Grain Sorghum Producers Map Plans for Secure Future of Crop

Grain sorghum farmers throughout Briscoe County map plans this week to assure the continued economic future for the County's principal acre crop—grain sorghum.

At 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, September 4, in the District Courtroom in Silverton, all Briscoe County grain sorghum producers are invited to meet and express their views on important sorghum matters.

Pat Northcutt is acting as temporary chairman of a Grain Sorghum Producers Association committee planning the discussion session. Northcutt pointed out that "with some 35,000 acres of grain sorghum in Briscoe County expected to yield over 2 million bushels this year, all grain sorghum producers know the need for continued organized, specialized efforts for this crop if it is to remain the strong force that it is in our farm operations and area economy."

Some five years ago, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association was organized and since that time has conducted a program of promoting Research, Market Development and Service in interest of grain sorghum. The area-wide organization is supported and directed by farmers elected from local Associations in the several counties around us.

Briscoe County has never had a local Association to assist in supporting and directing these promotional activities for our principal row crop. On August 23, a group of Briscoe County farmers and businessmen met to discuss the area's future in the grain sorghum economy and to see how our interests might be served through the Grain Sorghum Producers Association. Boys Ranch Rodeo September 2 and 3

A new rodeo arena and a record number of contestants is expected to attract the largest number of people ever to visit Cal Farley's Boys Ranch when the 300 boys now living there put on their 18th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo, September 2 and 3, the Labor Day weekend.

A total of 265 boys have registered as contestants in the nationally-famous event that has become a Boys Ranch tradition.

Lynn Welch Gored By Bull

Lynn Welch was gored in the thigh and dragged around a corral impaled on the animal's horn early last Friday morning.

Welch was attempting to load the Hereford bull into a trailer about 6:30 a.m. when the animal turned on him. Welch's son, William, who was with him, drove the injured man to Silverton and Mrs. Welch drove him to Tulsa after first aid treatment in Silverton.

He was given blood transfusions and underwent surgery at the hospital, and is recovering satisfactorily.

Although all of the boys who make their home at the Ranch will participate in some phase of the rodeo, only the best riders will be riding the professional rodeo animals that have been taken to the Ranch for the occasion. Boys, from 5 to 17, will be competing for honors and prizes by riding calves, steers, Brahma bulls and bucking broncs.

To prepare for the crowds, the boys have been helping with the construction of the new and larger rodeo arena, located in the midst of shady cottonwood trees, south of the Ranch picnic grounds. New chutes and corrals have been constructed to assure a fast-moving rodeo and bleachers have been elevated to provide an excellent view of the action for all of the spectators.

The boys will be competing in two divisions, according to ages, and will ride under R.C.A. rules. Clowns and trick riders will provide the color and excitement along with other special feature attractions.

The Boys Ranch Rodeo is the biggest Labor Day weekend event of the Golden Spread area. Performances will be held at 2:30 on Sunday and Monday afternoons. Admission is 75c for children and \$1.50 for adults. Proceeds will go to help the Boys Ranch expansion program.

SHALLOWATER BOYS ARE INJURED IN FALL AT LINGUIST CANYON

One Shallowater youth, Bill Winters, 16, was treated and released from West Texas Hospital in Lubbock, and a companion, Jerry Oldham, 16, also of Shallowater, remained in the hospital after falling about 30 feet Wednesday afternoon near Silverton. The accident occurred in Linguist Canyon about 12 miles south-

east of Silverton after the boys and a third youth, Larry Lide, entered the breaks on a camping trip.

The accident apparently occurred when the two boys approached the cliff while sightseeing, and the edge crumbled away with them.

The boys' injuries were described by Bill Griffin of Roberts Funeral Home as cuts, sprains and possible fractures. Dock Wallace and Ben Bingham brought the injured boys out of the canyon on horseback. Dr. Neville Muckleroy accompanied the rescuers into the canyon to give first aid treatment. Sheriff Johnny Lanham, Bill McCracken and O. C. Maples were also members of the rescue party.

CEMETERY ASSOCIATION SEEKS FUNDS FOR GRAVELING PROJECT

The Silverton Cemetery Association, represented by George Seane, president, has expressed appreciation to the Silverton Garden Club for a donation in the amount of \$65.30.

