Participation is voluntary

Farmers may take part by re ducing the total of their 1963 feed grain acreage by at least 20 percent, the minimum diversion for participation. The maximum diversion is 40 percent of the base acreage or 25 acres, whichever is high-

The acreage of corn, grain sor ghum, and barley (1959-60 average acreage, as adjusted) will be combined into one total feed grain base for each farm. A farmer may choose to divert one or mare of the feed grains in this total base es for livestock products. > In a change from the 1962 program, farmers to be eligible for any payments or price support on any of the three feed grains must divert the total acreage signed up.

Diverted acreages will be devote dto a conserving use and will be in addition to the average acreage of conserving and idle land on the farm for 1959 and 1960.

Payment on the first 20 percent of acreage diversion will be made at 20 percent of the county support rate (reflecting national average of \$1.20 per bushel for corn, \$1.91 per hundredweight for grain sorghum, and 93c per bushel for barley) on the normal production of the diverted acres.

On the diversion above the minimum amount, payment will be at 50 percent of the county support

The diversion payment plus the price support in-kind payment as explained earlier will give farmers approximately the same payment they received for participat-

ing in the 1961 and 1962 programs. Farmers may receive part of their acreage diversion payment at the time they sign up to participate in the program. remainder of the diversion payment and all of the price support payment will be made after compliance is checked next summer.

Payments will be made through payment-in-kind certificates. These certificates may be redeemed in feed grains from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks or cash will be paid and the CCC will assist in marketing the feed grains covered by the certificates.

Under the 1963 program, acres taken out of feed grain may be planted to guar, sesame, safflower, sunflower and castor beans without affecting eligibility for pro gram benefits. The diversion rate in such cases for plantings to sesame will be at 40 percent of the farm's regular diversion rate; guar and castor beans at 30 percent; and sunflower at 20 percent. There will be no diversion payments on diverted acreages planted to safflower. Production of flaxseed, rapeseed, and mustard seed will not again be permitted on diverted acres.

The sign-up period for the 1963 feed grain program will be early next year and will be announced



DEPRESSION-BORN SKIING IS NOW "BIG BUSINESS"

Skiing as a sport is as old as the snow-covered hills. But strangely enough, in the Southwest where snow falls mainly in the high altitudes, skiing was a Depression-born "industry."

Today that Depression-baby is a multi-million dollar business in New Mexico. From a couple of hand-axed trails in the early thir-

Today that Depression-baby is a multi-million dollar business in New Mexico. From a couple of hand-axed trails in the early thirties, winter sports have expanded to eight professionally operated recreation areas that attract thousands of skiers and winter sports enthusiasts.

Back in the thirties in Evergreen Valley, near Las Vegas, New Mexico, a fox farm operator and a few of his friends decided to enjoy the snowy slopes. They axed out a trail 20 yards wide, acquired skis and some broomstick ski poles, and away they went! Their week-end skiing remained strictly amateur. But over the mountain in Santa Fe, the chamber of commerce and civic organization members were racking their brains trying to beat the Depression by devising ways to attract tourists to the oldest Capital in the United States.

A Rotary Club member looked hard and long at the blanket of snow on the Sangre de Cristo Mountains looming above the city, then made a speech suggesting that the snowy slopes of the mountains might make a good winter sports area, and he suggested hiring an expert to survey the possibilities.

The suggestion caught fire—and even while the expert was snow-shoeing and skiing between the trees of the forested slopes, the Forest Service and National Park Service took up the idea and cleared a practice ski trail an eighth of a mile long.

That was the beginning, and each succeeding winter saw the ski trail attracting more and more people. That meant more recreation areas, more and longer ski trails, and bigger investments in ski lifts, ski shops, lodge accommodations and other facilities.

Today, eight winter sports areas help to disprove the idea that

Today, eight winter sports areas help to disprove the idea that New Mexico is a desert state. And the investments are tre-

The ski areas have poma lifts, chair lifts, a variety of ski trails, ski schools and ski shops, snack bars, lodges for overnight accommodations and a variety of other facilities.

The winter sports areas are located at elevations of from 8,000 to 12,000 feet, so they enjoy snow before winter actually comes to the lower altitudes. The winter sports areas begin opening early in November and most of them are in operation by Thanksgiving.

Even the most ardent chamber of commerce booster of those depression days could hardly visualize the winter sports industry of today when airlines fly in ski groups from Texas, when caravans of skiers clog the roads to the high slopes to such an extent that uphill traffic is prohibited in some areas after two or three p.m. Yes, skiing is BIG BUSINESS in New Mexico.



Feeder in Backyard Helps Share Yule With Birds

Share Christmas with the birds. If you have no backyard feeder, trim an outdoor tree for them.

Pine cones dipped in suet or peanut butter can be attached to branches. Balls of suet and strings of popcorn or cranberries can be hung from a tree. Bits of apple and grated carrot, even pie crust, dry donuts and crumbs will be welcomed by the birds.

A coconut shell shaped as a container holding sunflower and other bird seed can be fixed to a branch. Don't put the food too far inside a tree or birds may harm their branches while feeding. Once you start feeding birds, keep it up all winter. Provide water, too.

Bluejays, woodpeckers, nuthatches, chicadees, warblers and brown creepers are meat eaters. Cardinals, juncos, sparrows and finches like vegetable seeds.

The postmark does make a difference—to thousands who mail Christmas cards from Christmas, Florida.

Each year, Yuletide greetings are accepted for mailing from the town of Christmas by the Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce. Christmas is located 23 miles

Christmas is located 23 miles east of Orlando. Cards which are boxed or wrapped and have the correct postage are sent to the Chamber at P.O. Box 1913, Orlando, Fla.

The cards are stamped with a special holiday cachet, in addition to the famed "Christmas" postmark.

The town of Christmas today is a symbol of peace and good will, but it was established as a Fort to provide protection against hostile Indians 126 years ago.

Caroling, Mass Are Traditional

In the mountain regions of Western Austria, entire villages join in carol singing on Christmas Eve. Beginning with the family living farthest from the village church, torch-bearing carolers form a procession. At each house along the way greetings of "Froehliche Weihnachten" are exchanged, and the inhabitants fall in line. Eventually, the whole population is part of the parade as it arrives at the church steps in time for Midnight Mass.

Christmas Eve carol-singing and Midnight Mass are also a part of the British holiday tradition. The custom of hanging up mistletoe dates back to the Druids, who used the plant in their religious rites. Burning the Yule log is another custom borrowed by the British from the Vikings, who first burned it in honor of their god Thor.
