

All Around
the Town

The enforcement effort of the Department of Public Safety will be more than doubled during the month of July holiday. Major Harry Hutchinson, commander of the Northwest Texas Region, announced today. This means that motorists violating the law and driving recklessly on the Texas highways between midnight Tuesday, July 3, and midnight Wednesday, July 4, will be twice as likely to spend some of their vacation money for paying fines and may even spend a part of their holiday time in jail.

"Our objective is to remove all motorists from the holiday crowd," Major Hutchinson said. "The Highway Patrol strength will be augmented by the assignment of License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection personnel and others to the special traffic control effort," he said. "Radar will be used around the clock and all patrolmen will work long shifts, split and ride single, and will use the tools at their command to read their influence as far and wide as possible."

"Why do this?" you ask. "Why make my holiday just because my foot gets a little heavy on the road? Why double the cost of my driving?"

The following five paragraphs are from "—And Sudden Death" in Readers Digest. If you have a strong stomach, stop reading here.

Publicizing the total of disabling highway injuries—almost 1,500,000 in 1960, with 38,200 deaths—over gets to first base in jarring motorists into a realization of the appalling risks of automobile driving. He does not translate dry statistics into a reality of blood and agony.

Figures exclude the pain and horror of savage mutilation—which means they leave out the worst. They need to be brought closer to home. A passing look at the road smash, or the news that a fellow you had lunch with last week is in a hospital with a broken neck will make any driver but a born fool slow down, at least temporarily. But what is needed is a vivid and sustained realization that every time you step on the throttle, death gets in beside you, waiting hopefully for his chance. That horrible accident you may have witnessed is no isolated horror. That sort of thing happens every hour of the day, everywhere in the United States. If you really think that, perhaps the story in this morning paper recording the number killed in weekend crashes would read something more than perfunctory tut-tut as you turn back to the sports page.

An enterprising judge now and again sentences reckless drivers to tour the accident end of a city morgue. But even a mangled body or a slash waxily portraying the consequences of bad driving judgment, isn't a patch on the scene of the accident itself.

A true picture of that would have to include motion-picture and sound effects, too—the flopping, pointless efforts of the injured to stand up; the queer grunting noises of the steady, panting, groaning of a human being with pain creeping up on him as the shock wears off. It should portray the slack expression on the face of a man, straggled with shock, staring at the twist in his broken leg; the inarticulate, crumpled effect of a child's body after its bones are crushed inward; a realistic portrait of a hysterical woman with her screaming mouth opening a hole in the body drip that fills her eyes and runs off her chin. Minor details would include the raw ends of bones protruding through flesh in compound fractures, and the dark, damp surfaces where clothes and skin were flayed off.

These are all standard, everyday equals to the modern passion for going places in a hurry and taking a chance or two along the way. Ghosts could be put to a useful purpose, every bad stretch of road in the United States would greet the oncoming motorist with groans and screams and the educational spectacle of ten or a dozen corpses of all sizes, sexes and ages, lying horribly still on the bloody grass.

This is why the radar, why the increased personnel, why the extra vigilance during a holiday which promises to put record numbers on the highways. The economic loss from traffic accidents in Texas is a staggering 350 million dollars annually, but the careless driver may look forward to an

Funeral services for Cecil W. Acreman, 56, an employee of Silverton Elevators, were conducted in Georgiana, Alabama, this week after a dramatic effort to save his life failed. He was employed as an elevator worker here and on Friday had been sent to help out at the Claytonville branch.

Acreman, a resident of Georgiana, for the past several years has worked in the wheat harvest in the summer in this area. He was working alone beside a 9-inch auger when he presumably slipped in the grain on the concrete floor and his legs became entangled in the moving auger.

Acreman's frantic calls attracted nearby workmen, but by the time the wheat loading device was stopped, Acreman's legs below the knees were entangled in the machine. A Plainview ambulance service was summoned and when it became apparent that Acreman's left foot was hopelessly enmeshed in the auger Dr. J. L. Robins and a nurse, Mrs. Marianne Beavers, were called to the scene.

