

High Winds Leave Path Of Destruction Monday Night

Hard winds, gusting to near 100 miles per hour, pushed a curtain of dust and black swollen rain clouds across Briscoe County Monday afternoon. The squall line, 35 miles wide and over 200 miles long, swept over Silverton at about 7:30 p.m. and for an hour the winds inflicted heavy

damage. Grady Martin, who keeps the official U. S. Weather Bureau instruments here, reported that at the time the storm hit the barometric pressure recorded a sharp drop similar to the drop recorded at the time of the tornado in May, 1957. Other residents who made

Silverton their home at the time of the 1957 storm said that the wind was just as strong Monday in the north part of town as it was the night the tornado ripped through the southwest to northeast path. Martin said the barometric pressure began to fall at 7:40 p.m.

and fell steadily for 10 minutes before beginning to rise again. A total of .34 of an inch of rain watered the young crops and pasture grass while the high winds damaged the wheat crop. No hail was received in the city, but the storm was accompanied by a dazzling lightning display.

Tuesday, as the area was surveyed, it was impossible to estimate the damage which ran into the thousands of dollars. Fortunately no personal injuries resulted. At least half of the television towers and antennas in Silverton were damaged, many of them com-

pletely ruined. Two large trailer houses were demolished, a smaller one overturned and another was moved. The trailer home of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Lesley appeared to have received the worst damage. It apparently flipped completely over and came to rest in a tangled heap

on the fence behind the home of Mrs. H. P. Howard. Mr. and Mrs. Lesley were away from home at the time, she being a patient in the Tulia hospital. A trailer house occupied by Sonny Thomas was blown over on its top and all its contents spilled, twisted and scattered. Mr. Thomas and his children were taken to the home of his brother shortly before the winds hit. The new home of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Strange was damaged when a granary on an adjoining lot was lifted up and dropped on it. The damage was to the corner of the roof of the attached garage and to the backyard fence.

