

# Bureau of the Budget Clears Watershed Funds

The sum of \$451,000 has been cleared by the Bureau of the Budget for transmittal to Congress for the Kent Creek Watershed program which has been in the planning stage for many months.

In a telegram to the Briscoe County News this week, Ralph Harborth said, "I have been informed by the White House that the Bureau of the Budget has

cleared for transmittal to Congress \$451,000 for the Kent Creek Watershed."

According to the local Soil Conservation Service, this is the news that the sponsors of the Watershed program have been eagerly awaiting. It is expected that the work plan's approval by Congress will be only a formality after its approval by the Budget Bureau.

The work plans were submitted to the Bureau on June 19. The plans call for seven dams located on the Lem Weaver, J. A. Mayfield, Freeman Tate, Kelly Patrick, R. L. Brunson, S. C. Brown and J. B. Tiffin farms. Eight miles of channel improvement will also be done that will extend from the J. C. Hamilton farm east of Quitaque to Highway 70 in Hall County.

Eight concrete drop structures will be constructed to stabilize the grade in the channel improvement. The channel will be up to 4 1/2 feet deep with a 30-foot wide bottom along the eight-mile channel.

The Caprock Soil Conservation District, the Hall County Soil Conservation District, the Kent Creek Water Control and Improvement

District, and the Hall County Commissioners Court are co-sponsors of the program. The work plans were prepared with the assistance of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service in December, 1961.

Kent Creek is a tributary of the North Pease River, and is located in the Red River basin in Briscoe and Hall counties. The watershed

comprises an area of 42.2 square miles, or 27,008 acres. Approximately 22 percent of the watershed is rangeland, 75 percent is cropland, and 3 percent is in miscellaneous uses, such as roads, highways and stream channels.

The problem in the watershed has been flood damage to the intensified agricultural flood plain, sediment damage both to the flood

plain and road crossings, and extensive damage to other agricultural and non-agricultural facilities. The program will almost completely reduce flood damage. Forty-nine landowners in the flood plain will be directly benefited, in addition to the non-agricultural facilities with the watershed.

Land treatment measures will be completed by the end of the year.

**All Around the Town**

The statement of condition issued by the First State Bank of Silverton at the close of business on June 30, 1962, indicates an increase in deposits from last quarter, which is unusual for this time of the year and represents the growth of our local bank.

A steady increase in total deposits has been recorded for the past four quarters, the increase being from \$2,514,933.15 as reflected on the report for October 1961, to \$3,890,915.95 at the close of business on June 30, 1962. The bank's total assets are now a whopping \$4,214,311.53.

The trend in banking in our agricultural area generally has been toward record high deposits at the first of January when carry over income deposits to cover expenses paid by cash basis farmers in the last days of the old year. From that point it is generally expected that the total deposits will drop during the first quarter as income taxes are being paid, and either drop or make a slight rise in the second quarter.

With a poor harvest this spring it has been surprising that the deposits were higher on the second quarterly report for 1962 than they had been at the end of the first quarter.

In addition to this indication of the economic condition of those who bank with First State in Silverton, May sales of United States Savings Bonds in Briscoe County totaled \$5,418. Sales during the first five months of 1962 have totaled \$76,857, which represents 96.1 percent of the total 1962 county goal.

These figures are encouraging in view of the late crops this year. If we can be fortunate enough to have a late fall harvest will be good, and it is likely that the total deposits will go even higher.

Another item of interest in local banking was the purchase this week by James F. Smith of Amarillo, of the majority of the stock of North State Bank in Amarillo. Smith and his son, James, Jr., were also elected to the bank's board of directors.