Acreman had been held fast in the device for about an hour when the physician reached him. Wheat had covered the trapped man up to his waist and there was the constant danger that it would slide covering his body and smothering him.

Elevator workmen and bystanders formed a human bulwark against the foot of the mound of wheat to shore it up while the grain was scooped from about Acreman's body.

When Dr. Robins was able to reach the entangled foot he amputated it. The doctor had given Acreman an injection to deaden the pain when he reached the trapped man's side. The man's right leg was badly mangled to above

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the knee. He was trapped for an hour and a half.

Acreman was conscious and frequently offered suggestions as to how he might be freed. At one time during the proceedings he called out, "Tell them to get a jack under this auger and pull me out." Acreman apparently did not realize that his foot was held fast in the jaws of the loading device.

Plainview firemen stood by in case they were needed to cut away portions of the auger with a torch, but it was decided that this was too risky in view of the danger of explosion.

Dr. Robins and Mrs. Beavers rode in the ambulance with Acreman to Plainview Hospital and Clinic. The physician said Acreman retained consciousness about halfway to Plainview and then lapsed into unconsciousness.

Hospital personnel and Dr. John Long, surgeon, had been alerted and were standing by when Acreman reached the hospital. Soon after the man was placed on the operating table his heart stopped. External cardiac massage was immediately applied and the heart resumed beating. After a few minutes the heart stopped again and all efforts to get it started again were futile.

Acreman was living in a house near the Silverton Elevator while here. According to Farris Martin, manager of the elevator, he had been coming to this area during the harvest since 1956.

Among survivors are a son, Harold of Silverton; his wife, a daughter and another son, all of Georgiana.

Roberts Funeral Home handled arrangements at Silverton. Burial was at Georgiana.

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Wide Array of Meats Available for Backyard Barbecue

Few aromas do a better job of whetting jaded summer appetites than those coming from a backyard barbecue. The backyard chef has a wide array of meats available but because of very favorable prices, F. Z. Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, suggests broilers.

In addition to the broilers for chick-n-queing, the specialist says you'll need to plan a complete

menu. Potato salad or corn-on-the-cob go good with chicken and a mixed green salad, an appetizer tray, sliced bread or rolls and a beverage will make for eating suited to the taste of just about anyone, adds Beanblossom.

The sauce used during the chick-n-queing process is mighty important. If you don't have a favorite recipe, the specialist suggests you get a copy of MP-312, "Let's Have A Chick-n-que" from your county extension office and try the sauce he likes. The publication also contains other information which outdoor cooks can use to advantage.

Included is a discussion of grills and barbecue pits. Hints on cooking, including starting the charcoal fire and heat requirements, Beanblossom, in the publication,

also calls attention to safety hints which can help make the affair even more pleasant and enjoyable, including the tools you will need to do a first class job.

And this final reminder from the specialist, don't cook the chicken too fast. Allow plenty of time for the job and when it is finished you'll put a product on the table that you and your guests will enjoy and discuss for weeks to come.

Keep Picnic Foods Well Chilled in In Hot Weather

Almost as quickly as you can say "please pass the potato salad," a tiny, microscopic speck of bacterial life can make a shambles of that great American summer time institution, the picnic.

Called staphylococci — "staph" for short—these pernicious bits of living matter are said by health authorities to be by far the most common cause of food poisoning.

About the picnic—if you're careless in preparing the food, staph may invade and multiply in items on the bill of fare. The ham, for instance, or the chicken salad, or the cream-filled layer cake. In a matter of hours, once eaten, they can turn a strong man into a cramped, tormented weakling.

But it's easy to prevent this fun-wrecking development: simply keep the foods chilled between the time of preparation and service, and serve as soon as possible.

State health authorities are quick to point out staph-caused food poisoning isn't limited to summer nor to picnics, but can occur whenever conditions are right regardless of the time or place. Conditions are more apt to be right during summer when outdoor eating is in vogue and staph can team up with heat and lack of refrigeration to spoil food.