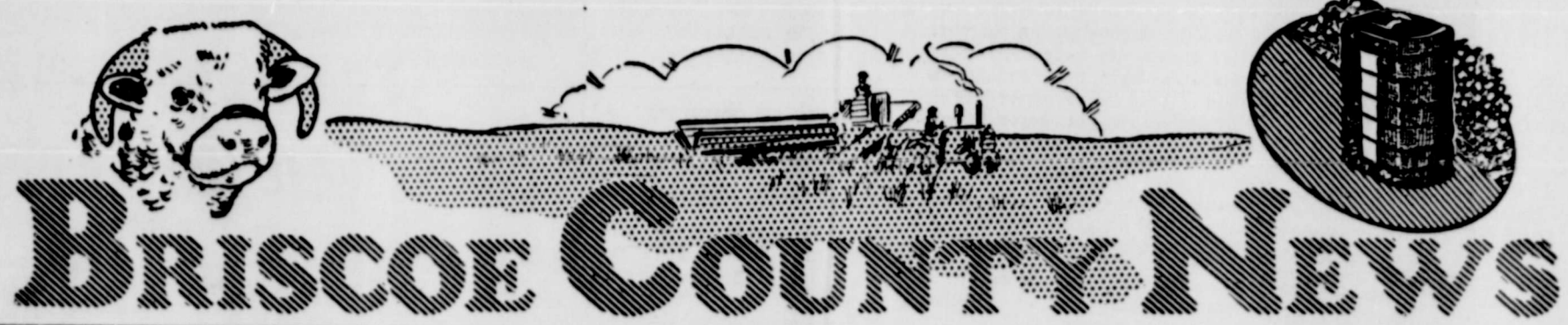
4-H Pancake Supper Is Friday Night

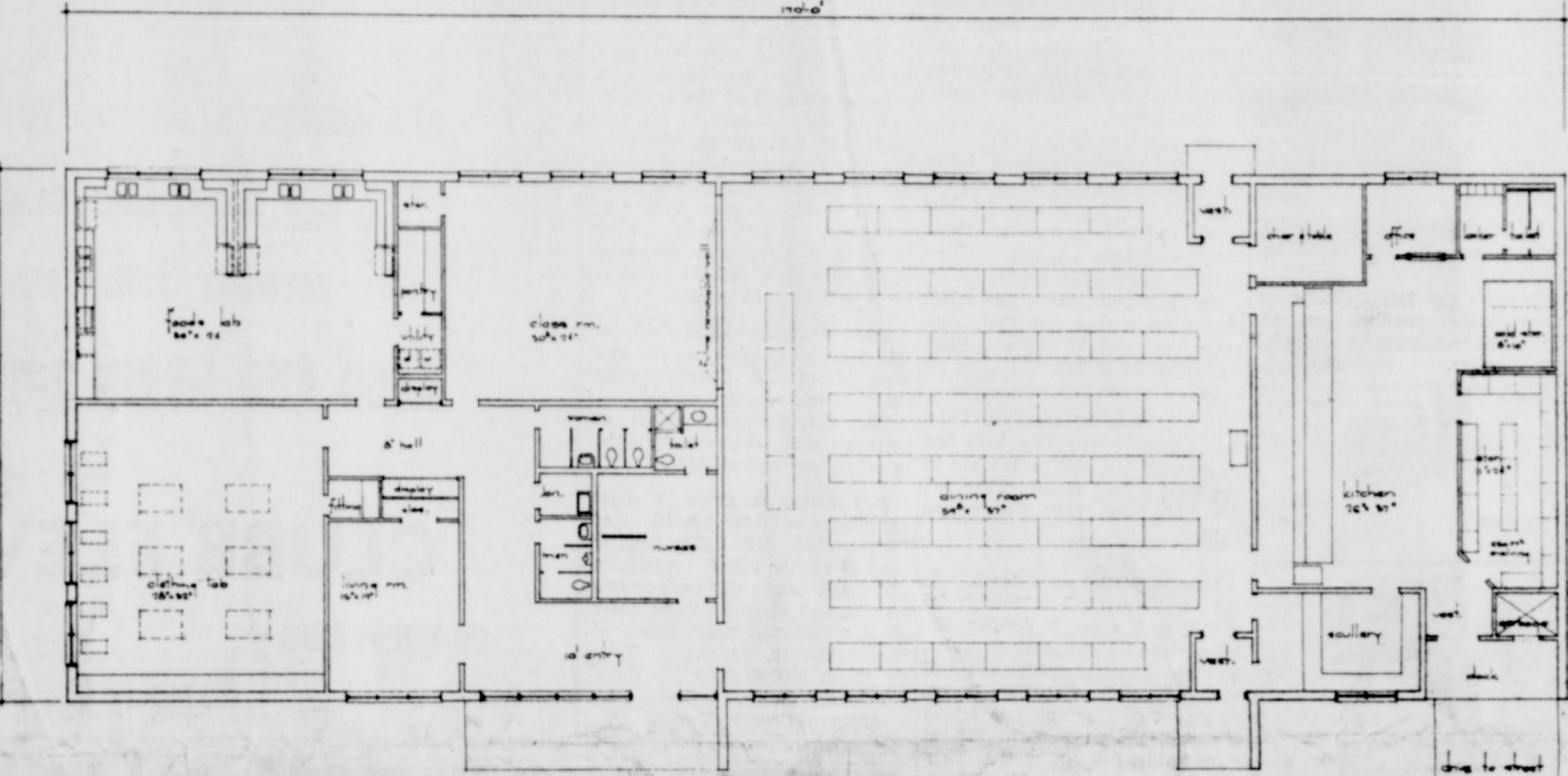
Prices will be 75 cents each for all you can eat. The proceeds of the supper will be used to send the county delegates to the State 4-H Round-Up to be held in College Station in June.

Resident qualified property tax-paying electors of the Silverton Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday, June 1, to vote on the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$140,000 to be used for the building of a new homemaking department, two classrooms, a nurse's office, school cafeteria and kitchen.

