

Sabin Oral Vaccine to be Given In Silvertown and Quitaque

The Sabin Oral Vaccine Polio Prevention Program will be conducted in Silvertown and Quitaque beginning Sunday, September 16, from 12:00 noon until 6:00 p.m. The Hale-Floyd-Briscoe County Medical Society URGES THIS PROGRAM, according to Dr. R. N. Muckleroy, and its members will direct and supervise clinics and

the administration of the vaccine, to ALL RESIDENTS OF THE AREA. The cost of the vaccine is your contribution, whatever you can afford. Vaccine will be provided free of charge if you cannot pay. A different type of vaccine will be given at each of the three program dates, September 16, Octo-

ber 28, and December 9. Sabin polio vaccine provides lasting protection. In more than 283 million people taking the vaccine, there have been no ill effects. Sabin vaccine is licensed by the U. S. Public Health Service. Sabin is different from Salk vaccine. Salk vaccine is administered with a hypodermic needle and requires booster shots

over a period of years. You should take Sabin vaccine EVEN IF YOU HAVE HAD SALK vaccine to insure your protection and to PREVENT YOUR BEING A CARRIER OF POLIO VIRUS. Sabin vaccine is administered by mouth . . . 3 drops on a sugar cube (for infants, 3 drops in mouth with eye-dropper). Even

diabetics can safely absorb the small cube of sugar. Pregnant women should be immunized. If you are acutely ill, postpone taking the vaccine. Minor colds, sore throats or respiratory type flu will not prevent your taking the vaccine. A person must wait two weeks after tonsils or adenoids have been removed before

taking the vaccine. It does not matter whether or not you eat before taking the vaccine. It is vitally important, however, that you do take the vaccine—all three doses. Clinics will be conducted at the Silvertown High School and Quitaque High School. See that all your family, friends, neighbors and hired hands report

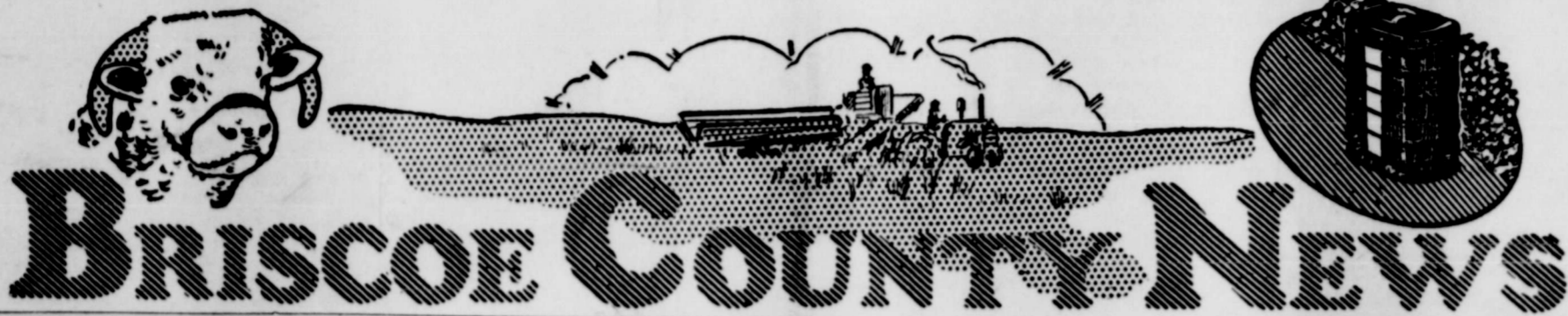

County Tax Rate Will Be Lowest In Forty Years

There's a big surprise for Briscoe County taxpayers this year. The tax rate has been lowered from 95 cents to 80 cents. This will be the lowest rate levied since 1922, when the rate was raised from 80 cents to 95 cents.

Teh tax rate raise was necessitated by the building of the present county courthouse, and had remained at the 95 cent rate for exactly forty years before the Commissioners Court voted to lower it.

J. W. McCracken, who has been preparing tax rolls, assessments and has handled collections as Deputy in the Sheriff's Office since 1947, estimated that the 1962 tax valuations total about \$6,930,000. When the tax notices are mailed the last week in September, taxpayers will have reason to rejoice.

On November 15, 1962, taxpayers will have another cause for rejoicing, but lest they overlook the importance of the date it should be noted that the county's Road Machinery Warrants which total only \$4,000.00 will be paid. The only bonded indebtedness against Briscoe County on September 1, 1962, was \$8,000.00, and these have been assumed by the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness in Austin, and no tax money will be required to pay them. After the \$4,000.00 worth of warrants are paid on November 15, Briscoe County will have no indebtedness other than current month bills.

Briscoe County has reached this level of financial security through the hard work of its county officers, who since 1945 have worked diligently to put the county's finances on a firm foundation.

When Judge J. W. Lyon, jr. retires from office at the close of the year, he can look back on a great record of achievement. During his terms in office the balance of county funds has been raised from \$33,259.76 to \$109,336.70 (as of August 1, 1962). The county has paid \$133,000 worth of bonded indebtedness, voted and paid \$22,000 and \$16,000 worth of bonds. This is in addition to thousands of dollars worth of warrants which have been paid, and several thousand dollars more has been spent for county courthouse repairs.

More than 100 miles of paving has been done, the county paid for hospital additions in both Silvertown and Quitaque, and paid a substantial amount on both the Silvertown and Quitaque fire trucks. The taxpayers of Briscoe County do, indeed, owe a debt of gratitude to the county officers for a job that is being well done.

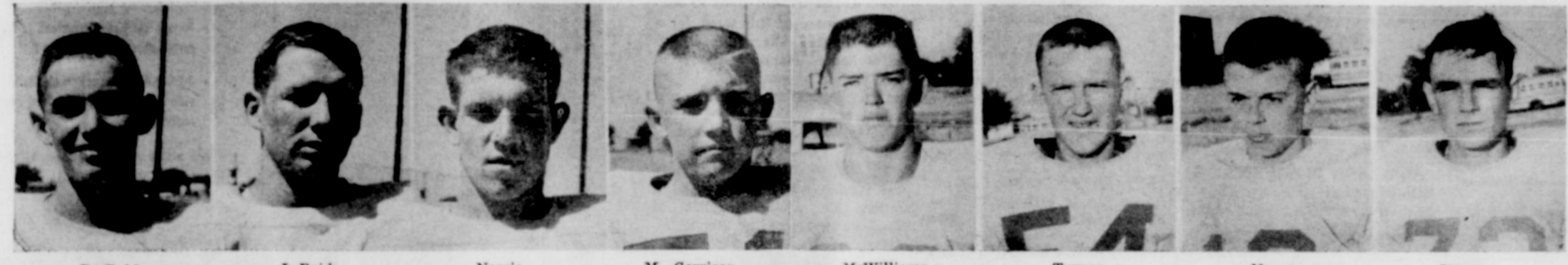
