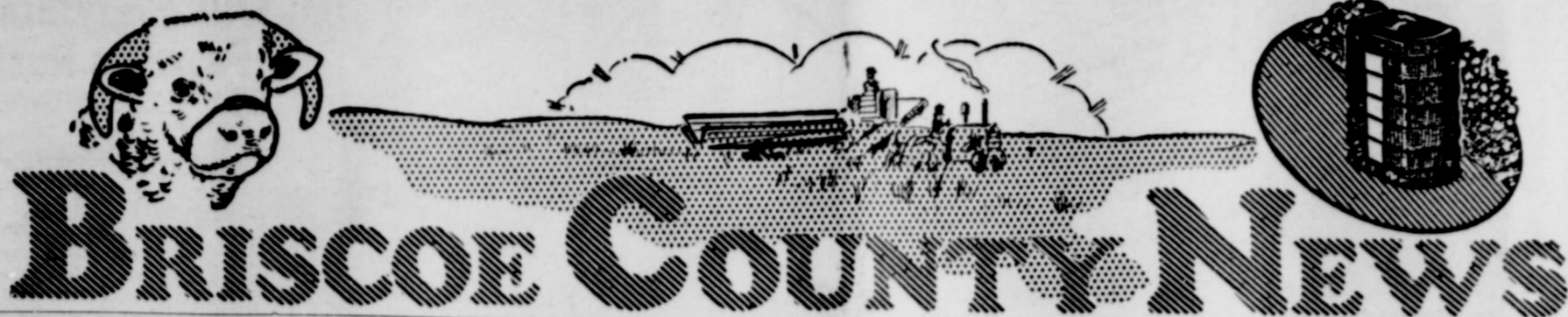


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Annual Meeting of Stockholders Planned

Sabin Vaccine Makeup Clinic Set For Sunday

A total of 1,287 persons of all ages took Type I polio vaccine in Briscoe County last Sunday afternoon in the first round of the Sabin Oral program. The last chance to get the vaccine to protect against the most common kind of polio will be next Sunday, September 23, at clinics located in the Silverton High School Gym and the Quitaque High School Gym.

Members of the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe County Medical Society, which is underwriting the polio-preven-

tion clinics, pointed out again that there is no question concerning the safety of the Type I vaccine. Those who neglected to get it last Sunday are urged to attend the make-up clinic next Sunday not only to protect themselves but to avoid carrying this type of polio to others.

The Sabin vaccine program calls for three separate doses of the vaccine. Each dose combats one of the three kinds of polio: Type III vaccine, about which

some question has been raised, is now scheduled to be given in Silverton October 28 and November 4. Final decision on distribution of that Type will be made locally, according to Dr. R. N. Muckleroy, before the October date. Only vaccine shown to be safe will be given in Briscoe County clinics, he added.

He called attention to the opinion of Anthony J. Celebrezze, secretary of health, education and welfare, who contended the questions raised about Type III are "not sufficient to become anxious about in that the chances of getting polio after taking the vaccine are one in a million." And then, the Secretary said, "it is impossible in every case to trace the disease back to having been caused by the vaccine."

Celebrezze had support from one woman who took Type I vaccine Sunday. "You could use your common sense," she said, "and know that you are less likely to get polio after taking the vaccine than you are without it."

The complete tally in Briscoe County showed that 450 swallowed doses of Type I vaccine in Quitaque and 1,247 in Silverton.

Thousands Turn Out For Vaccine Across State

Thousands of Texans received Sabin Oral Vaccine against Type I polio Sunday. For other thousands the distribution of Type III vaccine was deferred.

Most county leaders of mass immunization drives were pleased with the number lining up to gulp sugar cubes soaked with the Type I vaccine in view of the postponements for issuing the Type III.

The U. S. Public Health Service recommended a temporary halt Saturday in use of Type III vaccine for adults. It reported there was evidence that at least some of 11 polio cases among adults resulted from Type III vaccine—but recommended continued distribution of Types I and II.

The postponements affected such population centers as Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth, which carried out mass Type I immunization programs earlier.

Lubbock was one center for thousands who followed suit Sunday and took Type I vaccine there, and 19 South Plains counties also carried out plans to give the vaccine.

The Committee will function under Public Law 78, obtaining facts relevant to the supply of domestic farm workers existing in Briscoe County and the shortage of workers, if any, which must be met by importing Mexican Nationals to harvest the cotton crop. Under Public Law 78, the TEC must supply this information to the Secretary of Labor who must limit the number of Mexican Nationals to be used in this county by granting a "ceiling." The Committee consults with the local Office Manager to assist him in estimating the number of workers needed, based on current local conditions affecting the cotton crop.

"Ceilings" granted by the Secretary of Labor limiting the importation of Mexican Nationals into this area will be posted in the County Agent's office, and in the Post Office in Silverton, in the County Courthouse.