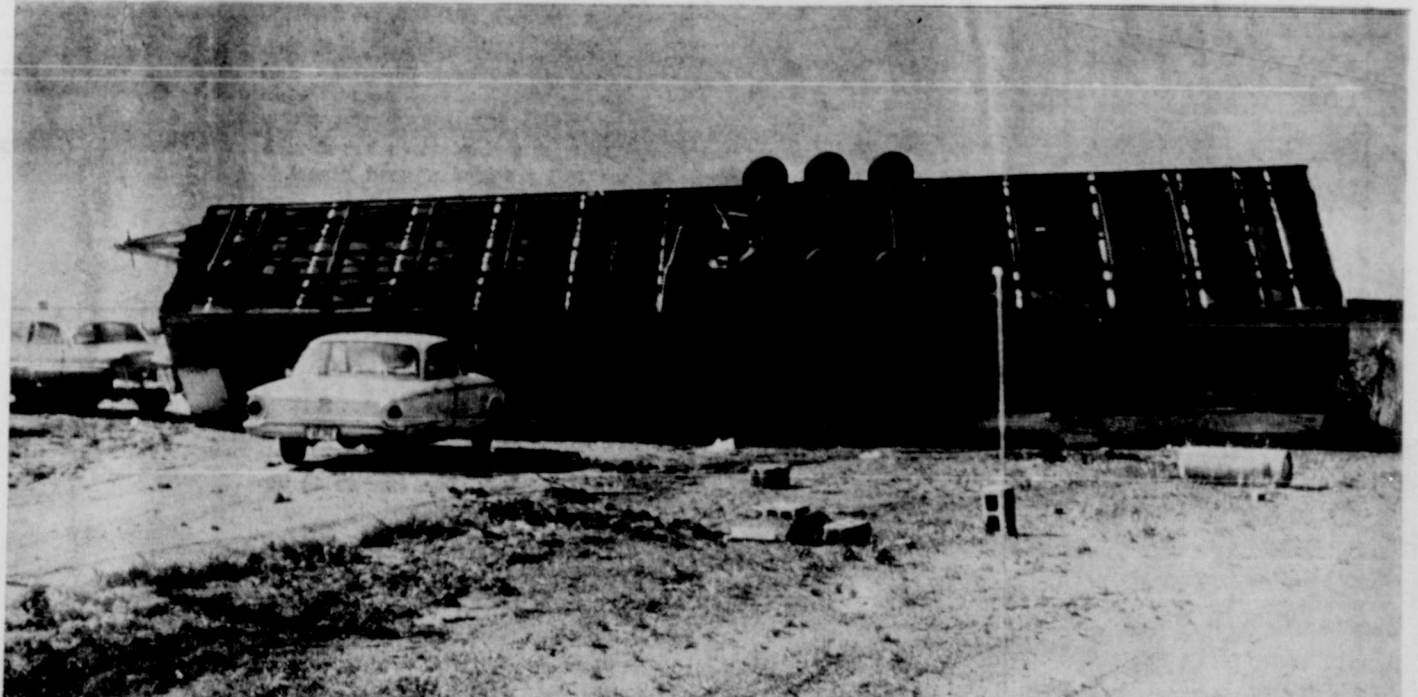
DR. McCLUNG TO SPEAK AT LADIES' NIGHT DINNER