A number of people have expressed an interest in the graveling of the main streets in the cemetery. According to Mr. Seane, there is now a rock crusher in the area and the gravel could be purchased and hauled to the cemetery for a nominal fee. The donation from the Garden Club will be used to start the project if enough interest is shown and other donations toward the work are received.

Briscoe County wheat farmers join with other producers throughout the nation today (August 30) to decide whether marketing quotas will apply for the 1963 crop.

The Secretary of Agriculture has proclaimed quotas and set the referendum date in accordance with the present law which requires such action whenever wheat supplies are more than 20 percent in excess of "normal." The supply

for 1962-63 is estimated to be 66.5 percent more than normal, 2.4 billion bushels.

Quotas must be approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers to be in effect. Farmers with more than 15 acres of wheat will be subject to quota penalties on their excess wheat, except those approved for a "feed wheat" acreage (30 acres).

Growers who comply with their 1963 wheat allotments will be eligible for price support at the full announced level, not less than 1.82 per bushel, national basis.

If marketing quotas are disapproved, marketing quotas and penalties will not be in effect for the 1963 wheat crop. Acreage allotments will be used to determine eligibility for price support only. None of the wheat from a farm with acreage in excess of the farm wheat allotment will be eligible for support price.

Those who comply with their acreage allotments will be eligible for price support at 50 percent of parity or about \$1.21 per bushel on national basis.

Any person who will be engaged as owner-operator, cash tenant, standing rent or fixed rent tenant, landlord of a share tenant, share tenant or share cropper in the production of more than 15.0 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1963 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

Wives of eligible voters are also eligible to vote.

REV. ROBERT T. METZGER WILL LEAD METHODIST REVIVAL IN SEPTEMBER

The Rev. Robert (Bob) Metzger is an ordained minister of the Methodist Church, having joined the North Texas Conference sixteen years ago. He is 37 years of age and has completed three episcopal appointments (Blossom 4 years, Cedar Crest, Dallas, 9 years and First Church, Tulsa, 3 years).

During his last year in Tulsa, the First Church completed a new \$195,000.00 sanctuary and children's rooms with only \$60,000.00 indebtedness. During his three-year ministry at Tulsa there were 160 additions to the Church, almost half of which were on profession of faith.

During his nine year ministry at Cedar Crest, Dallas, that church grew from 100 to 700 in membership. During his first pastorate, a rural one at Blossom, he was recognized as the Outstanding Rural Pastor of the Year for the North Texas Conference by Bishop William C. Martin.

The Rev. Metzger has been used frequently as a Revival speaker in church evangelistic meetings.

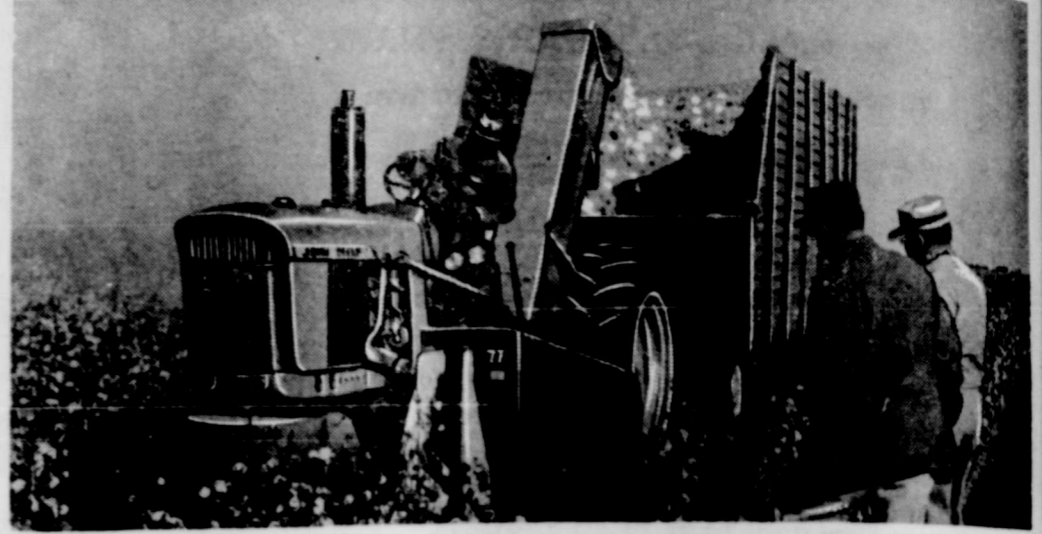
