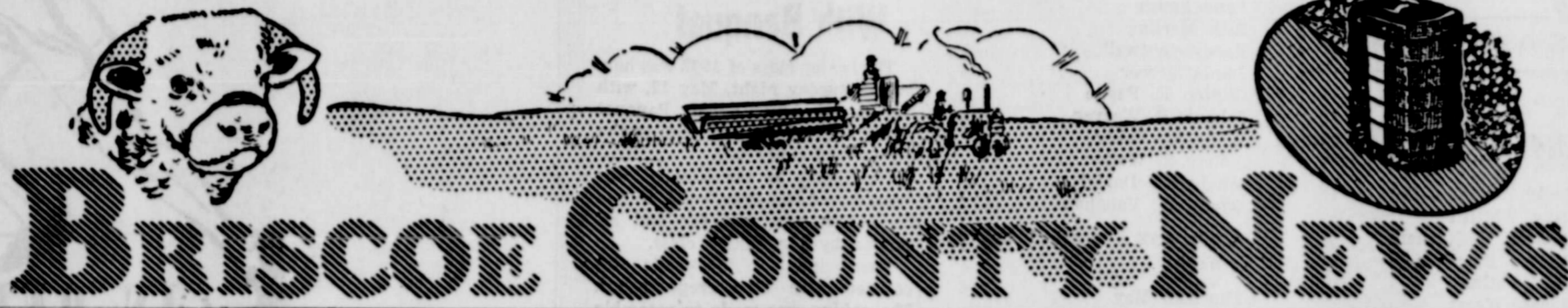
the high school auditorium. The commencement speaker is Dr. W. E. Thorn, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church in Lubbock.

Crops Severely Damaged In Hail and Wind Storm Here

A severe rain, wind and hail storm a mile and a half to two miles wide ripped through 15 miles of Briscoe County last Saturday evening, leaving behind a path of destruction. Crop damage from 90 to 100 per cent was reported by

J. W. Reid, jr., D. Oneal (Whiteley Place), Alton Steele, Alvin Redin Place, L. D. Griffin, Jack Sutton, Pascal Garrison, Beryl Long, Bruce Eddleman, Datis Martin, and Sam Lewis. Damage was also received on crops grown by Carroll Garrison, Lenton Lanham, Merle Graham, Earl Cantwell, Elton Cantwell, Milton Frizzell, Joe Brooks, Gordon Alexander, Bern May, Don Brown and D. G. Shelton.

Sam Lewis, Jack Mayfield, Beryl Long and Alvie Mayfield were among those who reported that windows in their homes and auto-

mobiles were broken during the storm. Television antennas were bent and twisted, some telephone lines were damaged, irrigation well houses and other buildings were damaged.

At the Earl Cantwell home windows, screens and the roof were damaged. Grass between the Beryl Long place and the Eddleman place was pounded into the ground. The roof of the Milton Frizzell home was badly damaged, and screens and the roof of the Bern May home were damaged.

Roof damage and broken windows were reported at the Roy and G. Mayfield homes. Carroll Garrison's young fruit trees were twisted off. Full insurance benefits were collected on the roof and screens at the Jack Harris and Lenton Lanham homes. At the Dock Peugh home maximum insurance benefits were collected for damage to roof, windows and automobile chrome.

Some of the crops were insured but most were not. Those in the path of the storm reported that they had seen stronger winds before, but that in this storm the winds were twisting.

Rain measurements varied from 20 in the official rain gauge kept by Grady Martin to a very heavy southwest and northwest of Silverton. Farmers in the area of total crop damage were unable to count the rain as beneficial.

Since May 1, Silverton has received 1.33 inches of rain. May 9, 46 was received; May 16, 43; May 18, 24; and May 20, 20 of an inch fell in town, with heavier amounts ranging up to two inches in the surrounding rural areas on most of these days. Hail which has fallen on the city of Silverton has been minor.

CROP DAMAGE

A survey of crop damage reveals that most of those in the area receiving hail Saturday night considered their loss total.

J. W. Reid, jr., lost 60 acres of wheat and 125 acres of young cotton; Alton Steele lost 35 acres wheat, and 15 acres cotton; on the Alvin Redin place, 35 acres of wheat and 60 acres of cotton; L. D. Griffin lost 120 acres wheat and 29 acres cotton and Jack Sutton lost 22 acres of wheat and 20 acres of cotton.

Losing large wheat acreages were Pascal Garrison, 90; Beryl Long, 100; and Bruce Eddleman, 200.

Datis Martin lost 70 acres of wheat at one place and 95 acres at another, in addition to 30 acres of cotton. Sam Lewis reported losing 35 acres of wheat and 15 acres of cotton.

Mrs. Curtis, 78, died at 10:18 a.m. May 18, in Swisher County Hospital at Tulia where she had been a patient for one week.

LaVina Anna Curtis was born July 13, 1883, at Whitt, Texas. She was converted at an early age and united with the Methodist Church. She was married to H. E. Curtis in 1901, at Bethel, Texas, and they came to Silverton in 1934. He was engaged in farming here until his retirement, and preceded his wife in death in 1951.