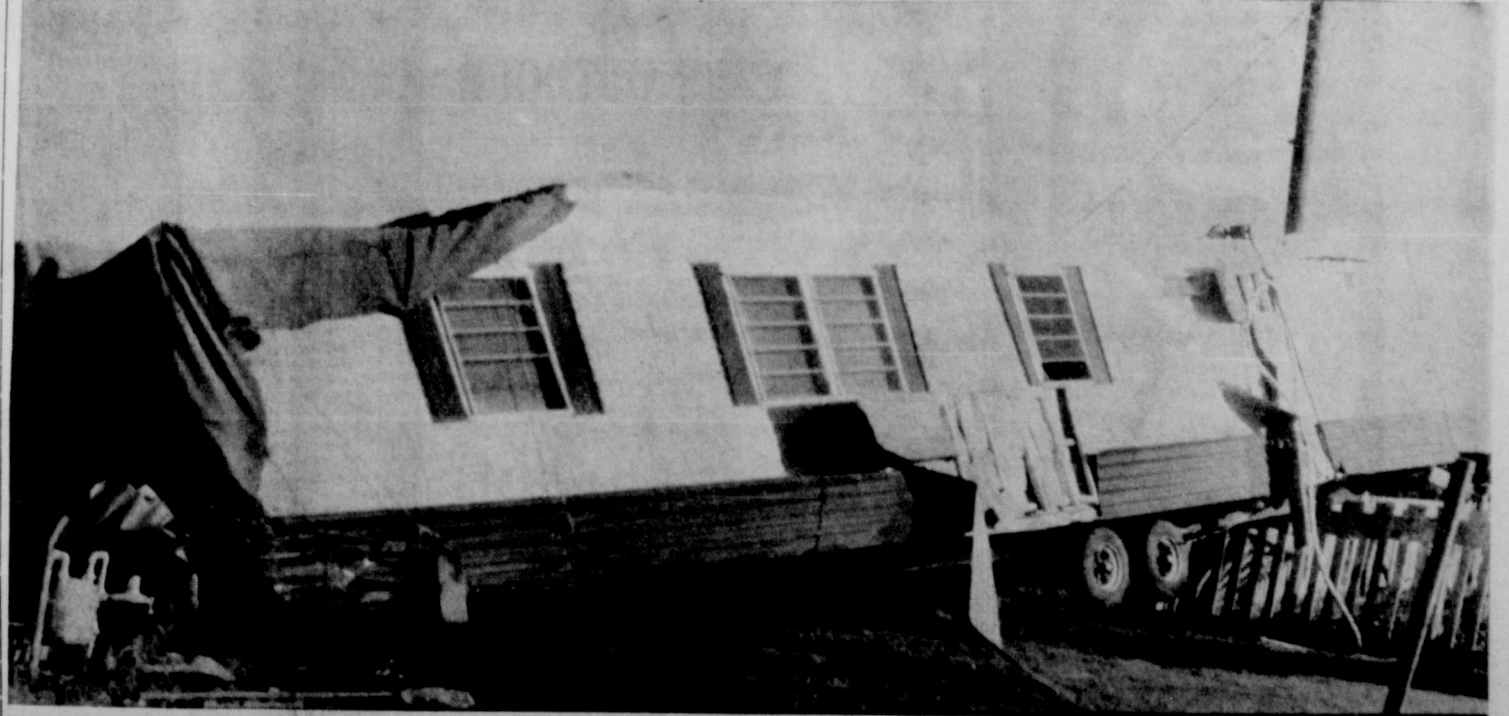
The new unit could be put into operation during the next school term to relieve crowded conditions in the school.

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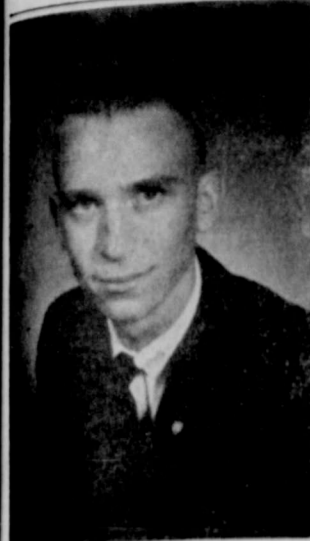

