

Burgess Proposes Irrigation Gas Rate Reduction

David Burgess of Tulia, President of the Board of Directors of Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, stated recently that pursuant to board action of May 31, 1962, he had written to Mr. C. I. Wall, President of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, presenting a proposal to reduce irrigation gas rates to a rate which would afford the company a 7.2 per cent return based on "fair value." He stated that the Board had previously requested Dr. E. A. Steinberger, Rate Consultant of the Board, to prepare a list of proposed rates

which would afford a 7.2 per cent return to the company, and that Dr. Steinberger, based on actual 1960 sales by the company, prepared the following rate schedule:

This would constitute a substantial reduction in rates, and, in fact, the rates would be lower than the rates charged farmers prior to the February, 1961, rate increase, Burgess pointed out.

Present rates charged by Pioneer Natural Gas Company for irrigation gas are as follows:

Burgess stated that the proposal represents an exhaustive effort on the part of farmer members of the Association to work out a fair and reasonable compromise before seeking legislation. The Directors of the Association believe that the only permanent protection to farmers is legislation which would give farmers a right to have their rates reviewed by the Railroad Commission, and according to Burgess, although spokesmen for Pioneer have stated publicly that they do not oppose or object to farmers having

such right, they have made it clear in recent months that they are vigorously opposed to legislation which would give farmers the right to appeal to the Railroad Commission. However, the Directors of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association voted to accept the proposed rate schedule prepared by Dr. Steinberger on a 5-year contract if it were worked out and approved by Pioneer within 30 days, which Burgess asserted would be a reasonable time and yet would not cause too much delay in the preparation for legislation in

the event the proposal were to be rejected by Pioneer. Burgess pointed out that although the membership of Plains Irrigation Gas Users desired legislation since it was their only permanent protection, they wanted to make it clear to Pioneer and to the public that they were willing to go more than half way in trying to reach an agreeable solution to this gas rate problem, and that they sincerely felt that the rate would certainly be advantageous to the company since it allowed a 7.2 per cent return while,

if subject to review by the Railroad Commission, only a 6.5 per cent return based on "fair value" would be permitted. "It is the hope of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association," Burgess concluded, "that this proposal will be accepted by Pioneer and that it will not be necessary to seek legislation at this time."

Dr. J. E. Garner, a physician at Turkey for 46 years, died at 2:00 p.m. Monday at Thurmon's Rest Home in Amarillo, where he had been for a week.

Funeral services will be at 10:00 a.m. today, Thursday, June 21, in the Turkey Church of Christ with Alva Johnson and Jack Hutton officiating. Burial will be in Dreamland Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. His grandsons will be pallbearers.

Dr. Garner, 88, was born August 4, 1873, in Center Point, Arkansas. He had been a doctor for the past 54 years and while in Turkey had his offices over City Drug.

He was a member of the Church of Christ. A strong wind, rain and hail storm rocked the Panhandle again on Monday afternoon of this week. The rain measurement in the official gauge was reported as 1.40 by Grady Martin. Other measurements over town ranged up to two inches and more.

The blowing, washing rain was thought to have damaged the new plantings of cotton which had been in the ground only a day or two in some cases, but a few more days will be required before farmers will be sure whether a scratching will bring it up.

The most severe portions of the storm missed Silverton and Briscoe County, except for an area just under the Caprock on the highway to Burson Lakes where highway department vehicles had windows and windshields broken by baseball-size hailstones.

Over the county the size of hail varied, but reports of the large hailstones were not as frequent as have been received. The rain was general over the county, with all parts receiving near an inch and a half or more in less than two hours.

Congregational Church Organized

A new congregation to be known as the First Congregational Church of Tulia became a reality Sunday, June 3. For several weeks approximately fifty persons have been meeting in the American Legion auditorium for Sunday School and worship services. The Rev. David Ray has been called as pastor of the group which meets each Sunday at 9:45 a.m. for Sunday School, 11:00 a.m. for morning worship and 7:30 p.m. for evening evangelism. Rev. Ray formerly pastored Trinity Methodist Church of Tulia.

The new congregation was the result of a desire for a local fellowship completely autonomous and independent of ecclesiastical control, one free to select its pastors and its ministerial emphasis, and one which insures freedom of conscience in matters of church practice where the scriptures do not speak. The congregation desires to work with all evangelical groups of the community in the accomplishment of common goals. It also heartily endorses and supports such interdenominational and undenominational ministries as the Back to the Bible broadcast, Billy Graham's Hour of Decision, Jack Wrtzton's Word of Life Hour, the Old Fashioned Revival Hour, and similar radio ministries.

Charles E. Fuller, for thirty-five years director of the Old Fashioned Revival Hour, is himself a Congregationalist.

The Tulia congregation insists on strict orthodoxy in Sunday School literature and uses only that which is Bible-centered. It also rejects theological liberalism which in this century has made notable advances. The local church expects to be associated with the original stream of Congregationalism which continues to exist.

Rev. Ray invites any person interested in the ministry and program of this church to attend any of the services being held weekly in the American Legion auditorium, SW Second at Collins Street. The church expects to build a sanctuary in the near future.

Thomas speaking to the 685 persons assembled said, "The distress of nations with perplexity is only one of the many evidences that the Kingdom of God is soon to take over its earthly rulership and then God's Will will be done on earth as it is in Heaven."

M. C. Harbeck, supervisor of Texas Circuit No. 9, in his closing talk, "Hold Your Position," said, "A Christian's position and prospect is something to cherish but is to be maintained in this world of today only with the greatest of vigilance."