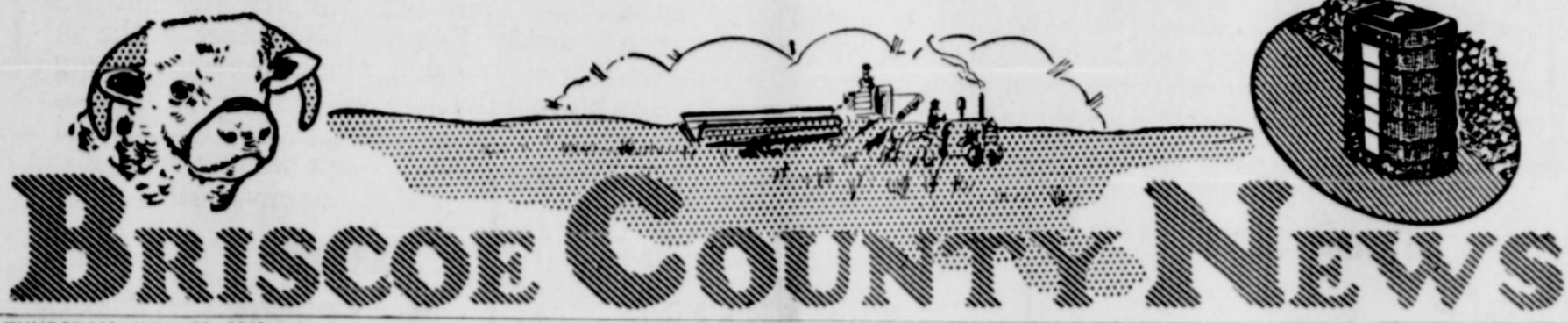

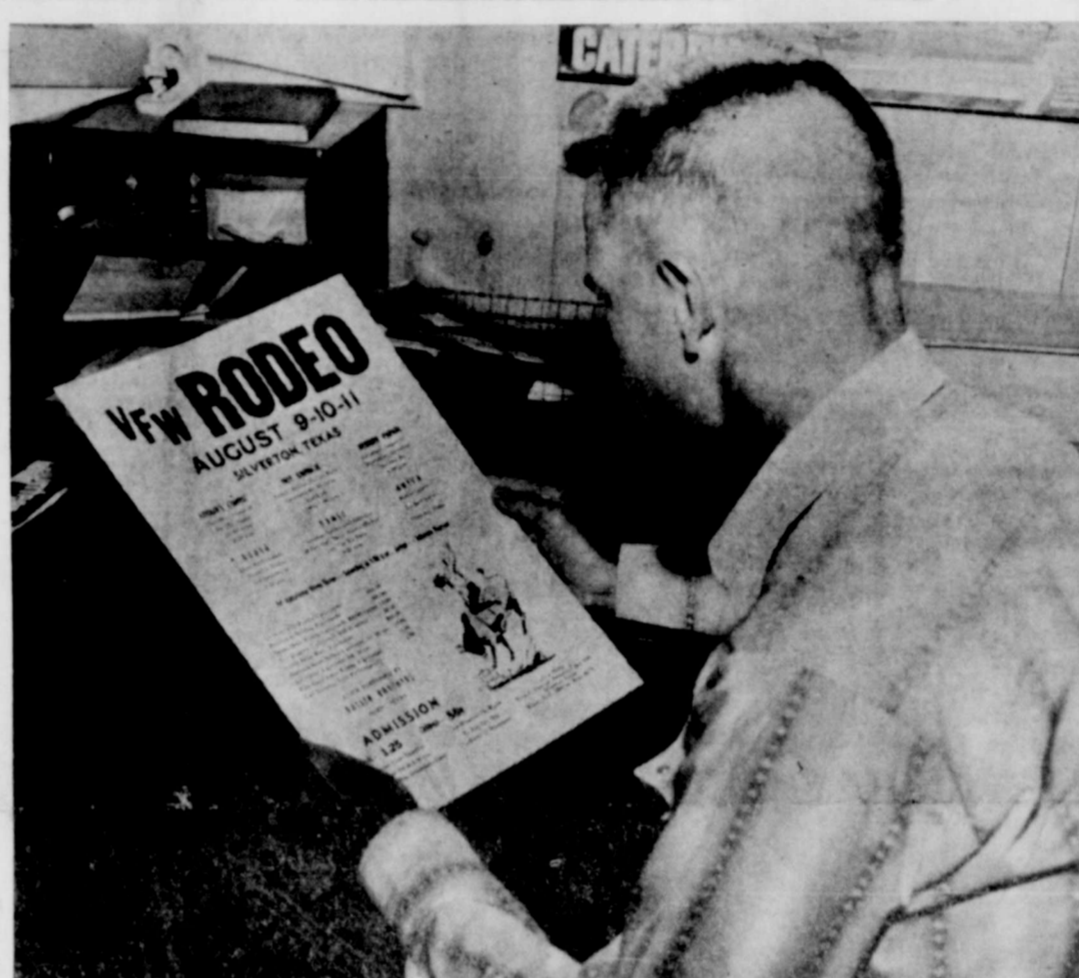
If the wind exceeds 18 miles per hour, the team will be unable to jump safely.

Conservation cropping systems cover cropping, crop residue

use for cropland and range seeding to establish good cover on grassland. They also include brush control to allow grass to improve and replace the poor brush cover; construction of farm ponds to provide adequate watering places to prevent cover-destroying seasonal concentrations of livestock

and obtain proper use; and proper use of rangeland to provide improvement, protection, and maintenance of grass stands. These measures will also effectively improve soil conditions which allow rainfall to soak into the soil at a more rapid rate.

Other beneficial land treatment measures include contour farming, terracing, grassed waterways, grade stabilization structures, and diversions, all of which have a measurable effect in reducing peak discharge by slowing the runoff of water from watershed lands. These measures also will reduce erosion damage and sediment production.

Average annual acres flooded will be reduced from 580 acres to 230 acres after installation of the project, a reduction of 60.4 percent.