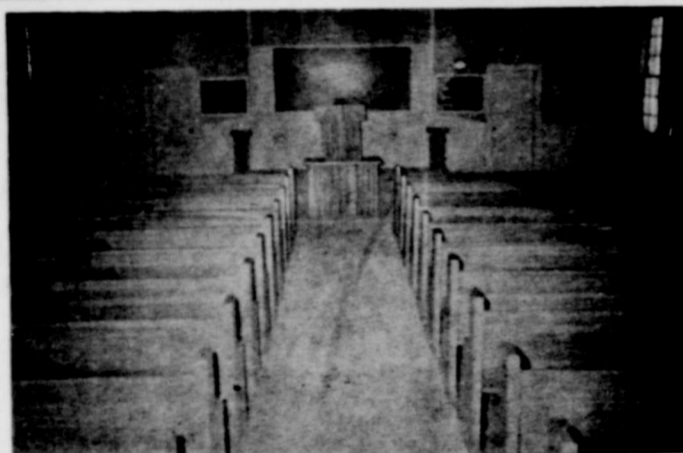

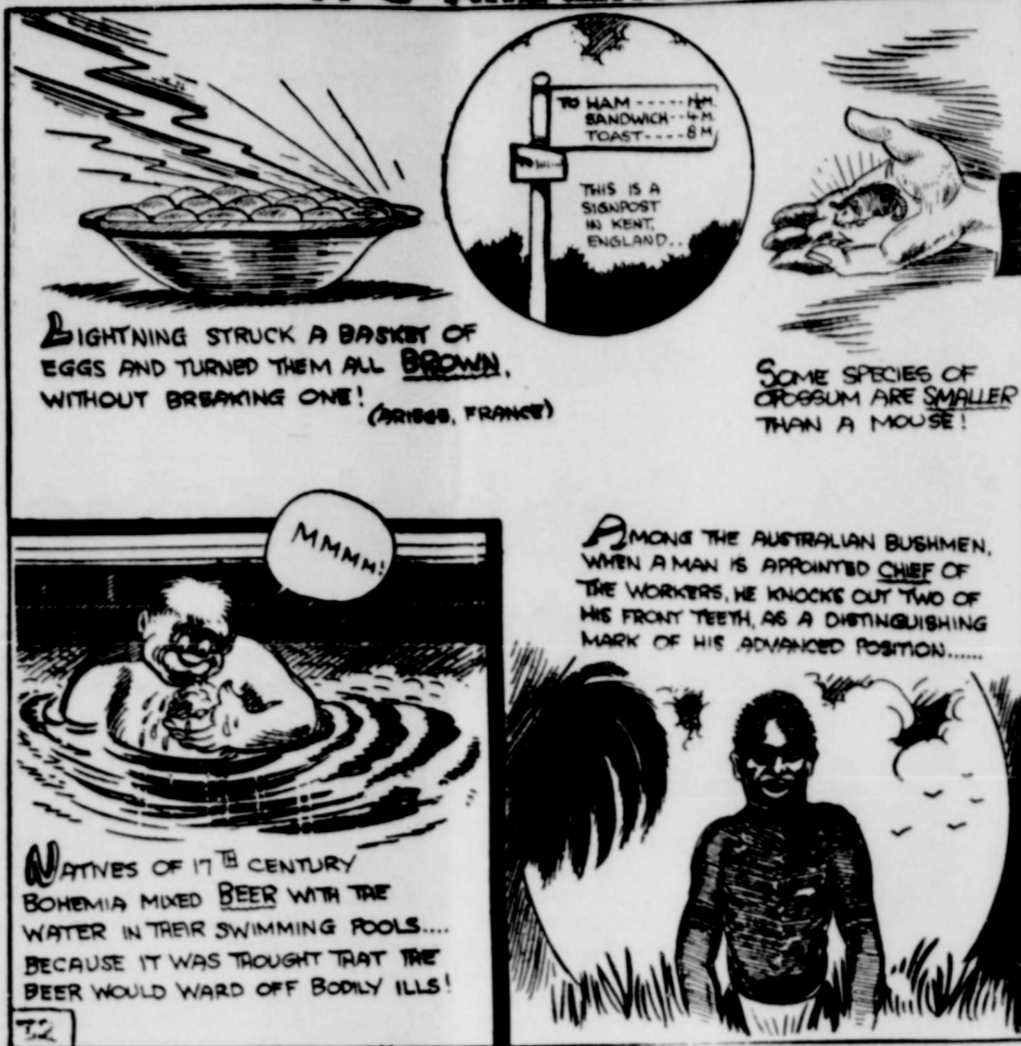

Health officials at Lubbock counted 78,537 who showed up for the first phase of the drive. Although there had been hope 85 to 90 percent of the 134,000 residents

would be immunized, coordinator Leon Harris said they were "delighted with the outcome in the light of what has happened."

At Plainview 15,493 of about 25,000 residents turned out. Lamb County, in the same area, saw

1,454 of a potential 2,000 covered at Sudan and 6,798 of about 15,000 at Littlefield. Hockley County took care of 9,732.

Type I vaccine was distributed to 72,588 of about 130,000 people in Wichita County. Dr. Harley Sullivan, chairman of the drive, viewed this as "an expression of public confidence."

Childress County administered 3,996 of the 10,000 doses it had prepared. At Vernon about 7,000 took the vaccine. In Clay County, Henrietta clinics issued 4,009 doses, enough for about half its population, and Knox City 1,843 among a potential of 2,000.