Get The Bagworms Early For Faster Kill

Bagworms are now occurring in rather large numbers on trees and other plants in many parts of the state. This insect is a general feeder and cause serious damage to certain trees, especially evergreens, points out C. F. Garner, extension entomologist.

At this time, the worms are small and can be successfully controlled by proper spraying or dusting of the plants with insecticides. It is important to apply chemicals early enough to control the worms before they become too large and cause serious damage, adds Garner.

He suggests a check of all plants around the home, especially evergreens for the spindle-shaped sacks which may be hanging from the twigs, leaves and branches.

The following insecticides are recommended for bagworm control. Malathion (50 per cent emulsifiable concentrate 1 to 1½ ounces per 5 gallons water), Toxaphene (60 per cent emulsifiable concentrate, 2½ ounces per 5 gallons water), or lead arsenate (2½ to 3 ounces per 5 gallons water). In addition to these materials

there are several brands of combination sprays (two or more insecticides combined together) on the market which will give good control of bagworms as well as other pests. One of the common combination sprays contains malathion plus DDT. Combination sprays and other insecticides can be purchased from any store or business establishment which handles household or agricultural chemicals, says the entomologist.

Sprays are preferred over dusts and the label instructions should be followed for mixing and using insecticides, cautions Garner.

Several different types of hand sprayers are available which can be used for applying the sprays. The common types are the compressed air sprayers, trombone sprayers and garden hose attachment sprayers.

Insecticides are poisons and should be handled with caution. Follow safety directions listed on the label and keep children and pets out of the treated area. After spraying, wash the grass to remove the chemical residue, advises Garner.

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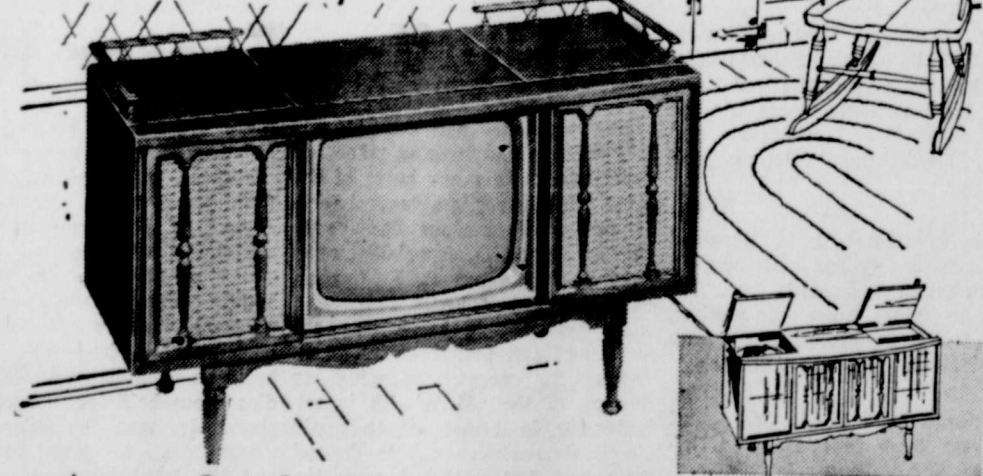
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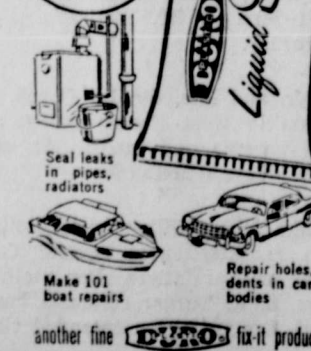
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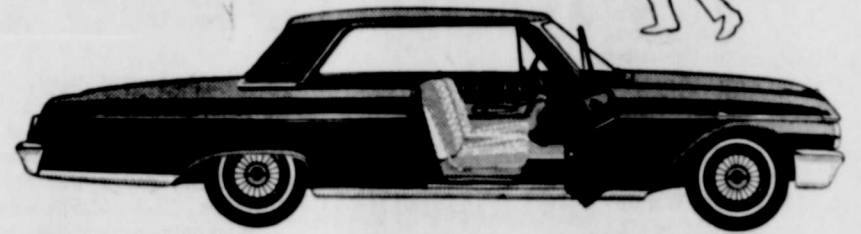
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MISS KITE, MR. MARCEAR UNITED IN PRETTY CHURCH CEREMONY

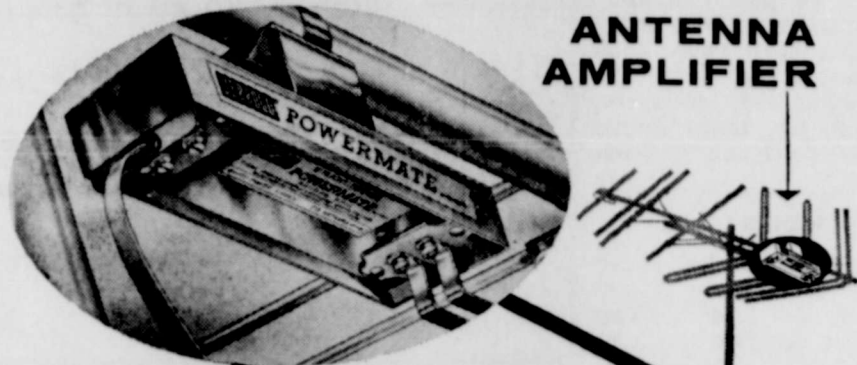
