





We will not promise any better grade or staple than the other gins, but we will promise just as good. All gins are made to operate and we feel we have as good a ginner as can be hired.


If our burrs are clean and the lint cleaners operate properly then we will give you just as much lint per hundred as anyone else, and this we do promise.

WHY ARE PEOPLE IGNORANT OF GOD AND HIS WILL?"

Man alone is no match for Satan; But Satan is no match for God. And when we have God's WORD, we have GOD and God's power. This is all Jesus had when in the wilderness alone with Satan.

Mother Eve, in the Garden of Eden was DECEIVED. She was TRICKED into eating the forbidden fruit, (Gen. 3:6). Satan appealed to the lust of the flesh and the pride of life. (2 Cor 11:3).

Deceit is the process by which evil men grow warse and worse, (2 Tim 3:13). This is also the influence of "The man of Sin" described in II Thess 2:3-10. This is the way Satan's ministers work. (2 Cor 11:13-15), and is the reason for the failure of the "light of the knowledge of the glory of God" shining into people's hearts, so that men can be saved, (2 Cor 4:3-6). 