Local Chapter holds Annual Meeting

The Briscoe County Chapter of the American Cancer Society held its annual meeting Monday afternoon in the community room of Plainview Production Credit Association. Joe Bob Johnson of Lubbock, the District Unit Representative, was present.

A report on the Crusade indicated that a total of \$1,153.14 has been received, exceeding the minimum share set up for Briscoe County by the state (\$650.00) as well as the voluntary county goal of \$900.00. This was 127 percent of the goal, for which the chapter has been commended.

Three awards will be presented to the Briscoe County Chapter, for going over the quota, for exceeding the voluntary goal, and for "bettering the best." In explanation of the third item, Mr.

Johnson pointed out that this was the best report that Briscoe County has ever given.

For the past five years, the county goal has been exceeded. County chairmen have been Gene Morris (two years), George Miller, Mrs. W. E. Schott, jr., and Rev. Carlos McLeod.

Credit for the successful Crusade must be given not only to the county chairman, Rev. McLeod, but also to Mrs. Neville Muckleroy, Silverton house-to-house chairman; W. A. Griffin and Jimmy Davidson, Quitaque house-to-house and business district chairmen; Alvin Redin, Silverton business district chairman; and to Mrs. Watson Douglas, who is not a member of the local chapter, but who voluntarily donated her time, food and hired help to give a fund-raising dinner for the cancer society. It was probably through her efforts that the local chapter was able to "better their best."

The county's education chairman, Mrs. Dee McWilliams, also deserves a word of personal commendation for her service this past year. She has, with the help of W. A. Griffin in Quitaque and Robert Wheelchel in the Silverton school, has shown cancer education films to more than 600 residents of Briscoe County.

During the annual meeting the committee chairmen completed their annual reports for the state office, and discussion was conducted regarding election of officers for the coming year. It was decided to call a meeting for June 18, at 8:00 p.m. at the County Courthouse. At this time a report from the nominating committee will be heard, and officers will be elected. All members of the committee are urged to be present by Mrs. W. E. Schott, jr., local president.

RURAL AMERICA OBSERVES MAIL BOX IMPROVEMENT WEEK, MAY 21-26

Rural route patrons are required to provide mail boxes of the standard approved type. Patrons who are still using boxes of the top-opening type should not be required to discard them, provided they have been continuously in use by the same owner and at the same location for many years, they are kept in good serviceable condition, and can be easily served by the carrier from his vehicle.

Names of the owners should be shown on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may be shown on the box. Boxes and supports should be kept painted. Postmasters and rural carriers are to ask patrons to group boxes where practicable, particularly where adequate turnouts can be provided.

Boxes that are not properly installed or not kept in good serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and may expose it to the weather. Unserviceable boxes must be replaced.

How Does Your Mailbox Rate?

Does your box have a door?
Does your box have a signal flag?

Is the flag painted so as to be visible at a distance?

Is your box waterproof?

Is your box securely fastened to its support?

Is your box level?

Is the post firmly planted in the ground?

Is your box painted and protected from rust?

Is your box on the right hand side of the road as traveled by the carrier?

Is the approach to your box graded properly?

Is your name printed on your box?

Is your box the proper height? (Determine by driving your own car up to your box and opening it.)

Is your box properly located so as to eliminate traffic hazards?

Does your box present generally a neat appearance?

If you can answer all these questions "yes," you should be proud of your rural mail box. For any "no" answer, the irregularity should be corrected immediately, according to the U. S. Post Office Department.

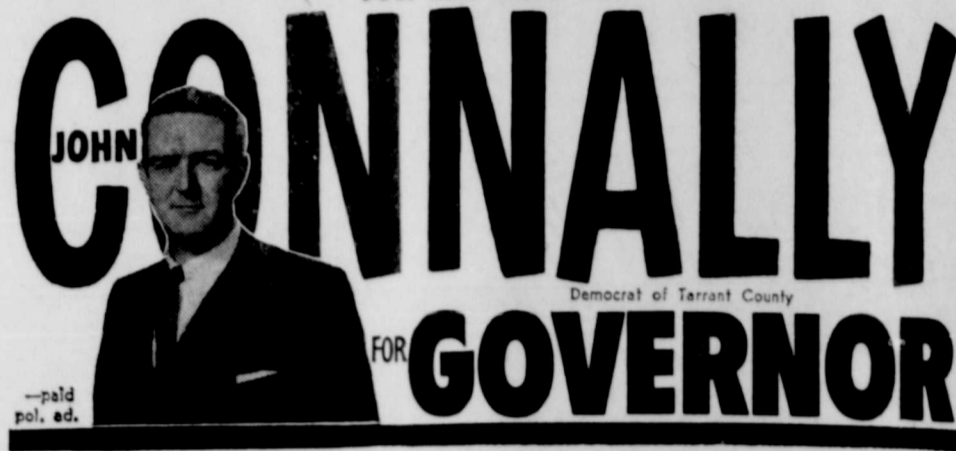

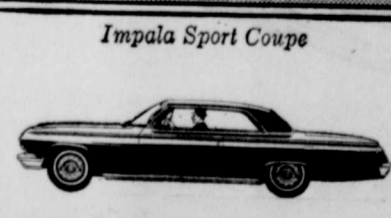