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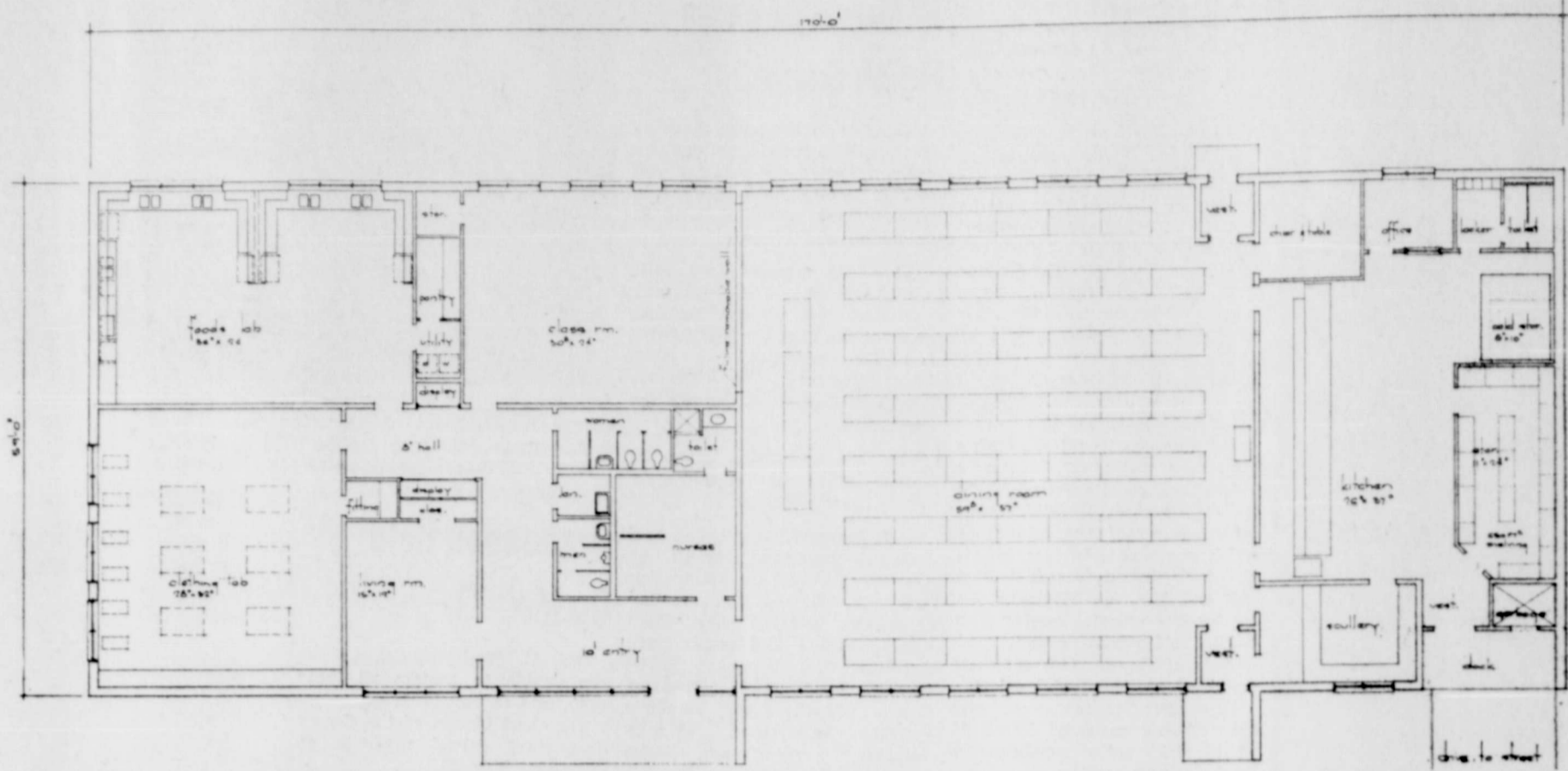

