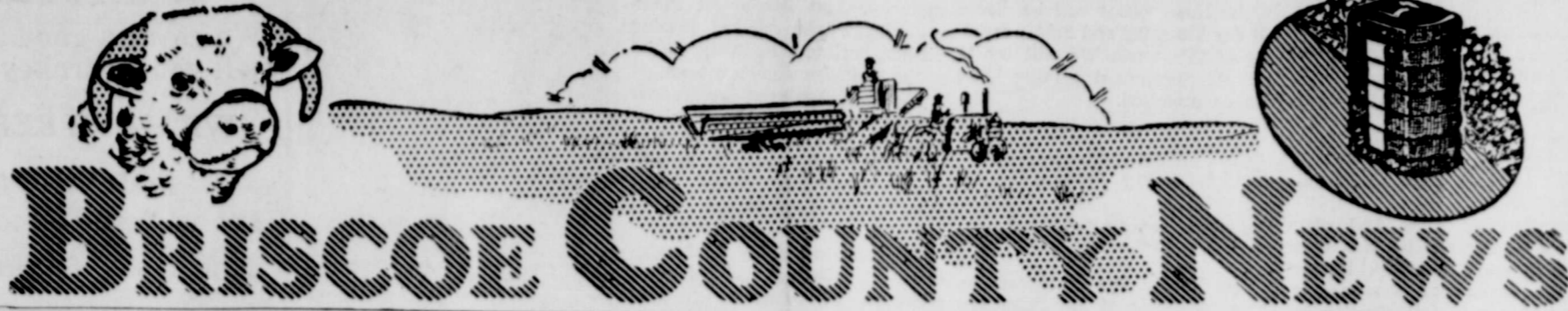

Rainfall Report

Rainfall in Silvertown has totaled 2.16 inches in the official rain gauge kept by Grady Martin.

Early Monday morning, 1.03 was measured, with .39 falling Monday afternoon. On Tuesday, .33 of an inch was received in town, and on Wednesday another .41 of an inch fell.

Some of the rural areas have received much heavier measurements, and the lakes which had become almost completely dry are beginning to fill again.

Local Groups Urged To Participate In Parade

Wayland Fitzgerald, who is in charge of the parade and rodeo queen contest during the VFW Rodeo and Celebration this year, today issued a request for participation in order to make this celebration the biggest ever staged in Silvertown.

Any club, business or group is invited to enter a candidate in the rodeo queen contest. A candidate may be entered by contacting Mr. Fitzgerald, paying a \$5.00 entry fee and furnishing a billfold size picture of the candidate for use in the Briscoe County News. Each candidate will receive an individual trophy for her participation in the contest.

Quitaque Schools To Be Integrated

Quitaque citizens voted last Saturday to integrate their elementary and high schools in September, according to John Mason, Superintendent of Schools.

The election carried 109 for to 54 against.

Mason said the prime factor in favor of integrating was the expense of maintaining separate schools.

"We were asking \$8,225 out of the local fund for 12 Negro students," Mason said. "We were transferring our Negro high school students to Childress."

In September, six Negroes will enter the Quitaque High School and six will start in the elementary grades.

The one Negro teacher was not rehired this year, Mason said.

A similar election was held four years ago and was defeated.

Due to the fact that the Quitaque school has fewer students for the next term one white classroom teaching unit was lost in addition to the Negro teacher.

Miss Simmacher To Teach Home Ec.

Miss Elaine Simmacher has been hired by the Silvertown School to teach home economics here next term. She is a graduate of Texas Technological College and comes highly recommended by both the college and her former school superintendent, according to an announcement by Superintendent J. S. Hinds.

Miss Simmacher is from Pep, Texas, and is familiar with life in a small town. Superintendent Hinds added.

The school still lacks a third and a fifth grade teacher, and applicants are being interviewed at this time for both vacancies.

Mercer Appointed To FHA Committee

Jim E. Mercer, Briscoe County farmer, has been named to the Farmers Home Administration county committee, according to Donald B. Cruce, the agency's county supervisor here. The appointment is for three years beginning July 1.

The purpose of the county committee is to review applications for FHA loans. Composed of three members, the committee is set up on a rotation basis with one new member appointed each year. Mr. Mercer succeeds Alton P. Steele of Silvertown, who has served on the committee the past three years. Other members are Bill Edwards of Silvertown and James F. Bailey, Quitaque.

The Farmers Home Administration extends credit accompanied by technical farm management assistance to 76 farm families in Swisher and Briscoe counties.

These families have used the loans to strengthen and improve their farm operations. Many have increased their volume of business, replaced worn-out equipment and several have improved their homes.

Martin On Carrier In Western Pacific

WESTERN PACIFIC (FHTNC)—Daulton R. Martin, fireman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Martin of Silvertown, is aboard the anti-submarine warfare support aircraft carrier USS Hornet which has joined the powerful Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

The ship is on a routine overseas deployment and will participate in training exercises and good will visits while in the Far East.

The Hornet heads the most modern hunter-killer group to serve in the area, with her improved capabilities to strengthen the anti-submarine warfare of the Seventh Fleet.

New and improved aircraft account for the largest improvement in the hunter-killer group. These aircraft are making their first appearance in the Western Pacific with the Hornet. They are the Sikorsky "Sea King" gas turbine-powered helicopter and the Grumman S2F-3 "Tracker," the latest version of this fixed-wing aircraft.