As a point of academic interest, it isn't the organisms themselves that do the damage, but a toxin produced by adult organisms. Admittedly, the point is of little consolation to the wrung-out victim, but it does provide a clue to preventing other cases.

Staph germs are so widely distributed in nature—in nose and throat secretions, in exudate of boils and carbuncles, on skin and clothing, in the very air—that there is little chance of avoiding them completely.

The best thing is to keep them from getting in the food to begin with, by washing hands thoroughly before preparing food. Also, if you happen to have a boil, pimple, infected scratch, or a runny nose, it would be smart to leave the food preparation to someone else. Refrigeration is the key to stunting staph germs. They can't grow

in cold temperatures, but thrive in bountiful profusion at room temperature. Therefore, refrigerate susceptible foods at 40 degrees temperatures. Use shallow pans so the ingredients will chill through.

Keep these facts in mind when you plan your next picnic, then your big worry will be ants and wasps, says the Health Education Division of the State Department of Health.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



A new publication intended to help air travelers understand what soil and water conservation practices look like from the air, has just been issued by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

A copy of the publication, THAT LAND DOWN THERE, may be obtained from the local SCS office in Silvertown.

The publication consists of 16 pages well illustrated with pictures taken from the air along with some from the ground showing close-ups of what is going on "down there".

Unique patterns on the land may consist of curving bands of strip-cropping or terraces. Orchards planted on the contour and windbreaks to protect large fields in the Plains States have their own peculiar pattern. Ponds that dot the landscape illustrate a practice that has mushroomed among the Nation's conservation-minded farmers. And irrigation in the arid

parts of the country has made striking changes in the appearance of the land from up high.

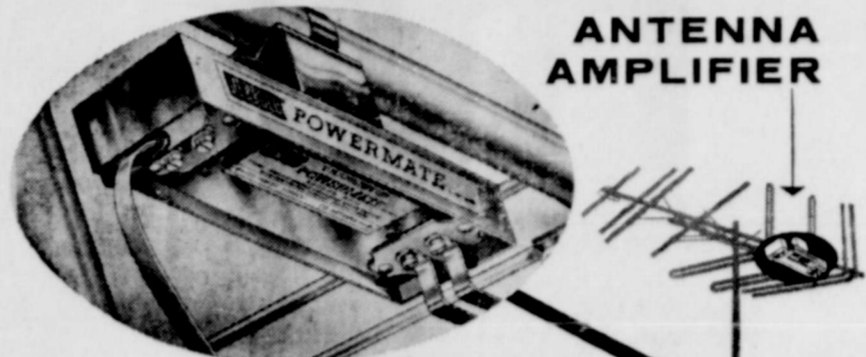

Shelter Design Book Available

Those wishing to build their own home fallout shelters can now obtain the most up-to-date information through a handbook, "Family Shelter Designs," just distributed by the Department of Defense.

The booklet, prepared by the Defense Department's Office of Civil Defense, provides designs and detailed construction data for eight fallout shelters of different types. They range in cost from \$75 to \$650. All would cut to at least 1/100th the amount of outside fallout radiation reaching occupants.

These shelters, the booklet explains, are designed for "use by families who do not have access to community shelters or who prefer that their shelters be at their homes."

The handbook may be obtained from local Civil Defense offices or by writing to Office of Civil Defense, Department of Defense, Battle Creek, Mich.

THIS recipe for Peach Tapioca is a bright and welcome change for cold weather meals. Frozen peaches are used in a flavorful and bright dessert that is a treat any time of the year.

Peach Tapioca
1 package (12 ounces) quick-frozen sliced peaches; 1 1/4 cups peach juice and water; 2 tablespoons Minute Tapioca; 1/4 cup sugar; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; 1/2 cup cream, whipped (optional).

Thaw fruit just until it can be separated; drain well. Measure juice and add enough water to make 1 1/4 cups.

Combine tapioca, sugar, salt, and peach juice and water in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Add peaches and bring to a boil again, stirring constantly. Add lemon juice and remove from heat. Cool, stirring once after 15 to 20 minutes. Chill. Before serving, fold in whipped cream. Makes 4 or 5 servings.