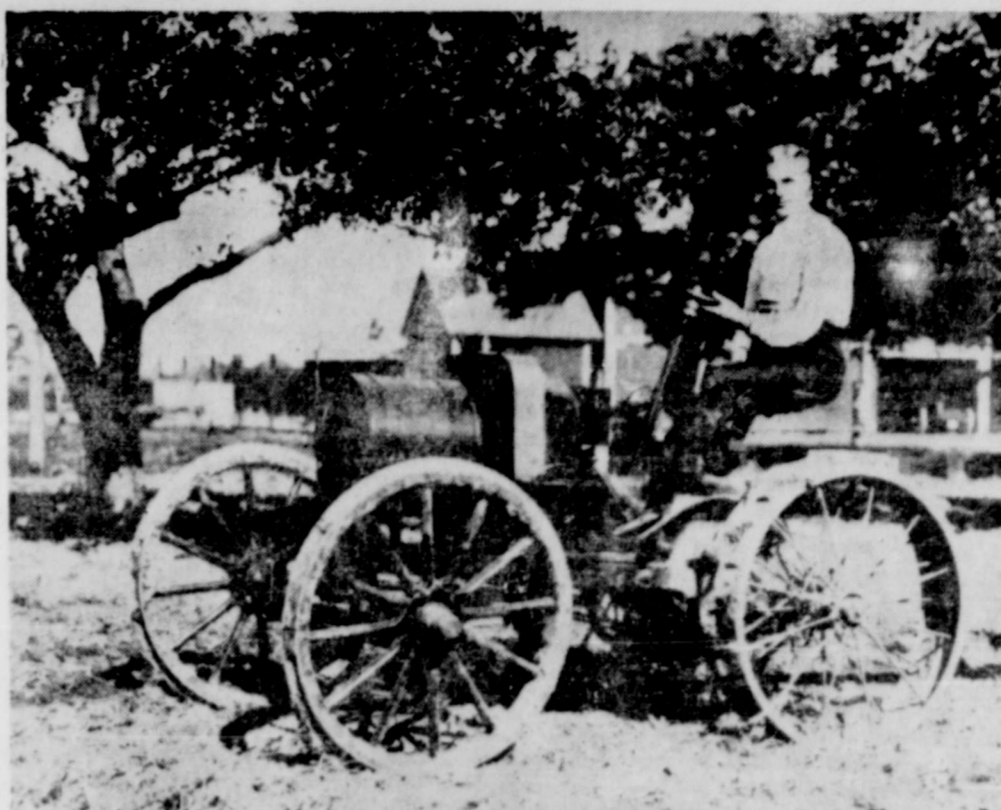

NEW CHEMICAL INSECT CONTROL DEVELOPED

Olin Mathieson announced the marketing of a new early season insect control on cotton. The new chemical, called BIDRIN (R) insecticide label, was approved by the United States Department of Agriculture for use on cotton April 1, 1963.

Bidrin is a systemic insecticide. It kills some insects by contact, but its greatest asset is that it kills most sucking and chewing insects by systemic action. When Bidrin is applied to growing cotton, it is almost immediately absorbed into the plant. Its killing action to insects in the plant may last from one to two weeks. Since most of Bidrin applied to cotton plants is absorbed it is not available on the plant surface. Hence, beneficial insects develop in a normal way. In a 1962 cotton season, Bidrin was used with good results for thrip control on 1500 acres of cotton of lands of the Texas Prison Farm System.

The new chemical (dimethyl Phosphate of 3-hydroxy N, N-dimethyls crotonamide) is a water-miscible product. For foliage applications, the correct amount of technical Bidrin is mixed with sufficient water to provide uniform coverage.

For control of thrip, fleahoppers, aphid, spider mite and overwintering bollweevil, Bidrin is applied at the rate of 0.1 pound to 0.2 pound per acre of cotton. For control of lygus bugs on cotton, Bidrin is applied at 0.5 pound per acre.

Bidrin comes packed in one quart containers, six per case. Each quart contains 1.8 lbs. of actual Bidrin and will treat 18 acres at .1 lb. per acre or 9 acres at .2 lb. per acre.
